

2016 N.C. EAST DISTRICT ESSAY CONTEST

Lead by Example:: Reality or Fiction

"A leader knows the way, goes the way, and shows the



way." John Maxwell, motivational speaker and author of seventy books, wrote this in *Right to Lead*. Many leaders enjoy just directing others, whereas some serve as examples to others. Leading by example is a real motivator, demonstrating one is willing to do what one requires of others; this is not some fiction of idealistic thinking. Rather than say. "Go do this," leaders say "Lets do this." Regrettably, many fail to lead by example, ordering others to act one way while holding themselves to a different standard. This leads to confusion, lost motivation, and failure to follow directions. Acting as an example is crucial to leading others well, as famous 20th century leaders Nelson Mandela, Theodore Roosevelt and Mother Teresa modeled in their lives.

Nelson Mandela, who led protests and resistance efforts against oppressive white minority rule in South Africa, was imprisoned for 27 years, in an 8' by 8' cell. Breaking rocks daily with a tiny hammer in the hot sun. He struck his guards as dignified, respectful, and principled. He secretly wrote in prison an autobiography about life in his segregated country, which became a spark for world opinion. When offered restricted freedom after 22 years, Mandela chose to remain in prison five more years. His prison experience made him the face of the anti-apartheid movement. After his release, Mandela worked to end discrimination in South Africa. In 1994 , he became the country's first black president and formed a diverse government. He spent the next five years working for reconciliation between races and advocating human rights abroad. He formed truth commissions, trading pardons for honesty about past racial crimes, and supported the all-white national rugby team to a 1995 world championship, though it had long symbolized elitist racism. Mandela risked life and freedom and showed mercy and forgiveness toward his tormentors, and then he helped lead others to do the same. Leading by example, he modeled his vision for a peaceful future in South Africa.

Theodore Roosevelt, the 26th president of the United States, is remembered for his charisma and effective leadership. He overcame the adversity of a sickly childhood with asthma, believing anyone could achieve greatness if pursued with determination. He led his life with the intent to encourage others to follow, never asking people to do anything he was not willing to do himself. One of his most impressive examples of leadership occurred during the Spanish American War. Leading his troops into battle, he placed himself in the front line, closest to the danger. After he was elected President, he led by example destroying the gas monopoly of Standard Oil, championing construction of the Panama Canal, and founding the national park system, all despite serious resistance and controversy. He put others' lives before his own, remained open to learn from others, and led boldly with vision. His effectiveness and personal example of rugged individualism helped leave legacies that last to this day. Mother Teresa, my favorite leader, was a sweet, caring woman. At the age of 36, she felt God was calling her to care for the poor in India. After learning a few basic medical skills, she set out in 1948 to care for the neediest people in Calcutta. Unfortunately, she had very little experience, and she herself was constantly hungry and even had to beg for food. Her selfless heart persuaded about 12 other women to lend a hand, eventually forming the Missionaries of Charity group. She was content in poverty and was never above doing the most menial work, including cleaning toilets and drains. She cared for the sick, taught the uneducated, nurtured the dying, and founded orphanages, soup kitchens, schools, counseling centers, and medical clinics over five decades. Mother Teresa won the Nobel Prize for Peace and the Medal of Freedom, yet despite global influence of her work, she was remarkable for personally attending to the needs one person at a time and modeling that human focus for others. Like a good leader she persevered, even when no one would help her, and led others to serve by her example.

Nelson Mandela, Theodore Roosevelt and Mother Teresa are my role models, they led with bravery, thoughtfulness, passion, confidence and sacrifice. By presenting these qualities as examples for others, they demonstrated that anyone can shine his or her light and make a difference if wholeheartedly leading by example. It is fiction to believe one can motivate others for very long talking the talk but not walking the walk. One must inspire others through the reality of one's example. Mandela wrote, "A leader...plants seeds, and then watches, cultivates, and harvests... {A} leader must take responsibility for what he cultivates," and as for whether his examples took root, "I am fundamentally an optimist."


Save the Date! October 29 is reserved for a Cookout with the Kids.





Childhood Cancer Campaign



Congratulations to the Wilson Golden Circle Club for the completion of their "End of Treatment Bells" project. The first of the two bells was installed in a ceremony at



the James and Connie Maynard Children's Hospital in Greenville, NC in July. To fit the nautical theme of the hospital, it is housed in a lighthouse that is located behind the front desk of the Pediatric Oncology Department. At the presentation ceremony five patients and their families rang the bell for the staff and visitors. These children who are ages one year old to teenagers have completed their treatments for different forms of childhood cancer. Three local TV stations were there to record the ceremony and broadcast it on the evening news. The second light house bell was installed in the inpatient section of the hospital in August. Many thanks to the club and to Rickie Wester for his help designing the lighthouses to display the bells. To highlight the bell, each lighthouse is lit by a light fixture donated by a local lighting store. To help fund the project, the club applied

for and received a \$500 grant from the OI Childhood Cancer Campaign.

The Chapel Hill and Northern Wake Clubs have been cooking meals at the Ronald McDonald House in Chapel Hill. Since the expansion of the facility more help is needed staffing the two kitchens serving those in residence. Northern Wake is also planning another therapy doll project with the local school children in support of the Childhood Cancer Campaign and the patients at Duke and UNC Hospitals.

The rain held off during the visit of the Chapel Hill Optimist Club and the Chapel Hill Woodturners Club who joined the kids and staff at Camp Kaleidoscope for an afternoon of fun. Each child was given a couple finger-tops to decorate and play with while the wood turners demonstrated their skills making more tops. The kids were treated to a watermelon party and tested their skills at the seed spitting distance and accuracy targets. Prizes for all participants were passed out after dinner. These children have all been patients at Duke Hospital for life threatening illnesses. The camp has three different age groups that attend for a week each during July. This is a time to be a kid again and not be limited by their illnesses. The staff members are all Duke medical personnel who can take care of the kids if they have a health issue. Being homesick is not a problem. They participate in all the camp activities along with the girl scouts attending Camp Graham.

Please join the fun and support our Yellow Duck Race at the hotel Lazy River on Saturday at 4:00pm. Monetary prizes will be awarded to the first, second and third ducks that finish the race. A special prize will be



awarded to the duck that finishes last. Tickets can be purchased up until the race starts. The proceeds from the race benefit the OI Childhood Cancer research fund at Johns Hopkins Medical Center. This year we will have a limited number of duck available so buy your duck tickets early.




