Jason followed her progress as she hurried into the building. Part of him wanted to go after her, hold her and say that he would take her any way that he could get her. But the other part of him realized that this was the best way for him to deal with everything. He just couldn't be around her without being *with* her. It wasn't in him anymore.

Author Q& A



Q: What is "The College Life Series" all about?

A:The College Life Series is a nine book series that follows the lives of five young black women as they make their journey through their four years of college at Paradise Valley University. Chasity Parker, the troubled beauty, Malajia Simmons, the party girl, Sidra Howard, the prim princess, Alex Chisolm, the self proclaimed "know-it-all", and Emily Harris, the shy mommy's girl are five main protagonists, thrown together by chance. Bring-

ing to college different voices, vastly different backgrounds, and different ways of confronting challenges. This series touches on different issues that affect college aged people; such as class pressure, family drama, personal drama, relationship issues, peer confrontations, discovery and friendship. This ill-assorted group discover in this new environment and through unlikely friendships who they are.

Q: What made you create this series?

A: I was seventeen years old when this concept came to me. I was sitting at my grandmothers computer and as usual, I started day dreaming. I was months away from graduating high school and was set to start college soon after, and I started thinking about what my college life would be like. From there, I created character names, added a description to each one and just started typing. The rest is history.

Q: Is any part of this series based off of your life? Which character do you identify with the most?

A: No, this series isn't based off of my life. I used my experience as a college student to develop storylines that readers of that age can identify with, but it's strictly a work of fiction. As far as which character that I identify most with...First let me say that I love all of my characters, and I see a little of myself in each one of their personalities. I can say that I identify with the character Chasity the most. She, like me is a loner, and very guarded with her emotions.

Q: Are you traditionally published or self-published? What made you go with your decision?

A: I am self-published. I decided to self-publish because the type of series that I am writing isn't really something that many traditional publishers or even agents are looking for. Or, I should say, it's not really well-know. As an African-American author, the biggest genre is urban or street-lit fiction and that is not the genre that I am writing in. Because I am so into my series and my characters, and didn't want to toss the story aside to write something that was popular, I decided to self-publish. I know that I have a great story concept and I wanted to get the books out any way possible.

Q: What are your plans for the remaining books in the series:

A: I'm in the process of finishing the first draft of book nine. I also plan on releasing book seven sometime this year
