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
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NCE Optimist Convention





Childhood Cancer Campaign



Optimist International has renewed its commitment to the Childhood Cancer Campaign. Our program at Johns Hopkins Kimmel Cancer Center is working hard to improve the treatment for pediatric cancer patients. The research is aimed at reducing the toxicity of treatments, while improving their effectiveness. Using DNA to decode a cancer cells weaknesses, doctors are developing treatments that boost a patients' own immune response to any cancer cells. Reduced toxicity

will reduce the side effects and the amount of time that children will need treatment. With the results from the research, doctors are working to reduce the number of hospitalizations, limit long term side effects, and cut the risk of a return of the cancer. Finding a cure for this disease will give all of our children and future generations a much brighter future. To support the Childhood Cancer Campaign checks can be made out to OIF - CCC and designated on the memo line Johns Hopkins Research.

Thanks to the Chapel Hill Optimist Club for the many hours they spent during April and early June handing out candy Kisses. The grand total for this years collections is \$2,163.57. These funds will benefit UNC and Duke Pediatric Oncology Departments, the OI Research grant at Johns Hopkins, Mile of Hope, and Hope and Healing in the Garden (UNC). Thanks also to Sally Bassett (Ret. RN) for making another "Angels" lap quilt for the kids.

However, Booth's service caused few encouraging results, for his group was merely a parallel of several other charitable groups. Conversely after changing the name of his mission to "the Salvation Army," his mission thrived and inspired people with the idea of being in an army fo fight sin. By the time of his death in 1912, The Salvation Army was already at work in 58 countries. Through his optimism and perseverance, Booth developed one of the greatest humanitarian services in history. Throughout the 20th century, Optimist Club members worked tirelessly to aid the world around them through actions such as collecting scrap metal for the American productions of weaponry during World War II, delivering chocolate to war-torn youth in Great Britain, and fighting against pornography targeting children by mail in the 1960s. Today, thousands of optimist clubs worldwide continue to serve their communities with an emphasis on their youth. If we adopt their positive outlook into our lifestyles, I believe that we all can benefit the lives of the people around us.

The American army was bruised, battered and bloodied during the Revolutionary War. Whether based on the fact that the British had taken New York, or the fact that the Americans had to walk through snow with only their bleeding naked feet, there were multiple excuses for the colonial army to surrender to the adversity. 

Great news! Our membership is heading in the right direction. We still have some serious work to do, but we're currently in the middle of the pack Internationally. We're ranked 26th and minus 38 members. Please continue sharing our organization with your daily contacts.

There are several reasons to share our organization

with the "outside world". I know I have a tendency to be repetitive, but first and most importantly, each new member we recruit into our clubs equates to helping 30+ children. While that should be our main focus, there are so many more benefits to bringing in new members. Monetarily, each new FOO (Friend of Optimist) brings a profit of \$40 to our club. Also, by qualifying for honor and or distinguished, our clubs will have their International dues reduced by \$100 and \$250 respectively during the first quarter next year. Every Club in our District is within reach of Honor Club.

Individually, everyone who recruits their first new member receives a District TShirt, a District Pin, and are eligible for the year long recruiting incentive. And don't forget our 4th quarter push.
