
OI President Ron Huxley has made the 2013-14 Optimist theme-"My Optimism" – MO! In a recent article President Ron wrote:

District Essay

"How Dreams Lead To Success"

This year's Essay Topic will be very interesting for the youth of our community to write about and just as interesting for us to read. It is very exciting to give kids an opportunity to use and improve their writing skills by entering our annual Optimist Essay Contest.

Now is a good time to begin contacting the schools and letting them know about our contest and also to set the date for your own club's contest. Remember, the deadline for submitting the winning club entry to the district is February 28, 2014 and since students will be out during Christmas, it would be wise to line up contestants prior to the Christmas break if possible, so that the students will have plenty of time to prepare and write their essay.

When contacting the Public Schools it may be helpful to go to the County Administration office first, if you don't already have good contacts for the schools. In most of the elementary schools there are AIG Teachers who normally head up the Essay Projects and in most high schools there is usually a Guidance Counselor or an English Teacher who will inherit the Essay Project. And don't forget about all the private schools and home-schools in your area. Some of our best essays in recent years have come from students attending private schools or home schools.

In our modern times of "texting" instead of formal writing let's give students a chance to use and im-

prove their formal writing skills. While "texting" is probably here to stay, most educators believe we need to also keep formal writing as a necessary skill and it seems most students don't have trouble "switching" between the two very different methods of writing if they have adequate opportunities.

Your club's essay chairman should have received a packet of information regarding the Essay Contest, but if you don't have it, you may also get the information from the OI site or by contacting me. I will be glad to help your club in any way - our goal is to get lots of great essays and to give one deserving student a \$2500 scholarship for the winning District Essay! Thanks for all your work on this important OI project!

District Oratorical Contest

Topic: "How My Passions Impact the World"

It is hoped that all clubs in the district will participate in this year's Oratorical Contest. The contest is designed to inspire today's youth to motivate and inform others through the art of public speaking. It provides young people with the opportunity to compete for a college scholarship and express their views on a preassigned topic. More than \$150,000 in college scholarships is awarded annually through this program. The NCE District awards three scholarships: \$2500 (first place); \$1500 (second place); and \$1000 (3rd place).

How to Enter: Interested students should prepare a 4 to 5 minute speech on the pre-assigned topic to be presented at their local Optimist Club's contest. The speeches are judged at the Club level, Zone level, and then at the District level.

Applications, official rules, and a program guide are available from the Optimist International website www.optimist.org. The program guide contains full instructions and planning materials for organizing and conducting your Club's Oratorical Contest. All members can now view and conveniently print planning pages for any International Program from your home computer. To view the 2013-2014 District Oratorical Planning Pages, participant application, or other promotional material visit the Optimist International home page and click on scholarship programs.

Boys and girls who are under the age of 19 and who have not yet graduated from high school will compete together in a combined gender contest.

Topic: For the 2013 - 2014 contest, the topic is: "How

My Passions Impact the World"

Length of Speech: The speech must be at least 4

minutes but not over 5 minutes in length.

Key Dates: The names of the zone oratorical contest winners must be provided to the District contest chair by May 1, 2014. See your Lieutenant Governor to find out when your Zone contest will be held.

Important: By May 5, 2014, the following three documents must be provided to the District contest chair:

Zone/Regional/District Entry Form

Copy of the applicant's proof of age (birth certificate or passport)

A typed, double-spaced copy of the speech.

The District Oratorical Contest will be held on May 17, 2014, at the 3rd quarter District meeting held at the Hampton Inn & Suites in Wilson, NC.

