But the numbers don't tell the real story. The children who come to Boy's and Girl's Homes often arrive scared, hurt and hungry. When a teaching parent reaches out, lets a child know that he or she is loved and that someone will care for them, that is a life-changing experience. Each time that I visit the campus I hear stories of lives turned around, of children who have been given more than food and shelter, children who have been given hope and a chance to have a good life.


MEET ME IN ST. LOUIS"







Presidential Freedom Scholarships are Available to US Optimist Clubs.

OI has recently learned of a scholarship program that might be beneficial to young people in your community. The Corporation for National and Community Service is owned by the USD Government and awards \$500 matching scholarships to students in conjunction with local groups.

The Corporation offers scholarships to students, provided there is matching fund from an organization such as ours. One of the goals of the Corporation is to build and strengthen the concept of volunteerism and community service—totally in line with optimism.

The Corporation is funded \$5 million, or enough for 10,000 scholarships each year.

The scholarships are available to students who have been impartially selected by their high school and may be either a junior or senior, complete 100 hours of leadership in community service, write a brief essay on a topic selected by the Corporation and receive a matching \$500 from your club. Two students from every high school in the nation may receive these awards.
