



By the end of his life, Edison had amazingly acquired 1,093 patents for his invention. Many of these inventions, such as the phonograph and the Kineto-

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graph, paved the way for the creation of numerous modern conveniences we take for granted every day (Beals, Inventions).

Thomas Edison was truly one of the greatest inventors of all time, but he would not have accomplished what he did nor would we have the technology we have today without the love and dedication of Nancy Edison. Thomas Edison once said this about his mother, "My mother was the making of me. She was so true, so sure of me, and I felt I had someone to live for, someone I must not disappoint" (Life). Nancy Edison did not invent some amazing gadget that has changed the world, but she did give the encouragement, education and confidence needed to someone who did. Nancy Edison's story proves that you do not have to become famous or do anything extraordinary to make a difference in the world. Because of her love, dedication, and faith in her son, a boy thought to be incapable of learning became a genius and completely transformed our modern world. Nancy Edison is a prime example of the power of one.




Governor Yancev Hines called the meeting of the N.C. East District Board of Directors to order at 8:45 AM.
