


Good Morning Optimist:






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Our goal is to have over 100 Optimists on our campus on Saturday, March 14, 2009!



Gary Faircloth, pictured at left with wife Betty, assumed the position of president of Boys and Girls Homes of North Carolina, Inc. on July 1, 1008. Faircloth succeeds Bill Thompson, Jr. who retired in November 2007. Former Vice President of Childcare Becky Wray served as Interim President following Thompson's retirement.

McNeil Chestnut, Chairman of the Board of Trustees for Boys and Girls Homes of North Carolina, Inc., stated that "The Board of Trustees, through its search and executive commit-



tees, worked diligently to find a successor for the president. We are happy to have found an individual with the qualifications and history with the Homes that Gary has to lead it through its next period of service to children."

Faircloth, who resided in Michigan prior to his return to Lake Waccamaw, becomes just the sixth permanent leader of the Homes. Boys and Girls Homes of North Carolina, Inc. was formed as a home for boys in 1954. Later, services for girls were added and the agency became Boys and Girls Homes of North Carolina, Inc. Today, the Homes provide both residential and foster care/adoption services to children ages birth to twenty-one. Faircloth has a unique relationship with the Homes in that as a youth he was a resident of Boys Homes. After graduation from high school and college he returned to the Homes as an employee, working directly with the children and later in development and planned giving.

In 1970, Faircloth married Betty Engen, whose parents Eugene and Leola Engen operated a local eating establishment, Penn's Grill, in nearby Whiteville and who he met while living at

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
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the Homes. They have two sons, Brad and Travis. Faircloth says he and Betty have worked together as a team in all their ventures and it is that closeness that has allowed them to experience happiness and success in their work, family, and community.

Faircloth graduated from Hillsboro High School in 1966. He received an Associate of Arts Degree from Southeastern Community College near Whiteville in 1970. In 1972 he graduated from East Carolina University with a B.S. degree in Social Welfare with a Composite in Juvenile Correctional Services. In 1982 he attended and received certification from the National Planned Giving Institute in Colorado Springs, Colorado and Memphis, Tennessee. He completed studies with the Southeastern Trust School of Campbell University in 1989 and attended the Institute for Healing Racism, becoming certified as a trainer in 2002.

Faircloth's work experiences include Director of Social, Group Life, and Educational services for Boys and Girls Homes of North Carolina, Inc. from 1973-77; co-owner/operator of Penn's Grill in Whiteville from 1977-80; Civic Club Coordinator, Director of Planned Giving, Director of Development for Boys and Girls Homes of North Carolina, Inc. from 1980-88; Trust Officer/Business Development for United Carolina Bank from 1988-90; Vice President for Starr Commonwealth Schools in Albion, MI. from 1990 to 2002; and most recently as co-owner/operator of Captain Luey's Calabash Seafood Restaurant in Battle Creek, Michigan.

Faircloth says he and Betty are excited about their return to North Carolina and Boys and Girls Homes after several fruitful years in Michigan. He notes that he really enjoyed working with his family in developing and watching the seafood restaurant grow. His employees and customers were more like family than workers or clients! "But we are really excited about being a part of the Boys and Girls Homes family again. Boys and Girls Homes played an important role in my life and in the lives of thousands of otherwise 'on-the-street' children since its founding by A.D. Peacock. Sad to say, the need for the Homes is greater than ever. The abuse and neglect of children still permeates each community in each state throughout our country. I appreciate this opportunity and look forward to working with the board, staff, and our supporters in offering comfort, guidance, and support to the children who come into our care." Childhood Cancer Campaign

Thank you, and congratulations to all the clubs that have raised funds for Childhood Cancer. At the last district meeting, we went around the room and totaled up the amount of funds raised in the district so far this year. The sum at that time was over \$27,000. I know we will add more to that total at the August convention.

Zone 6 is planning a Storytelling and Music Festival to be held on Sept. 13th in the Kerr Scott Building at the NC State Fairgrounds in Raleigh. Proceeds from the event will go to the Childhood Cancer Campaign projects at the Zone 6 clubs. The doors will open at 9:30 am and close at 7pm. This will be an all-day celebration of life through music, storytelling,

fun and games for the whole family. Performers include David Holt (UNC-TV), Andy Offutt Irwin, The Healing Force, Ron Jones and Joseph Helfrich. Tickets are \$8adults, children 3 to 12 - \$5, children under 3 are free. Tickets can be purchased at the door, or from members of the Raleigh, North Raleigh, Raleigh Dinner, Garner, and Chapel Hill Optimist clubs. Sponsors are also needed. For more information, call Alan Hoal at 919-469-0394. Childhood cancer survivors will be given complementary tickets and recognized at the event.

The Chapel Hill Club will sponsor The Rock Against Cancer Concert at the Southern Vil-



lage Green in Chapel Hill in September. Funds from this open-air concert provide equipment and a music therapist for patients at UNC Children's Hospital. This event was founded by Lisa White, wife of Dr. Anthony Titus, a Chapel Hill Optimist Club member. Dr. Titus was recently honored by Sen. Elizabeth Dole for his efforts in childhood cancer research. Their son Gabe is a 12-year survivor of cancer. Funds from this open-air concert have equipped a music room with several keyboards, two guitars, microphones, and a digital recording studio. It is beneficial to the kids emotionally and physically.

In July, Bob and I led the watermelon party and seed-spitting contests for a group of Duke childhood cancer patients at Camp Kaleidoscope near Henderson. Several campers had never had the opportunity to participate in such an Olympic event, and had no idea what to do. With 35 campers and a staff of 18 to show them how, the novices were soon boasting of their seed-spitting ex-"spurt"-ise. Prizes and watermelon were enjoyed by all.

By the time you read this, the Cape Fear Optimist Club will have held another Texas Hold Em' Poker Tournament with half of the proceeds going to the Childhood Cancer Cam-

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paign. I'm sure that other clubs have conducted excellent CCC projects, but I have no reports. We and the kids you are helping congratulate you and extend our thanks!

During our visit to Camp Kaleidoscope, I spoke with Anne Kosem, clinical social worker at Children's Oncology/Hematology Center at Duke Children's Hospital. They need prepaid phone, gas and gift cards for the cancer patients and families. Due to the high cost of gas, many children are not coming in for their treatments. Those that are in the hospital can't afford to call home, or have family come to visit them when that support is so badly needed. Gift cards to Wal-Mart and Target are needed for families who unexpectedly must stay for several days at a time. They need supplies such as diapers and formula. The social workers at each hospital can distribute these cards to the patients and families as needed. Parking costs at UNC are also increasing 25 cents/hour. Discount parking passes can also be funded by clubs and distributed on a per-case need by the social workers. Food vouchers for the families would also help a great deal. The cost for food at the hospital cafeteria for four people and parking is about \$50/day. I have the contact information for the staff at DUKE, UNC and ECU. Let me know if your club can help.
