Communications Contest for the Deaf & Hard of Hearing



I know over the years you've heard all the hoopla about growing your clubs, etc., but it's for good reason. Our organization needs our leadership in supporting our youth through our various programs.





Appoint an OI Foundation representative for your club and make a non-restricted donation to the OI Foundation.

Two Club officers attend at least 2 Quarterly District meetings or one District convention during the year.

Elect your new club officers and report their names to OI by May 20,2020.

Complete your club pride report no later than October 10, 2020.

Your club can be distinguished if you accomplish the above items AND grow your club by plus 15 members by the end or the year OR build one or more new Optimist clubs.



International Junior Golf Championships

North Carolina East Optimist District Junior GolfLeading the way

It has been my great pleasure and privilege to have served the NC East District for the past five (5) Optimist years in promoting Optimist International's Flagship program. Heading into my sixth consecutive year as District Golf Chair, I take this opportunity to reflect on our District's successes in serving young aspiring golfers while promoting the Optimist brand.

(300%) to 88 golfers.

For the past four (4) years NC East has lead Optimist International in the total number of young golfers playing in Optimist District Qualifiers. (2016: 274 golfers; 2017: 284 golfers; 2018: 279 golfers, 2019: 311 golfers). We have increased NC East golfer participation by one thousand per cent (1000%). Last year, one of every ten golfers (10%) who played in all Optimist International District Qualifiers were from a NC East Qualifier. With the increase in our District golfer participation we have been able to offer more young golfers opportunity to make the trip to Florida to build lasting memories.

We started in 2015 with just a few qualifying spots/ exemptions and having had only thirty (31) golfers participate in our 2014 NC East Qualifier. Outstanding golfers were unable to participate in the OPTI-MIST International Junior Golf Championships in Florida due to our lack of spots to offer. Our goal from 2015 to date has been to simply provide the opportunity for young golfers to participate in an OPTIMIST District Qualifier, and to give more NC East District golfers the opportunity to meet kids from all over the world in competing in OI's great and historic golf tournament. In that first year we increased golfer participation almost by three hundred percent

Our goal has been to put these young golfers in a position to earn their place in Florida at the OPTI-MIST. We are about OPPORTUNITY.

We have tweaked our District Qualifier opportunities by trying various strategies that have put NC East District as a leader in OPTIMIST Junior Golf. From placing the District in the position to raise funds through donations memorializing a past Optimist member to the development of partnerships with excellent non-profit junior golf organizations, NC East District is recognized for our progress in supporting youth.

We have accomplished this with very little money.

Our focus has been on providing kids opportunity....not on raising money. In 2019, no golfer or their parents paid the NC East District one dime for golfer entry fees. Over the past five years we have fed hamburgers and hot dogs to hundreds of young golfers and their families at NC East Junior Golf events.

It is rewarding to know that you have made an impact on a young person. Over the past five years, I have received numerous cards, texts, and emails from young golfers and their parents. The NC East District has made a difference for many kids. We have had several of the best golfers in the world play in NC East District Qualifiers in recent years. We have had many golfers recognized for their play at the OPTIMIST. Last year we were honored to have our Haley Quickel win the Girls 15-18 Year Age Division at Doral. College coaches come to NC East Qualifiers to recruit players. We have NC East golfers playing at all divisions/levels of College golf. There is little more special to me than to hear a parent of one of these college golfers say that we (NC East OPTIMIST Junior Golf) is what got their child excited about playing golf competitively. NC East District provides OPPORTUNITY.

Beyond promoting junior golf, we have had the opportunity to spread the word about Optimism and Optimist International. Hundreds of kids and their parents and grandparents have learned about our organization through NC East District golf events. I would like to thank the NC East Optimist Clubs who have stepped up to volunteer at a NC East Qualifier. Last year, a total of eleven (11) NC East Optimist Clubs were represented in providing volunteers. Junior Golf is NC East District's largest district-wide program. We would like to offer all Optimist members the opportunity to help out these kids. Let me know if you want to make a difference.

OI FOUNDATION

It is my honor to serve as your District OI Foundation Representative this year. Thank you for this opportunity. Also thank you Club Reps for volunteering to assist me in this endeavor.

Simply put the Goal of the OI Foundation is to solicit, collect and safeguard money. That money then funds the programs so important to our Clubs and District.

In 2017-2018,

- The OI Foundation supported the 2018 Oratorical Contest by awarding **\$65,000** in scholarship funding.
- 126 students went off to College with Optimist Oratorical, Essay and CCDHH scholarships totaling \$358,000.
- The Foundation contributed \$53,420 towards the OI Research Fellowship at Johns Hopkins plus an additional \$77,000 toward a new research effort on pediatric bone marrow transplants.
- \$366,399 was awarded to 21 clubs in the form of Club Grants
- General OI grants for childhood cancer, disaster relief, the *Optimist* Magazine, convention training and development totaled **\$551,000**

In fact, according to the annual Report the total funding for 2017-2018 was **\$1,637,000**.

Our District has a long history of giving to the Foundation and it is through your generosity that the expenses for these programs are met.

The motto for this year's fundraising effort is "Go for the Gold". Throughout history gold has been the standard for excellence. We all want that gold medal or gold star and what better way to achieve that than by making a contribution to Helping Optimists Help Kids.

