HOW PGI WORKS

When you enroll in the program, you will receive a passport from the District Chair or your club. Enter your name and club number on the front of your passport. As a member completes a step, either the club president or secretary/treasurer (for levels 1-7) and for levels (8-10) the District Governor or Lt. Governor initials the steps on the passport.

When an entire level is completed, the proper club or district representative should fill out, sign and date the recognition form. The club then sends the form to the district director of Personal Growth, or directly to Optimist International, attention Jackie Moore, for processing.

Optimist International will forward the appropriate pin backings to the District Director of the PGI to be awarded at the next District meeting or convention.





Greetings NC East District

I am pleased to report to you that we have concluded our 2017-2018 Junior Golf Qualifying Tournament Schedule. We have once again made significant gains in the number of young golfers who participated in our 2017-2018 OPTIMIST Qualifiers over the previous Optimist year. Again this year, the NC East District will have the most participants (376) in its Qualifiers than any Optimist District in the world. We also had the first known OPTI-MIST District Qualifier in the United States that was held in the fall

(November 4-5, 2017). Three (3) of our six (6) OPTIMIST Qualifiers this Optimist year were held at UNC Finley Golf Course in Chapel Hill. It is clear from the participation at Finley that young golfers like that venue. Not unlike other Optimist Districts, we partnered with other junior golf organizations on five (5) of our six (6) District Qualifiers. We also held a traditional OPTIMIST Qualifier much like in the day of past Junior Golf Chairmen Carlton Baird and Jerry Medlin. Best described, the traditional Qualifier is one in which an Optimist District's Clubs enter young golfers from their communities. In the past golf tournament expenses and awarding of winner's cost to participate in the Optimist International Junior Golf Championships (the OPTIMIST) in Florida were funded primarily by monies from Clubs. Times have changed. There are hundreds more Junior Golf tournaments now than at the OP-TIMIST's inception in 1978. Junior Golf has become big business. Optimist International possesses a history and commitment to produce the best International Junior Golf Tournament in the World. NC East District is committed to see that Optimist International's stake in junior golf remains of value to both the Optimist organization and especially to young golfers everywhere.

The NC East District's Junior Golf Committee is most grateful to those Clubs that gave youth from their communities the opportunity to participate in a NC East OPTI-MIST Qualifier. We fear, however, that without more participation by NC East Clubs through entering golfers in our traditional Qualifier or donating funds to assist in the running of the tournaments that our District may go the way of the Capital Virginia District and other districts that



have eliminated their traditional Qualifier. This would be most unfortunate.

Providing opportunities for more young golfers to participate in Optimist International's largest project....Junior Golf.....is what your Junior Golf Committee believes in and is the reason for working toward growing our Qualifiers. Currently, NC East District has been allotted more Qualifying Spots for the OPTIMIST than any other District. Our venues are the best in Optimist International. These are several of the reasons why we have been successful in attracting young aspiring golfers residing inside and outside our District to come and participate in a NC East event. Young golfers, parents and spectators learn about OPTIMISM by attending a Qualifier in the NC East District. This year alone, we had junior golfers from many countries come to NC East to earn their spot to play in the Championships in Florida at PGA National----Thailand, China, Philippines, Canada, Hungary and Norway. NC East is the "international" in Optimist International. We had kids from New Hampshire, Delaware and New Jersey to Louisiana and Florida. A total of nine states were represented in NC East tournaments. NC East Golf is about American "Southern" hospitality. We anticipate that our NC East delegation of golfers going to Florida will be the largest in the world as was the case last year.

from 10 to 18 and come from Henderson, Greenville, Goldsboro and points in between. Congratulations to the Finalists and Good Luck!


The winner of our District Contest in addition to winning a \$2500 scholarship moves on to the Optimist Regional/World Championships and a chance to win up to \$22,500.




oncology departments.

Jan, my wife, taught school for thirty four years. She always tells me "the more you write, the less they read". After almost sixty years, I'm going to listen to her this time. I have been talking about how good the OI Foundation is for our organization. I still feel the same way about the Foundation and I hope our regular member donors and our clubs continue to donate as they have in the past.

This year my main push is to increase the number of Dime-A-Day donors. For \$36.50. one dime per day for 365 days, you can join this group. At the end March, we had 64 Dime-A-Day members, compared to a total of 62 last year. My goal is to get at least 100 Dime-A-Day members this year, but I can't do it without your help. If you haven't joined, please do so and talk to your club members about joining. If you have already joined, THANK YOU, and please talk to your other club members about joining.

Golden Circle to Receive \$500 OI Foundation Grant

OI Foundation has approved a \$500 matching grant for Golden Circle's "Darden Youth Improvement" project. The check will be presented to the club at the upcoming District Convention in Ottawa, Canada.