Some Hints on Getting Oratorical Contest Candidates

- 1. START EARLY! Most public, private, and charter schools set their curriculums and select their educational projects over the summer or early in the first part of the academic year. This makes it important for clubs to make these contests known to the faculty and staff at or before this time. Note that the Optimist Oratorical Contest is recommended by both the National Association of Secondary School Principals and the American Association of School Administrators. This endorsement can go a long way when your Club is requesting that principals and teachers offer this program to their students.
- 2. Contacts for each of the North Carolina public schools, charter schools, Google, Bing, Yahoo or private schools can be easily found by doing a search (search, or whatever you use on your computer). For example: search NC Public Schools, NC Charter Schools, or NC Private Schools. Or you can search more locally by typing in something like Wake County, NC Public Schools (or your local county or city) into

your search engine. The directory for North Carolina public schools is located at: www.ncpublicschools.org/nceddirectory

- 3. News releases are a good way to announce your upcoming contest and to recognize the winners (and publicize your Club's efforts) after the contest. A variety of sample news releases are available on the O.I. website. All you have to do is fill in the blanks! The news releases can be found at the following location: www.optimist.org/e/member/marketing3.cfm
- 4. You can inform the public of the availability of the contest through a public service announcement (PSA) on your local community radio station. A 30-second PSA on the Oratorical Contest can be downloaded from the O.I. website and delivered to the station. The Oratorical Contest PSA is located at: www.optimist.org/e/member/marketing4.cfm
- 5. Many clubs have had success in getting contest candidates through their home school organizations. Because the families who home school their children are usually more flexible in their curriculums, they are often open to trying something new. Their website is located at: www.nche.com

6. For Club Contests be sure to order medallions and certificates of participation from Optimist Supply (www.optimistsupply.com). Since you will have two representatives from your club advance to the Zone contest, it is recommended that two gold medals be awarded at the local club level. Also, it is suggested that you order a silver and bronze medal for the next highest finishers. Therefore, the two advancing contestants will be identified only as the gold medal winners and not identified as first and second place. This also applies to Zone Contests.

All of this information and more can be found in the 2013-2014 NCE District Handbook and Directory. It is time to get started.

Childhood Cancer Campaign

Several clubs responded to the September Challenge issued by the Teenage Cancer Health Alliance of the Triangle. Donations received at Duke Pediatric Hematology/Oncology by October 31st were to be matched up to \$10,000. The Chapel Hill Club and the Whiteville Club responded to the challenge. Thanks to both these clubs and to any others that met the challenge.

The North Wake Club assisted Special Spaces of the Triangle with the bedroom renovation project of a very young stroke victim. Local TV has featured Caleon to call attention to the families' needs. Several businesses donate the supplies necessary to renovate these special children's rooms and playrooms with non-allergenic paints, furniture, and fabrics. The transformation of Caleon's room took place on November 2nd. Several local restaurants provided meals to help the workers get the job done in one day.

Dr. Stuart Gold, head of the UNC Pediatric Hematology/Oncology clinic visited the Chapel Hill Club recently. The best news about childhood cancer is the progress that has been made raising the cure rate of leukemia

to more than 90%. The not so good news is that with the population increases we have more cases of child-hood cancers. Much of the success is because children can tolerate heavier doses of treatments than adults.



Thanks to the Rocky Mount Evening club, the Golden Circle Club, the Whiteville Club and the Cape Fear Club for their donations to the Childhood Cancer Campaign. Their club donations and the money raised at the Rubber Duck Race during the fourth quarter meeting totaled \$3,450 for cancer research. Thanks to all for your help.

There will also be excitement with the achievement


of any member receiving and achieving any of the levels.

There is no problem with that, except for the fact that most, if not all, school systems in North Carolina have deaf students. I realize how hard it is to get those students to participate. However, this year I think we will have an advantage over previous years. Just before our contest last year Ms. Vernelson with the North Carolina Department of Instruction heard about our contest. Her job with the state is dealing with the deaf. This year we will coordinate with her and the west district to promote the contest state wide. proudly displayed in our Optimist Farm Lodge as a reminder of what we are about: "Friend of Youth!"


There is nothing any better than seeing these and other kids' happy faces as they escape their
