Fort McHenry National Monument & Historic shrine-- Birthplace of the USA National Anthem *O! say can you see, by the dawn's early light,* a large red, white and blue banner? *Whose broad stripes and bright stars . . . were so gallantly streaming!* over the star-shaped Fort McHenry during the Battle of Baltimore, September 13-14, 1814. The valiant defense of the fort inspired Francis Scott Key to write "The Star-Spangled Banner." It's a short Water Taxi ride from the hotel. They just opened a new Visitor & Education Center.

Historic Ships in Baltimore

Maritime history unfolds on the decks of USS Constellation, USCG Cutter Taney, Lightship Chesapeake and USS Torsk.


The USS Constellation, the last Civil War vessel afloat, was built in 1854 and is the last all-sail warship built by the US Navy. You can visit the museum and tour the ship.

The USS Torsk, launched in 1944, is a World War II era submarine docked near the National Aquarium at Baltimore. The Torsk is open for tours.





Childhood Cancer Campaign

At the March Board meeting, the International Activities Committee proposed the idea of naming the Childhood Cancer Campaign as the OI focus program. It was decided that the *proposal* to designate the CCC as the focus program for the next 25 years would be presented to the delegates at the 2011 International Convention. This will need a 2/3 positive vote from the delegates to be adopted. No



vention. This will need a 2/3 positive vote from the delegates to be adopted. None of our current programs would be discontinued, just a spotlighting of the CCC program.

June is designated Childhood Cancer Month by OI. Please encourage your clubs to schedule a CCC event. The Chapel Hill club has held three weekend Kisses for Childhood Cancer collections and plans two more in June. The clubs in Wake Forest, N. Raleigh and Chapel Hill have cooked meals for Ronald McDonald House.

The Winter Park Club presented a check for \$2,000 to New Hanover Hospital for the Pediatric Oncology Department. A check for \$1,000 was presented to a local family, and \$1,000 was donated to the research project at Johns Hopkins. The funds were raised with a raffle and concessions at the ball park during a recreation tournament.

The Raleigh Club hosted their annual Mile of Hope weekend getaway for families and children with cancer at Atlantic Beach.

The Raleigh Diner Club made a donation of the Foundation Bears to the cancer patients at UNC Hospital.

The Duplin Club is planning a golf tournament to be held at the Rockfish Country Club on June 4th. Contact Scott Smith at RockfishCC@yahoo.com for more information. The proceeds from the tournament will go to the Childhood Cancer Campaign.

At the International Convention July 3-5 the Programs booth at the House of Optimism will center on the CCC program. We will be conducting the annual duck race to raise funds for research at Johns Hopkins. Tickets are \$10 each and can be bought in advance or at the convention. You do not have to attend the convention to win. The first place prize is \$100, second place is \$50, and third place is \$25. The Arizona District will be selling hand knitted caps that come in three sizes to fit both children and adults. The caps come in solid and multi-colored yarn. Funds raised from the donated caps will also benefit the research project at Johns Hopkins.



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The Childhood Cancer Grant Panel voted to award a grant of \$2,500 to the North Raleigh Optimist Club to conduct the Optimist Music and Storytelling Festival. This event will be held on July 16th. Local childhood cancer patients and their families will be allowed to attend for free. The funds raised through ticket sales and food sales will be used for club CCC projects at local hospitals. For information contact Alan Hoal at aeh@us.ibm.com.

The Chapel Hill Club and the Childhood Cancer Campaign lost a loyal champion. Jim Casey died of cancer on May 6th. Jim was a charter member of the club and developed the "Kisses for Childhood Cancer Campaign." Thanks to his leadership over the past 8 years the club has raised nearly \$50,000 handing out candy Kisses.

Thanks for all you do for the kids. It makes a big difference.




Success will be mine, not just financial success, but success in helping others. I look forward to this day. All of my successes will be made possible with education as the key to unlock the door of opportunity.





PGI Chair Linda Watson reported on the club members that were achieving higher levels of this project. For those that participated in David Prather's presentation, this can be marked off their passport.


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Lt. Governor Jo Ann Williams reported on the CPA for Denard and Kay Harris. She advised there are four categories and community oriented.
