## Parent Information Page: Domestic Violence

A child's home should be their safe place, a place where they feel loved and secure. But for too many children, home is a place of fear and violence. Each year, hundreds of millions of children are exposed to domestic violence at home. Children who live with and are aware of violence in their homes, even when they are not victims themselves, face many challenges and risks that can last throughout their lives.

The brains of young children are in a constant state of growth and development. The emotional stress experienced by children in a home filled with fighting, screaming, and abuse can harm the development of their brains and impair cognitive and sensory growth. It can cause learning and attention problems in school, as well as making it difficult for these children to experience appropriate social relationships as they grow. The problems these children face often continue into adulthood.



#### SO WHAT CAN YOU DO?

First, if you are in danger, get away and call 9-1-1!

Second, if you are in an abusive relationship of any kind, please know that we are a safe place for you and your children and we are here to help. We will help you find a safe place to stay and whatever other resources you will need.

Finally, with national statistics showing that nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner, chances are great that you know someone who is in this situation. Knowing what resources are available could save someone's life.
