Invocation and Contemplation

Brief Check-in

Special Guest (2/26)

Mike Meyer from Eugene Climate Cafe: Mike is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker. His monthly Climate Cafes are community discussions on climate grief and anxiety, including strategies and group processing. It started from the "death cafe" idea. Community building, not isolation, is important for building resilience. He shared that climate change is having severe impacts on mental health, and it has become part of youth culture. Young people are tired of being told that they are the future; they need guidance and leadership from older people. He mentioned <u>Cascadia Quest</u>, which holds grief groups. Mike's email is <u>meyercounseling@gmail.com</u>. His Climate Cafes are held on the first Tuesday of the month (see events section).

Also discussed was climate justice and the fact that climate change affects the most vulnerable. It is estimated that there will be 1.2 billion climate refugees by 2050.

Updates and Continuing Issues

1. Eugene City Projects and Processes: Dennis mentioned Just Transition Alliance and Fossil Free Eugene. Eugene City Council voted to approve a fire fee for homeowners, a total of 8 million dollars, to address the budget gap. The <u>Sustainability Commission</u>'s education and outreach committee is looking for events to present on the <u>Climate Action Plan 2.0</u>. The Sustainability Commission will likely send a letter of concern about the proposed Astroturf at Golden Gardens to the City Council.

- **2. Local Organizations** **Local and state action is increasingly important at this time.
 - 350 Eugene: They are focusing on forest defense. The Forest Service is taking <u>public</u> <u>comment</u> on the NW Forest Plan. See also *Northwest Forest Plan Comment Writing Workshop* under Events and Ongoing Action.
 - Lookout Eugene-Springfield: They are already starting to post local news stories on their website. Carl suggested that we invite their community engagement person to an EK meeting.
 - Fossil Free Coalition: Students are initiating Fossil Free UO. The board has put off a decision about their heating system, the largest emitter of greenhouse gases in Eugene. The water based heat pump system is more expensive.
 - Sierra Club: They had a webinar on the threatened Coastal/Humboldt Martin. Also, see *Native Plant Sale* under Events and Ongoing Action.
 - Third Act: Patty and Linda from 350 Eugene shared at their monthly meeting. They committed to more communication between the two groups. See under Events and Ongoing Action for their next meeting.
 - Oregon Coalition for Environmental Rights (OCERA): No updates specific to OCERA.
 - Protect Lane County Watersheds: 14000 signatures have been gained for the Lane County initiative.
 - Divest Oregon: Lobby Day for the <u>PAUSE Act</u> was successful. Around 100 constituents spoke with 42 Senators and Representatives along with their aides. Senator Manning and Rep. Fragala agreed to be cosponsors, along with many others. EK leadership gave Britni permission to submit testimony on behalf of EarthKeepers. Tom offered to help. They are waiting for a committee hearing to be scheduled.

3. Interfaith Clergy United: Mark and Dennis would like to attend their meetings, but they are at the same time as EK meetings. It was decided to *change EK meetings to the fourth Wednesday of each month*. Both Stronger Together Interfaith Potlucks were full. The next potluck is March 9th from 5:30-7:30 at FCC. These first three meetings are for folks to get to know each other. After that, they will pivot toward action; for example, what to do about immigration and ICE.

4. Earth Day Planning: It was determined that there is too much going and no one has the bandwidth to plan an event. The Interfaith Clergy is considering a "Gratitude for the Earth" event near Thanksgiving.

5. Future Guests: Carl will invite someone from Lookout Eugene to the next meeting. Other ideas include Sarah from McKenzie River Trust and someone from OCERA.
