
Lastly, this year's Convention will feature a silent auction that will end Saturday night. All the proceeds have been designated to go the Boys and Girls





I'm hoping to have better news to report for our 4th quarter push. It's never too late to help and impact the lives of the 30 plus kids for each new member we recruit.





INFORMATION OF WHAT IS REQUIRED TO BUILD A J.O.I. CLUB

You may charter a Junior Optimist International Club with only eight Junior Optimist International Members. There is a one-time enrollment fee of \$50, an annual registration fee of \$60 and membership dues are as follows: \$8 per member per year for Alpha Clubs and \$10 per member per year for Junior Optimist and Octagon Clubs. The registration and member fees are prorated depending on the month you charter the Junior Optimist International Club. Also, Junior Optimist International Clubs are only required to pay for the first 50 members.

HOW PGI WORKS

When you enroll in the program, you will receive a passport from the District Chair or your club. Enter your name and club number on the front of your passport. As a member completes a step, either the club president or secretary/ treasurer (for levels 1-7) and for levels (8-10) the District Governor or Lt. Governor initials the steps on the passport.

When an entire level is completed, the proper club or district representative should fill out, sign and date the recognition form. The club then sends the form to the district director of Personal Growth, or directly to Optimist International, attention Jackie Moore, for processing.

Optimist International will forward the appropriate pin backings to the District Director of the PGI to be awarded at the next District meeting or convention.



Childhood Cancer Campaign

District Newsletter Article 4th Quarter 2016-17

CHILDHOOD CANCER CAMPAIGN

In July, the Optimist Club of Chapel Hill joined the thirty five children and Duke medical staff at Camp Kaleidoscope for a watermelon party. Several seed

spitting contests “pitted” campers against their councilors for the title of Champion “Long Distance Seed Spitter” and “Most Accurate Seed Spitter”. Prizes and watermelon were enjoyed by all.

There are several good news stories about childhood cancer. The survival

rates for many forms of childhood cancer have continued to rise. Recently a new method of treatment has been featured in Time Magazine. The August 21, 2017 edition has an article about one new treatment that has shown a 90% remission rate. This latest development in immunotherapy uses an infusion of the patients’ own immune cells that have been modified to attack and destroy the cancer cells unique to the patient. The immune cells are called CAR T cells (chimeric antigen receptor T cells). The FDA is expected to soon approve this treatment as an accepted standard treatment for children with cer-

tain leukemias, such as the most common childhood cancer, acute lymphoblastic leukemia.



The cost of treating a child for childhood cancer is about \$500,000 over 3 to 5 years. The cost of cancer care in the US is over \$120 billion per year.

We celebrate the end of this Optimist year with The Little Yellow Duck Race for Childhood Cancer. The funds raised will be donated to the Optimist leukemia vaccine research project at Johns Hopkins. Join us as we cheer on our favorite ducks toward the finish line. There will be monetary prizes and last place honors for the winners.

Thank you to all the Optimist Club members in our district who support the children, their families, and the hospital staff who are battling childhood cancer every day. Your support means so much, no matter how small.




Our District is very generous when it comes to donating to the Foundation, but we are behind on our donations this year. Our goal is \$20,900 and we are

also thanked the Goldsboro club once again, for hosting this year's third quarter District meeting and Oratorical contest.


The meeting was adjourned at 1:20 p.m.
