Drawdown Discussion: Eunice K discussed Composting and Biochar pages. Composting involves anything edible. Pits, like from avocados, and bones are usable. Even better is to avoid food waste because of the carbon pollution required for standard agricultural production, transportation and storage. Currently only about 40% of unused food products are composted. Biochar is charcoal used as a soil amendment and a carbon capture strategy. It endures in soil for thousands of years while enhancing fertility. It is remarkable because its micropore structure results in a huge surface area available for retaining water and nutrients.

The movie "A Fierce Green Fire", shown at First Christian Church, documented climate degradation and unsuccessful efforts in the past. Sponsored by the NAACP, it was well attended.

Civil disobedience discussed by Christa K. This strategy has arisen from many decades of failure of more traditional methods of protest. It is increasingly being considered by a few members of faith groups, with Extinction Rebellion having provided leadership by example in the financial district of London during the last global youth climate strike. Extinction Rebellion is pushing for a halt to biodiversity loss, carbon neutrality by 2025, and a citizens' assembly for discussion and decision making that is not occurring through routine governmental processes.
