

In November 1911 in Detroit racer Louis Chevrolet and General Motors founder Billy Duran e Chevrolet Motor Car Company; overtaking e United States by 1929. Ford as the best – selling car

The Phoenix is a symbol of immortality. It obtains new life by rising from the ashes of its predecessor.



Lincoln is an American luxury automobile brand, operated under the Ford Motor Company.

Edsel Ford picked the leaping greyhound to grace the hood of the Lincoln car.

Lyons (Jaguar) didn't start putting cats on the bonnets of his cars until almost a decade after Ford put dogs on their Lincolns. Lincoln started using greyhounds their radiator caps in the 1920s, and Fords would wear then in the early 1930s, also before eaper.

A Lincoln brochure, circa 1925 states:
