
Hello to my favorite Optimists of all - NC East Optimists!



Hoping for a "JOI-ful" New Year

The new year begins with **hope**: **Hope** that our District will grow in membership, **Hope** that our fundraisers will be successful so that we can continue our mission, and **Hope** that our work with youth will be seen. My hope is that we will increase the number of JOI Clubs so that our organization will continue to impact our communities, sustain Optimist Clubs, and grow with our youth.

I have been taught that to progress in life, you may need to know where you came from. Understanding the past is a step towards the future. So, please allow me to remind you of a little bit of where we came from. While many influential cities founded Optimist Clubs as early as 1911, the unification of these clubs did not occur until 1919, their main goal was helping young boys who were impoverished or troubled.

Optimists officially made helping America's youth their mission. By 1922 the clubs were structuring help for these boys by mentoring them, providing for their needs, and providing opportunities for them to strive not just to survive. By 1923 these initiatives were adopted by Optimist International as "Friend of the Delinquent Boy", although many clubs included girls. By 1924, each member was asked to spend 2-4 hours a week helping youth. These Optimists partnered with the YMCA, Boy Scouts, and many other organizations.



One of the boys at a meeting asked if they could be Junior Optimists. And so... JOI Clubs were formed. Optimists

continued their vision of advisor, helper, and friend. Over 100 years ago...1924. Then in 1928 something important happened in our organization and our state. The first oratorical contest was held

in Asheville, North Carolina. The topic, "What Junior Optimism Means to Me." These boys and these clubs were structured not for the elite, but for those who needed the most help. And today, we have continued that goal except with all youth who need a place to be helped while helping others. In other words, we have youth helping each other.

I hope we will have a "JOI-ful" New Year by making history again in eastern North Carolina, to include growth of more than one club in our District. Let's get back to the mission and vision of our Founding Fathers of the International Optimist Club and promote our motto, "Friend of Youth."

- **Healthy Lifestyles** (Child Obesity, Healthy Eating, Physical Fitness, Happy Heart Advice, March of Dimes)
- Chronic Diseases (Childhood Cancer, Juvenile Diabetes, HIV, Multiple Sclerosis, Muscular Dystrophy, Sickle Cell Anemia)
- Mental Health (Depression, Bullying, Abuse)
- **Disabilities** Physical, Intellectual & Developmental (Autism, Special Olympics)

Any and all of these are critically important, however, I would like to focus our club and district efforts this year on the chronic disease of Childhood Cancer. Let's be creative on how our clubs and our district can have an impact.

The aluminum can tabs and collection items for Ronald McDonald House to support families impacted is a start. I know we have some creative folks that can make quilts, blankets or toboggans for the kids in care. What other creative ideas do we have? How can we make a difference?

Oratorical Contest Timothy Johnson

As you may already know, Optimist International sponsors three scholarship contests for students to earn money to pursue opportunities in higher education: the Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (CCDHH), the Essay Contest and the Oratorical Contest. The contests are conducted at the Club level, then Zone and Regional (if necessary) and at the District level. District-level scholarships are funded by the Optimist International Foundations and awarded by Optimist International.

The Topic for the 2025-2026 Optimist year is: "The Moment I Realized I Belonged — My Definition of Community".

The contest is open to contestants under the age of 19 as of October 1st of the current Optimist International contest year (October 1 – September 30), and who have not yet completed high school. There is no minimum age.

Interested students submit a speech on the preassigned topic to their local Optimist Club. To find out the contact in your area, please e-mail the District Oratorical Chairperson, Timothy Johnson, at NCEastGovernorTimothyJohnson@gmail.com.

The deadline to enter is determined by the sponsoring Optimist Club. All Club-level contests

are typically held by late March, so that the District Contest can be held at our 3rd Quarter District Gathering.

Districts and Clubs may opt to hold an online Oratorical

Contest. Please contact our District Oratorical Chair Timothy Johnson for guidance on holding an online contest.



The Optimist Oratorical Contest gives young people the chance to speak to the world. More than \$150,000 in college scholarships funded by the Optimist International Foundations is awarded annually from this program.

First conducted in 1928, this is the second most popular Optimist International Program. Nearly 2,000 clubs participate in this program each year. The winners at the Club level receive medallions and Zone winners

receive a plaque. Districts have the opportunity to provide a first place scholarship of \$2,500, a second place scholarship of \$1,500, and a third place scholarship of \$1,000.

This contest offers an opportunity for students who are Deaf or Hard-of-Hearing to present their thoughts in the community, gaining skills, which can only come from signing or speaking to a large audience. Patterned after the Optimist Oratorical Contest, the contest offers youth the chance to compete in speech or sign language with the chance to win a college scholarship.
