Greetings from the Homes and best wishes to you, your family, a n d f r i e n d s.



Spring is in the air at the Homes and while

Mother Nature is working her magic to change things, bringing about a green lawn, pretty flowers, and leaves on the pecan trees, she isn't the only one affecting change at the Homes. The staff is very busy working with the children, working with our friends, and making improvements to the campus.

Of course one of the notable changes occurring at the Homes is the transition in leadership. Mr. Stuart Sherman is retiring as President/CEO, a position he has held for some 14 years. Mr. Bill Thompson, a longtime employee of the Homes, has been named the successor to Mr. Sherman.

One of the more obvious changes in the childcare program is the movement of the girls living in Huntersville Cottage to Civitan Cottage. The guys in Civitan were reassigned to other cottages so the girls in Huntersville could move in. This will remain in effect while refinements are made to the residential care program and to Huntersville Cottage. Additionally, changes have been made to the meals program to better streamline that part of our program. While all cottages will maintain their kitchens, the major preparation of meals is now being done in Lions Cottage and Optimist Cottage. Once prepared, the food is placed in special containers and carted to the other cottages where the children have their meals "family style" as has been the norm at the Homes.

A number of physical changes and upgrades are occurring to the cottages. Recently, Lions Cottage has had its kitchen completely renovated to better accommodate the preparation of meals for the campus. One of the more exciting developments is the wiring of the cottages to al-

low high speed internet access to the children and teaching parents. A wireless network to which 4-5 computers per cottage can connect is being installed at this time. We are very involved at this time also with our civic friends, attending meetings and conventions and marketing strategies to allow for continued support of our efforts for the children. 
Oratorical

Why? First, all other times are too late. Schools at every grade level have their club schedules set before the first day of school. Summer is when principals have time to think about something else besides the 3 B's of education: Books, Buses, & Bad Boys.



Where to start? Don't go to school until you have a program or a school-friendly project in mind for a youth club. Don't go until you have the money to fund the start-up fees (a couple of hundred will do.) Don't start until you (a) know the principal or (b)

know a teacher who is enthusiastic about forming a club. (You don't know an enthusiastic teacher? Well, go out and get one as a member. They make great Optimists – teachers today can't survive unless they are Incredible Optimists!)

How to find the principal? If you are just searching, go to the N C. Depart-

ment of Public Instruction Web site and look up your county. (Go to www.dpi.state.nc.us, then to the "N. C. Schools List" page, then select either your county or city; and click on a school's web site.) You might be surprised how many schools have individual web sites with not