Golden Circle has recently joined with other local civic organizations as partnership partners to improve the school environment of Darden Middle School. This school has been recognized as a priority school by the Federal Government based on their performance on mandated testing procedures and the socio/economics dynamics of the 98% minority student population. It is the purpose of the involved organizations to advance academia, athletics, selfmotivation, respect, good-stewardship, beautification, and parental involvement. The club plans to recognize students who are scholars, athletes, exhibit leadership, respect for themselves, and regular attendance. The club plans to work with grades 6-9 (app. 300 students).

The club plans to help finance an annual Academic Banquet, to provide grading period awards and celebrations and to assist with "Doughnuts for Dads" and "Muffins for Moms" to help encourage parental involvement.

The club has just started to work on this project and will continue throughout this Optimist year and possibly future Optimist years. I believe that we have received "a calling" to help the children attending Darden Middle School, which is located in

one of the poorest communities in our area. These children often have parents who do not or cannot be involved in their young lives. Many of their parents are in low paying jobs and may have to work 2 or more jobs to provide for their family. Other parents may have issues which keep them from being involved in their children's lives. We believe that if our community "steps up" we can make a difference in most of these children's lives and help them to make their futures better and brighter.

Golden Circle plans to put time and "sweat equity" into this school and its children. Golden Circle members are very grateful for the matching grant from the OI foundation.

In the five years Thomas Academy has been in operation, we have a 100% graduation rate! This is great success for our children.

Committee Reports

A &A - Chairman Dan Durham recognized the #1 club in each district. Zone 1- Wilmington/Cape Fear, Zone 2-Laurinburg, Zone 3-Wilson Golden Circle, Zone 4-Roanoke Rapids, Zone 5-Henderson, and Zone 6-S. Johnston. The top three Lt. Governors were 3- Ed Taylor, 2- Russell Leake, and 1-J. G. Baker

Boys & Girls Home- Chairman Gary Pender thanked everyone for their support at the auction. Ray Cockrell gave a pep talk for the Home and stressed how important the time folks have spent on the campus is to the kids. The Garner club donated a Foosball table which has really been used and enjoyed. Three clubs received plaques for their contributions to the Home. 3- Henderson (\$1,700), 2- Laurinburg (\$4,030), and 1- North Raleigh (\$5,000). Almost \$2,000 was received during the Altar Call.

Childhood Cancer –Trish Verne showed a care pack of items needed to help kids get through chemo. She challenged clubs to put together 2 packets per club and provided lists of these items. N. Wake is still working in schools to make 165 Therapy dolls w/get well cards on them. Several clubs are also supporting Ronald McDonald House by providing meals as well as other types of assistance. Remember that June is Childhood Cancer month. Kid-Kaleidoscope will be after July 4 and is always a fun time for kids. We will also be doing the ducks again at Myrtle Beach.

CCDH—According to Angela Iwaniuk, there will be an event at the School for the Deaf involving a \$2500 scholarship. Contestants are needed for this event.

JOOI — Angela reported that Sara Robbins is heading up a JOOI Club at Fike High School. They have been collecting books for needy kids and working at the Ronald McDonald House. She is encouraging kids to attend the International Convention in Ottawa.

Club Fitness – Angela reported that the deadline for filing a 990 was February 15. There is a May 20 deadline for roster of next year's officers and OI Rep. She encouraged all clubs present to get dues paid on time.

Essay Contest – David Bast has no essays submitted yet and the deadline is in a few days.. Several clubs responded that they will be submitting essays by the deadline. This is an excellent chance for kids to win a \$2500 scholarship.

Oratorical Contest—Errol Warren stated that kids in every community want an opportunity to speak their minds. This year's topic is "Where Are My Roots of Optimism?". Names of zone winners are needed by April 27. The district Oratorical Contest will be held on May 12 in Goldsboro at the 3rd Quarter District

meeting. There is a \$23,000 scholarship at the top level.

OI Foundation — Billy Edgerton presented the Dime a Day awards (print and banner patch) to the Goldsboro and Henderson clubs. There was almost \$850 raised at last night's auction, half of which got the OI Foundation and half to the Boys and Girls Home. Several generous contributions came in during the 'altar call'.

New Club Building — Sandy Cyphers congratulated J. G. Baker for his role in the forming of a new club in Lillington. This is the first new club in our district since 2014. The goal is to build 3 new clubs this year, so one down and two to go! The best possible service project is to build a new club. A fairly new concept is called a Club within a Club. This involves recruiting 15 members to the club who have to meet at a separate time or place. They must work on a new, specific project but are still considered a part of the original club. All 15 members have to be added on the same day and all must be at least 18 years old.

Jimmy Lamm, District Convention Chairman, encouraged everyone to attend the meeting in Myrtle Beach, SC this year. It will be held on September 6-9 at Beach Cove again. The deadline for registering is Aug. 6. Any group meals should be 2-4 dollars cheaper per person this year.

Lou Anna Hardee, OI Vice-President of Mid-Atlantic Region, began with the following rally cry that was echoed by those in attendance.
