### **Message from Governor Ray Cockrell**

game-changer for our clubs and will keep members engaged.

Communication it is not enough just to develop the plan. Coaches must make the time in their crazy schedule and the team's



tight timelines to ensure everyone knows the goals and targets for the season and the plan for each game. Success is based on everyone working together, moving in the same direction, focused on the same goal. Stronger together! Are we as Optimist communicating with our clubs and members? Are we working to ensure they know the goal, the direction and the plan? Let's communicate

to ensure we are all in the know and then we can truly be stronger together.

**Motivation** – It is not enough for a coach simply to develop a game plan and tell everyone what the plan is – the coach has to sell the plan. The entire team must buy in to the direction the team is moving. That doesn't just happen automatically. The coach must exhibit energy and sell the plan. Everyone needs to be motivated so they have the same core belief in the plan and direction. Are we as Optimist motivating our members. Are we energetic and persuasive so that our clubs and members buy into the work we are doing for kids? Believe! Motivate!

Rookie Mindset – we have talked about this before. How does a 10- or 15-year veteran approach the season? Yes - they still believe, and they are still motivated to be successful. They bring experience and knowledge that are extremely valuable. How does a rookie player approach the season? They are hungry! They are highly motivated! A rookie has a personal drive and is eager to show everyone – especially the coaches – they deserve to be there. They work long and hard to ensure their success and the success of the team. Are we as Optimist hungry? Are we determined to carry out our plan and be successful. Let's all, regardless of how long we have been Optimists, work to adopt that rookie mindset.

Whether we are still talking about football or the tremendously positive work we are doing as Optimists, these ideas can help to make us all better. Never stop getting better! I look forward to spending time with all of you as we gather in Roanoke Rapids.



## **Boys & Girls Homes Linda Shepherd – Golden Circle, Elm City**





### OPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION CLUB PASS THROUGH GRANT PROGRAM GUIDELINES

If your Optimist Club is seeking grant funds or contributions for funding of your charitable community service projects or other charitable, literary or educational programs, you may request the assistance of Optimist International Foundation (OIF) as a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. This program is only available in the United States. Please follow the guidelines below to qualify for the Club Pass Through Grant Program.

- Complete the OIF Pass Through Grant Application and mail or fax to the Optimist International Foundation.
- If you are trying to secure a grant from a corporation or foundation that has their own Grant Application Form, please complete any information pertaining the Club (but leave the 501(c)(3) signature section blank) and forward that to OIF. We will complete the information regarding the 501(c)(3) and attach any documents that may be necessary. We will mail the completed form and documents to the corporation/foundation/grantor.
- Checks received from corporations/foundations/ grantors must be made payable to "Optimist International Foundation." OIF will deposit the check and issue a check to the Club for the amount received after the check

has cleared the OIF bank. Unless otherwise directed, the check will be sent to the Club officer who signed the



• The Club must report to OIF a final accounting of all grant funds received, using the form that will be mailed with the OIF check issued to the Club. OIF cannot proceed with any further Club Pass Through Grants for the Club until a final report is received from the Club.

### Please note:

The amount of funds qualifying for this program is \$100 or more per Donor/grantor. OIF cannot process Pass Through gifts that are property or real estate. (See "Is It a Charitable Income Tax Contribution Deduction" for more information.)

• Recognition Items are not applicable with Pass Through Grant funds.

### Oratorical Contest Timothy Johnson

As you may already know, Optimist International sponsors three scholarship contests for students to earn money to pursue opportunities in higher education: the Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (CCDHH), the Essay Contest and the Oratorical Contest. The contests are conducted at the Club level, then Zone and Regional (if necessary) and at the District level. District-level scholarships are funded by the Optimist International Foundations and awarded by Optimist International.

The Topic for the 2024-2025 Optimist year is: "How Optimism Has Guided Me Through Trying Times."

The contest is open to contestants under the age of 19 as of October 1st of the current Optimist International contest year (October 1 – September 30) and who have not yet completed high school. There is no minimum age.


Interested students submit a speech on the preassigned topic to their local Optimist Club. To find out the contact in your area, please e-mail the District Oratorical Chairperson, Timothy Johnson, at NCEastZone6LtGovernor@gmail.com.

The deadline to enter is determined by the sponsoring Optimist Club. All Club-level contests are typically held by late March, so that the District Contest can be held at our 3rd Quarter District Gathering.

Districts and Clubs may opt to hold an online Oratorical Contest. Please contact our District Oratorical Chair Timothy Johnson for guidance on holding an online contest. The Optimist Oratorical Contest gives young people the chance to speak to the world. More than \$150,000 in college scholarships funded by the Optimist International Foundations is awarded annually from this program.



First conducted in 1928, this is the second most popular Optimist International Program. Nearly 2,000 clubs participate in this program each year. The winners at the Club level receive medallions and Zone winners receive a plaque. Districts have the opportunity to provide a first place scholarship of \$2,500, a second place scholarship of \$1,500, and a third place scholarship of \$1,000.
