One of the most poignant examples of the power of youth in our country is the recent nomination and subsequent election of Barack Obama: the first African-American President of the United States of America. It was young Americans ages 18 to 25 that helped him win the democratic nomination; and again, it was America's youth, ages 18 to 25 that carried him in the election. At

a difficult time in the nation, when politics could have divided our country, the youth came together, no matter what their race or religion, to campaign for the promise of

change.

Students became more interested in learning about the political process and many taught others, such as their parents and grandparents, about the importance of participating in this election.

On many occasions, youth underestimate their own power. However, history has proven many times the power of youth. For example the Holocaust is a much studied topic in Middle School Social Studies, as well as High School History Classes. Students read about it in text books, view powerful documentaries, and study various supplemental materials in an attempt to understand the impact this event had on our global society. On occasion some have asked, "What can we do to share what we have learned and make sure this does not happen again?" One group of middle students designed and completed a project that not only demonstrated their understanding of the holocaust, but impacted their entire community. They researched the number of victims of the holocaust and collected paperclips, one to represent each victim. The students collected enough paper clips to fill a train car. Once the project was complete, they placed the train car on school property and turned it into a holocaust museum. A documentary was then produced to share the story with millions. This

Individuals can also make an impact. In 2003, a teenage name Jessica Riminton, traveled to Johannesburg, South Africa, to attend the Children's Earth Summit. As a result of what she learned during this summit, she founded the "Young People's Decade of Commitment". In 2004 the Young People's Decade of Commitment launched One Worlds Youth Project, a cultural exchange initiative for middle and high school age young people.

I have personally been inspired by stories such as these and strive on a personal level to impact those in my everyday life. Through school and community activities such as Future Farmers of America and volunteer coaching opportunities, I have seen firsthand how those that have mentored me have changed my life, and now I am passing my knowledge to others. As Maya Angelou so elegantly said, "When you get, give. when you learn, teach".


Optimist Century Club

In 1968, the Optimist Cottage at the Boys and Girls Homes at Lake Waccamaw was dedicated to the service of abused, neglected, or otherwise on-the-street children. Since that time, Optimists from across North Carolina have continued to serve as friends of children of the Boys and Girls Homes with their visits, involvement, and financial support. In 1981, the North Carolina Past-Governors of Optimist International recognized the importance of an endowment as a means of providing for the ongoing financial support of the Optimist Cottage and the programs of care for the Home's children and endorsed the concept of raising \$1,000,000 to endow the operation of the Optimist Cottage, to that end the 5 x 12 Club was established. Individual members pledged \$5 per month for 12 months for a total of \$60 per year. At the Optimist West District Convention in August 2002, the NC Optimist Boys and Girls Homes Endowment goal of \$1,000,000 was attained! The 5 x 12 annual pledge played a major part in reaching this goal.

Following the accomplishment of this goal, the question became "What now?" That led to the establishment of the "Climbing the Next Mountain" program to support the programs of care for the children. The ultimate goal for Optimists is to raise \$150,000 per year for the

operation of the Optimist cottage. Through the combined earnings, other efforts and a new focus on individual contributions called the Optimist Century Club Fund, the goal for funding the operational needs of the Optimist Cottage can be achieved. You can become an annual Optimist Century Club member by pledging one hundred dollars (\$100) to the support of the Optimist Cottage to make a difference in the life of a child. You can do this in one payment or in combination of payments to occur during the club year. In return, you will become an annual member of the Optimist Century Club and will receive a commemorative pen and your club will be credited with your gift. The same motivation of caring that led to the establishment of the Optimist Cottage and the development of a million dollar



Optimist endowment, will spur individual Optimists to continue efforts to provide, hope, build dreams, and further accomplishments of those children who find peace and solace in the Optimist Cottage.

Childhood Cancer Campaign

Thanks to all the club members for their efforts in support of the Childhood Cancer Campaign. OI needs to raise \$400,000 by the end of December to meet our commitment to the Johns Hopkins research program. The duck race at the July convention raised over \$7,000. The race will be a part of next year's convention in Denver. You don't have to be present to win, but you do have to buy a duck to be in the race! The cost will be the same - \$10 a duck. This year they sold out of ducks and plan to buy more for next year. Congratulations to the following clubs:

Golden Circle Club raised over \$750 using the Kisses project.

The Chapel Hill Club raised over \$10K this year. In addition to the Kisses for Cancer project and donations, the club assists Cardinal Track Club at three races during the year and shares in the proceeds.

The Garner Club raised over \$6K at their golf Tournament. They support Camp Rainbow and children treated at ECU.

The Raleigh Club treated 26 families affected by childhood cancer to a weekend at the beach. This project costs about \$1,000/family. Thanks to all the clubs that help fund this project.

Please send me information about your projects. I want to include your clubs success and encourage others.

For those clubs that send in donations to the CCC program before December, they will receive banner patches that honor their contributions of \$500, \$1,000, \$1,500 and/or \$2,000. Checks can be given to me at the district meetings or sent to the OI Foundation. Remember to specify on the check that the funds are designated for Johns Hopkins Research or CCC. Clubs that are donating to local hospitals also need to specify how those funds are to be used.

Last week the doctors and staff of the Pediatric Cancer Department moved into the new facility on the UNC campus.

September 15th will be the grand opening of the new NC Cancer Hospital. The Lineberger Comprehensive Care Center is one of only forty centers in the nation to receive this designation. You can check out more about this new facility at the web site

<u>www.unclineberger.org</u>. This facility will provide much more for the patients, trainees, doctors, and families in the fight against cancer.

The Chapel Hill Club participated in the 1st annual STRIKE OUT CHILDHOOD CANCER NIGHT at the Durham Bulls Athletic Park. In addition to getting out the word about child-hood cancer, we were able to network with many other groups that are also working to make a difference. These folks will gladly come to speak to your club. Let me know if you want the contact information.

Did you know that every day, 46 children are diagnosed with cancer? Everyday, 7 children die from cancer. There are many ways we can help raise awareness and funding for the research. September is the National Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. A reminder to all CCC chairmen, OI has a free information packet available. Call 1-800-500-8130 today to get

one for your club.

Let me know how I can help you and your club participate in the Childhood Cancer Campaign. I have smocks and canisters available at cost for the Kisses project. I also have applications for the Wal-Mart Community Grant.

We will have a special Friday night activity at the district convention in Myrtle Beach. Proceeds from the event will go to CCC. Great fun was had by all last year and we raised over

\$3,000. I hope to see you there.

Thanks for all you do for the kids. Remember, we are making progress. It just takes time - more then we'd like.


