DISTRICT ORATORICAL CONTEST

Topic: "How My Passions Impact the World"

It is hoped that all clubs in the district will participate in

this year's Oratorical Contest. The contest is designed to inspire today's youth to motivate and inform others through the art of public speaking. It provides young people with the opportunity to compete for a college scholarship and express their views on a pre-assigned topic. More than \$150,000 in college scholarships is awarded annually through this program. The NCE District awards three scholarships: \$2500 (first place); \$1500 (second place); and \$1000 (3rd place).

How to Enter: Interested students should prepare a 4 to 5 minute speech on the pre-assigned topic to be presented at their local Optimist Club's contest. The speeches are judged at the Club level, Zone level, and then at the District level.

Applications, official rules, and a program guide are available from the Optimist International website www.optimist.org . The program guide contains full instructions and planning materials for organizing and conducting your Club's Oratorical Contest. All members can now view and conveniently print planning pages for any International Program from your home computer. To view the 2013-2014 District Oratorical Planning Pages, participant application, or other promotional material visit the Optimist International home page and click on scholarship programs.

Boys and girls who are under the age of 19 and who have not yet graduated from high school will compete together in a **combined gender contest**.

Topic: For the 2014 contest, the topic is: **"How My Passions Impact the World"** **Length of Speech:** The speech must be at least 4 minutes but not over 5 minutes in length.

Key Dates: The names of the zone oratorical contest winners must be provided to the District contest chair by <u>May 1, 2014</u>. See your Lieutenant Governor to find out when your Zone contest will be held.

Important: By <u>May 5, 2014</u>, the following three documents must be provided to the District contest chair:

- 1. Zone/Regional/District Entry Form
- 2. Copy of the applicant's proof of age (birth certificate or passport)
- 3. A typed, double-spaced copy of the speech.

The District Oratorical Contest will be held on <u>May 17</u>, <u>2014</u>, at the 3rd quarter District meeting held at the Hampton Inn & Suites in Wilson, NC. All of this information and more can be found in the 2013-2014 NCE District Handbook and Directory.

Now that the first quarter is behind us, let's take a look at our membership results!

Out of 38 clubs we have:

Four that are plus one new member

The total membership beginning October 1, 2013 was 1272 and December 31, 2013 was 1238. While being down 34 in membership, we can look optimistically toward ways we can build our membership and serve more children. After all, this is what we do best!

At our past district meeting we were honored by many of our "veteran" members by hearing their "Elevator Speech". Have you been practicing yours and utilizing it? When you share your "Optimism", people will notice! We talked about getting your club activities in the local paper - have you been sending in the information - complete with pictures? We talked about sharing your information on your web page and/or facebook page have you been posting daily? We talked about wearing your name badge and club shirt - have you been doing that? We talked about ordering applications from the home office and printing a club brochure - have you done that? We talked about planning a NOW program - will your club be planning one this quarter? With the many resources available, each member can help get your club information out to your community that you serve.

Let's talk about another program for this quarter to increase awareness of your club and help bring in new members. Did you read the January issue of OI Hotline? Here is an insert: One flamingo, two flamingos, three flamingos more! Membership recruitment can be fun and here is how. Each District is eligible to receive a pink



flock of flamingos to use as a motivator. A "keeper of the flock" must be appointed by each District. The District Membership Chair is a great choice.

The "keeper of the flock" has a simple job. They need to create signage that identifies the flock as the property of your District. The next step is incredibly important - look for a landing zone. A great landing zone can often be the front lawn of an unsuspecting Club President. Then, when the President least expects it, drop the flock on their lawn with the signage and a list of rules.

Rule one - get two new Members and register them with Optimist International within one week and the flock will be removed.

Rule two - get four new Members and you get to choose which President gets the flock next.

Rule three - do nothing and after one week,



the flock will fly away leaving a lawn full of "flamingo poop" (marshmallows in disguise).



Good morning optimist! Welcome to the beginning of 2nd quarter of 2013-14. I hope by now most of you have a good idea of the projects your club is planning to provide for the kids in your community. Optimist has a large sports skill activity selection. This covers, a number of project and activities available to each club. The optimist international web site has a full list of official optimist projects and activities that are available for your use. Some of the projects that are available include the oratorical contest, essay contest youth appreciation week,, respect for law/promotions of non-violence.

Other projects and activities include a full sports skill activities program. The tri star programs is a one day activity that covers football, basketball, baseball, soccer and hockey. Optimist also provides a communications contest for the deaf and the hard of hearing. Optimist international also has excellent programs in internet safety, bicycle safety, skateboarding safety, school bus safety and child seat safety in the car.

Optimist international also has a international junior golf program. This program allows your local golfer to earn a place in the district golf tournament and by winning the district tournament can earn a place in the international tournament in Florida. Optimist international also had a month (June) designated as childhood cancer awareness campaign. This program goes along with the full year of raising funds for childhood cancer research at Johns Hopkins hospital. Each club's president and secretary/treasurer has been provided with an official NC East district directory that will provide all the necessary information of each of the above mentioned programs. The directory also has the official dates and time for zone and district competition. Each directory will list the chairperson and phone numbers needed to contact that chairperson. I will provide the above list to each president during the 2nd board meeting in Wilson next month.

I also would like to invite each club to review the projects that have been completed and complete a community projects award for that project. This is a cd that will let optimist international and other optimist clubs how to complete a particular project at their club or the cd may assist a club in deciding what projects may be popular in their community.


