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

But let's make it personal: Are you tired of coming home to a uninspiring space, but worried that crunchy granola or austere ubermodern eco-friendly design options might make it too cool to be comfortable? Think again. Today's sustainable design takes "reuse, reduce and recycle" to new heights in creativity and sophistication. This month, we feature a new crop of interior design mavens who think outside the box to prove that chic and eco-friendly go hand-inhand. Part Four of Five.

Eco-friendly and wellness guru **Robin Wilson** is a living, breathing interior design empire. She launched her New York design firm, Robin Wilson Home, in 2000, creating stunning, healthy eco-sanctuaries from the foundation to the furniture. Her client list boasts high-profilers such as the Clintons and the Kennedys, and she authored a book—*Kennedy Green House*—based on her part in Robert F. Kennedy Jr.'s house renovation. She is also the first woman to license her name for eco-friendly kitchen cabinetry.

Robin's philosophy centers on the big picture -- not just sustainable design, but how an eco-friendly home promotes wellness and health in our homes. She focuses on materials that are sustainable, reusable, recyclable and non-toxic. And in an effort for us to live well, she launched **The Nest Store**, a line of home products created from eco-friendly materials.

EcoStiletto: How did you get involved in sustainable design?

Robin Wilson: I started my company in 2000. I was involved in sustainable design before it was called sustainable design. From my early background in Austin, TX, I was aware of how the ecosystem in your homes and community are intertwined. Having suffered from allergies, it is my belief that the indoor air quality can affect one's health, and sustainable design can influence your environment, home and lifestyle.

ES: Your work has been described as "classic with a modern touch." Where do you get your inspiration?

RW: I love classic movies, architects like Paul R. Williams and Frank Lloyd Wright, and the fashion sense of people like Audrey Hepburn, Diahann Carroll and Lena Horne. The important thing to remember is that classic design is timeless.

ES: What eco-design elements did you use for Robert F. Kennedy Jr.'s house?

RW: I was part of a design team led by the client, two architects, a builder, and a project manager. And our focus was utilizing as much reclaimed materials of the old house as possible, while identifying products that could be recycled or up-cycled. So, the countertops from Eco by Cosentino came from recycled sinks, tubs and mirrors. John Yarema, our phenomenal custom flooring expert, reclaimed as much as the old floor as possible. We focused on the four principles of eco-friendly design: recyclable, reusable, sustainable and non-toxic. We used low-VOC Benjamin Moore paint and solar shingles, and hybrid hot water systems that create instant hot water so that you're not running the shower for 10 minutes to get warm.

You've done projects for high-profile clients. Who is one dream celebrity you would like to add to that list?

RW: I would love to design Tyler Perry's house. He is a phenomenal pioneer in his profession, and he wants to do a green house. And he is someone who will continue to influence future generations with his work and with his empowerment platform.

ES: Who's your eco-hero and why?

RW: Rachel Carson. She was the author of *Silent Spring*, which advanced the global environment movement that led to the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency.
