- 4. **Acquire lists of candidates.** Potential Youth Club members can come from schools, churches, Boys & Girls Club, Boy Scouts & Girl Scouts, school bands, sport teams Oratorical or Essay contests, etc. You can contact students through other community organizations.
- 5. **The Result?** You are 100% ready to start your Youth Club. when your youth, your Club, and your community are excited about the exciting new endeavor.

This is a simplified list of what it takes to get started. Optimist International has many publications with details and tips for success. The key is to get started!



Effective October 1, 2017, there will be a new logo for Optimist International. Information containing templates are being distributed to all district governors and secretary-treasurers and each club and district should plan not to get rid of those items bearing the older logo but begin using the new logo on all letterhead, new banners, and other future items.

Growth will be the "FOCUS" for all regions so new clubs will need to be formed and new members recruited. Optimist International is dedicated to having 100,000 members by OI's 100th Anniversary in 2018. OI Teams will be made available to each region and district to assist district new club building, membership, and club fitness chairs with this challenge.

Per OI President Jim Kondrasuk in the February 2017 Hotline —

We have committed to "The Year of the Honor Club." Obtaining Honor Club status will keep our Clubs healthy, active, and fun. All Clubs should make every effort to achieve that status. Honor Club should be the minimum level of service for any Optimist Club.

A new initiative is underway to help our existing Club base: the Social, Service and Young Professionals Group. The Social, Service and Young Professionals Group is a "Club within a Club" concept. This group of Members would be Members of your Club,

volunteer for your projects, and show on your roster. Check with your Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Vice President if you have questions. As an added bonus, Club, Zone and District are awarded new Club building credit if 15 Members are added. We have a couple of clubs already pursuing a "Club within a Club;" I will be happy to speak with you about this for your club.

Every Optimist has received an email about sponsoring new Members. It is hard to believe, but about 80% of our existing membership base has never sponsored a new Member. Here is your opportunity to add a friend, family member, or co-worker to your Club. A special drawing will take place during each of the three remaining quarters of the 2016-17 Optimist Year. Please keep in mind the District and Ol Incentives as your clubs/district strives to be Honor and/or Distinguished. Review the incentives and be aware of the many tools available to accomplish your goals and objectives.

NC East District #1 in Optimist Golf

Our 2017 Junior Golf OPTIMIST Qualifiers should prove to be our best ever. I'll spare you of all the background information as to how Optimist International got involved with junior golf, and how this program has truly become Optimist International's signature project. I've reported to you in the last few months how NC East has become the premier District in the world in our Optimist Junior Golf program. I recently provided our District's club officers with lots of Optimist junior golf information concerning our qualifying golf tournaments and how to get kids in your communities involved in Optimist Golf.

Over the years that I have been involved with working with our young golfers, I have found one fact that cannot be ignored. Young people who play golf are some of the brightest, respectful and appreciative kids that you will ever encounter. These young people are passionate about the game of golf and have positive attitudes beyond belief. Optimism prevails with this group of young athletes.

In the past Optimist Districts held a golf tournament for young golfers with the best who met certain scoring criteria advancing to the Opti-

mist International Junior Golf Championships. Over the past few years there have been several nuances in the makeup of Optimist qualifying tournaments and the significance of Optimist Golf to our organization. Many districts have had significant decreases in the number of participants in their District Qualifiers. Optimist International created the "Optimist Tour" which provided another avenue through which young golfers could qualify for THE OPTIMIST. Many districts aligned themselves with other junior golf organizations like the PGA Junior program and various other independent "golf tours".

We will offer four qualifiers to better serve the young golfers in our district. This year NC East is partnering with two of the best junior golf tours. The North Carolina Junior Golf Foundation is a well-run junior golf organization that features some of the region's best boy golfers from 12 to 18 years old. The Peggy Kirk Bell Girls Golf Tour is the largest girl's tour in the United States. We are honored to be able to work with these fine organizations to bring Optimist Golf to hundreds of young golfers. We also will feature a "traditional" 18-hole District Qualifier where both boy and girl golfers in all seven of Optimist International's age divisions are encouraged to participate. We will not just have the most junior golfers playing in our qualifiers than any of Optimist International's Districts; we will have the best fields of golfers anywhere. Our tournament schedule is provided below.

I hope that all NC East District clubs will assist the young golfers of their communities in learning about Optimist Golf and how they can participate in one of the world's best junior golf events. I encourage our clubs and Optimist members to let me be of assistance in making sure your area's kids are served. Your club can support NC East Optimist Junior Golf through sponsoring golfers and making financial contributions to help pay the expenses to operate our tournaments. You can also serve these kids by helping out and volunteering to work at one of our tournaments.




timist International and this would certainly not be possible without your help.


I recommend the following goals for all of our





