Located in the centre of Burnley, 123 is a building that has been beautifully restored to its former glory through a partnership between artists, Historic England, and Burnley Council. An exciting project space, thoughtfully renovated for artists and the town's communities.

123 is also an ethos. Driven by the belief that *Art has a part to play in everyone's everyday,* we see it not just as a place, but as a network of developing relationships, or a catalyst for new meaningful connections and deeper relationships with creativity.



ENGAGEMENT Burnley is a town with historic low engagement in the arts. 123 seeks to address poor access to culture for audiences and increase opportunities for the town's growing community of artists. We are committed to seeking out creative talent from all age groups, backgrounds, abilities, identities, cultures and ethnicities. We see this as fundamental and essential for meaningful creative dialogue and genuine change.



GET HANDS ON, EVERYDAY A place to participate in the creation of new work is a game changer for the town. 123 is not a pop up, meanwhile space - it is a building ready to contribute positively to Burnley's creative and cultural future. It's open to everyone, regardless of background or experience. It's an invitation to feed the imagination - consider 'what if', to get involved, make a mess, and make great things happen. This is what Burnley needs and often lacks.

To this end, 123 is revisiting and revisioning traditional educational spaces – those institutes that provided access to lifelong learning for Burnley people for over a hundred years.



A CATALYST OF POSITIVE CHANGE. This is the right time and the right place for 123 to happen - It is an exciting and timely opportunity to engage with the needs of a town that has a rich history, heritage and a dynamic, evolving, social and cultural sense of place.

BUILDING ON OUR SUCCESS. 123 builds on the success of its sister project, the Salon and a four year cultural programme delivered though Burnley's Heritage Action Zone. Working in partnership with Super Slow Way, The Caravan Gallery, Mid Pennine Arts, British Textiles Biennial, Blaze and a growing university sector, we are well positioned to provide creative and structural support to Burnley's dynamic new Culture Framework.






OUR TEAM. 123 is overseen by a small team of artists: Jai Redman, Karen Green and Gavin Parry, with support from Ian Brownbill. Between them they've run multiple groundbreaking artist–led workspaces including Edge Hill Station (with Metal); ArtWork (Salford); Hotspur House (Manchester): Ormskirk Chapel (Ormskirk). In 2023 Jai opened the Salon in Burnley - the town's first independent artists' studios, owned and run by artists. We are experienced in managing studios and socially engaged projects. 





Basement Plan Scale 1:50