There are many ways to contribute to the Foundation.

- Your club may "honor" or "in memory of" a veteran with a \$100 donation.
- You can become a "Friend of Today" by making a mini-

mum donation of \$500 annually and receive a signed and numbered collector's print.

- "Go for the Gold" by having your Club contribute \$365 (\$1.00 per day)
- Individually, spare a "**Dime a Day"** and contribute \$36.50 to the Foundation.
- Contribute \$250.00 and become a member of the **Presidents Club**. Make a statement that you are dedicated to the future of Optimism
- Become a **Christian D. Larson Partner** with your \$1,000 contribution. Or Clubs make a \$1,000 contribution in recognition of someone in your Club who embodies the tenets of our Creed.
- William H. Harrison Society. Become a member with Life to Date giving of \$10,000 or more and annual contribution of \$1,000.
- Research has shown that women give where they believe they make a difference. In support of the Foundation and because women bring a different perspective to their giving the **Woman's Philanthropy Council** was formed. The giving circle of the Women's Philanthropy Council begins with a minimum gift of \$100.

Welcome to Boys and Girls Homes – the safe haven for hurting and abused children and the home of your Optimist Cottage. We are honored to have you back on our campus to celebrate Optimism.

Optimists Make a Difference! These words have never been more true as your Optimist Cottage is serving kids and on the cutting edge of new programming for Boys and Girls Homes. A few weeks ago our campus population dropped and staffing was a challenge. We had needs to do some renova-

tions in the Jaycees and Civitan Cottages. The Optimist Cottage was able to extend a welcoming hand to house those residents while updates were made to their cottage.

On the cutting edge. Two new programs that are coming to B&GH are providing a common space for siblings – allowing siblings to stay together as a family. The second new program is providing a home for children of mothers who are going through sub-

stance abuse recovery. We already have a sibling group of three boys – ages 10, 8 and 6 who are in the cottage now. We are seeking to grow this program.

In March we will be partnering with the Brunswick County Recovery Center. They will open a residential program for women with substance abuse addictions. Often these women have children and we will be providing a home for these kids while their mother is in recovery. The Optimist Cottage will the home for this program.

For many years, the Optimist Cottage has been helping meet the needs of hurting children. We continue to do that today and will be meeting the needs of children well into the future. Thank you for all you do for our children!

Childhood Health & Wellness

Where do we stand in our efforts to cure childhood cancer? There is some good news and some not so good news. Government funding for cancer research totaled \$5.6 billion in 2017 .For pediatric cancers and other sub types it was about 6.2% or about \$352 million. In 2018, funding for the fiscal year 2019, the National Institute of Health was budgeted \$39.1 billion. And the National Cancer Institute was to receive \$6.14 billion for the STAR Act, enacted in June 2018. The Cancer Moon Shot project will receive \$100 million. This is a lot of funding for cancer research, but not a lot for childhood cancer research.

The STAR Act is the most comprehensive legislation designed to study Survivorship, Treatment, Access and Research for children affected by childhood cancer. It passed the House and Senate after years of hard work by many organizations that raise money for childhood cancer. It will need support in the future to ensure it is fully funded every year to move the research forward and create better lives for the kids that survive.

Optimist International teamed up with Johns Hopkins Sidney Kimmel Cancer Center's Division of Pediatric/Oncology in 2004. We raised over \$1million for research, and continue to support the mission to find a cure for pediatric cancer. Check out Ashley's story on the Johns Hopkins' web site entitled "Optimist International and Johns Hopkins- Partners in Curing Childhood Cancer". Ashley was treated at Johns Hopkins children's center for a rare form of leukemia. Today, Ashley and many more children are able to live healthy, happy lives thanks to the contributions from Optimist International and the excellent care teams throughout Johns Hopkins.

Three new therapies have been developed recently. Johns Hopkins Pediatric Oncology and UNC–Lineberger Cancer Hospital are two of the two dozen cancer centers in the U.S. that are administering CAR -T therapy for children. This is very effective for patients with the ALL form of leukemia. Another new

treatment is Proton therapy. It more precisely targets tumors and minimizes damage to healthy tissues around tumors. Patients are able to experience fewer short term side effects and long term complications, especially important for their young growing bodies. KYMRIAH is a



treatment that uses the patient's own white blood cells to treat non-Hodgkin's lymphoma.

Despite these successes we still do not have a vaccine or a cure. Drug development centers do not consider childhood cancer drugs profitable. This is highlighted by the disparity in funding and development of treatments designed for adults. Since 1980 fewer than ten drugs have been specially developed for childhood cancer, and only three have been approved. Clinical research is needed as ten thousand new cases in children occur each year. Over a million adults will develop cancer each year.

Her name is Lorelei Partin. She is seven years old and ready to be a kid again. She was treated for leukemia at UNC and celebrated her last treatment surrounded by family and the staff as she "rang the bell, three times well." Her mother, Katie Ware, is principal at Wiley Magnet School in Cary, NC. The bell was donated to the pediatric oncology clinic by the Optimist Club of Chapel Hill. Yes, we can make a difference in children's lives. The future of our communities is our children. Cancer is


complicated, but we are part of the solution, and conquering cancer is a team sport.


