Junior Golf Championship 2004

GOING FOR A HOLE IN ONE IN 2004!

Arrangements for our NC East District Qualifying Tournament have been finalized. Tournament dates are April 24-25, 2004 at Crooked Creek Golf Club in Fuguay-Varina, NC.



Some positive changes have been implemented for this year's tournament. Boys and girls in the 14-15 and 16-18 age divisions will be competing. We are also asking our entrants to pay a fee this year of \$50.00 if they reside within the NC East District and are sponsored by one of our clubs. The sponsoring club will pay a fee of \$25.00 to sponsor each of their Junior Golfers. Clubs will still have the option of paying the combined fee of \$75.00 for each of their sponsored golfers should they so choose. If a Junior Golfer resides outside the NC East District or does not

have a club sponsor, the fee for that golfer will be \$100.00. If a club has more golfers than it desires to sponsor, let me know and we will find a sponsoring club.

NOTE:

Most Junior Golf events require entry fees of their golfers. Some entry fees can be as high as \$90.00 for one round of golf. Our change in policy is still a bargain for the golfer. In addition, the Optimist Clubs will continue to have the opportunity to be a part of the Junior Golf Program as a sponsor of the golfers.

We are planning for a large turnout and have tee times for up to seventy golfers. An information packet has been mailed to all Lieutenant Governors and Club Presidents. Included in this packet is all the information and details on our tournament. **Deadline** for all entries is **April** 10, 2004.

Now is the time to start recruiting your golfers. Contact both public and private schools and get information to the Athletic Directors and Golf Coaches. Go by your local golf facilities (clubs, courses, practice ranges, and golf shops). Talk to the golf pros and leave information with them about our tournament. Posters with tournament information should be conspicuously placed on information boards to promote the tournament. This is critical, as this is where our Junior Golfers practice, play, and purchase their supplies and equipment.

Tournament Sponsors are needed for our Qualifying Tournament for it to continue as a self-supporting program. Contact your sponsors as soon as possible and sign them up. A minimum fee for Each Sponsor's sign is \$100.00. Sponsors will also be listed on our Web-Site.

Volunteer club members are needed to make this a successful OI event. We will need scorers, course marshals, starters, photographers, and medically trained personnel such as nurses or paramedics to assist at the tournament.

We will be serving an afternoon meal at the conclusion of the tournament on Sunday. We expect to have a hungry group of golfers, families, and volunteers to feed. If your club is interested in handling the preparation of this meal and providing food, drinks, and other items, please let me know. Hamburgers, hot dogs, grilled chicken, or barbecue, and trimmings, seem appropriate foods for this occasion. Other suggestions are welcome.

After the meal we will award the trophies and introduce the winners to our Optimist organization.

A complete review of our Junior Golf Program will be presented at our February District Meeting. I encourage all to attend.
