

Things to help those left behind

- 1. Inventory List: Does not need to be super detailed but type of item and manufacturer are a plus. Value is always subjective.
- 2. Who gets all of my treasures?
- 3. A will is the most important thing to have overall. Secondary heir.
- 4. Who do I want to help my heir handle my collection?
- 5. Who do I NOT want to help with my stuff?
- 6. Now the person you chose to help should be able to offer your heir as much comfort and trust as they need. Things Like a contract, references from at least 2 or 3 others, inventory sheets of anything they may be removing from their possession (and not a sheet that says one box full of engines.) A solid payment time frame for items sold and that person should be able to show documentation of anything that was sold if asked. This is a great thing to set up way in advance.
- 7. Donation: This is a great option for some people, BUT beware of those who come around and the first thing out of their mouth is about donating to their club. We all have some valuable items that if sold would benefit our heirs. If items are to be donated an itemized list should be an absolute requirement, signed by at least 2 members of the board of the club.

The Hawthorne Army Depot Railroad Spurred another Modeling Project

Southeast of Carson City, Nevada, there is the largest munitions storage base in the world. It stands at 226 square miles or 147,000 acres. And it has its own railroad to serve its needs, which include 2427 bunkers storing 600,000 square feet of munitions and supplies. Near Highway 95 can be found the command headquarters, facilities and engineering shops for the base. To the east are the three ammunition storage and production areas all served by the railroad on base. This depot was established in 1930 as the Naval Ammunition Depot Hawthorne. In 1977 it was transferred to Army control. Like the Sierra Army Depot mentioned in the April issue of this WCMRRC newsletter, Hawthorne's High Desert climate makes it ideal for storage. The Hawthorne Army Railroad has a direct connection with the Union Pacific and the National Railway System.

The Depot's mission is to "stores conventional munitions, demilitarizes and disposes of unserviceable, obsolete and surplus munitions; and maintains serviceability through inspection and renovation to ensure munitions." With two.EMD GP10 locomotives (#1875 & #4643) and a fleet of freight cars the day we visited, including four types of box cars, open hoppers, gondolas, tank cars and flat cars, the base is well equipped to move munitions and supplies into and out of this facility.

On a trip our family took to Carson City in the spring of 1995 to enjoy a model railroad show and swap meet held at the Carson City Mall, put on by the local model railroad club, our family side tracked for an afternoon and drove down to Hawthorne, Nevada. Miles from Hawthorne we could make out this line of yellow in the desert. As we got closer we discovered they were box cars. Upon arriving we were pleasantly invited to take an in-prompt tour of the railroad engine house by the crew. Like Sierra, the facility was spotless and the locomotives were immaculate. In talking with the railroad shop's crew we were informed there was over 100 box cars stored on the tracks that day. After building the Army locomotives mentioned in the April WCMRRC newsletter it seamed appropriate the box cars would be my dad's and my next project. So with blessing of the railroad crew we took a lot of photos and gathered information.

My dad and I acquired four Athearn #5520 HO undecorated box car kits between the Carson City Show and Swap Meet and Dimi Trains in Reno that trip. Bill spray painted them with Testors Red #1203, Yellow #1214 and Flat Black #1249, the same colors he used on his Army locomotives. Like the locomotives, this was all back before Roundhouse, Athearn or Intermountain released their generic version of these box cars. He then handed the box cars over to me for decaling. Using Walthers Solvaset #470 I applied Microscale 87-70-5 and -1 RR Gothic Letters & Numbers Red (for the lettering) and Black (for the end number) and 87-1 RR Roman Data for car data. I clipped lube plates from MC-4126. I put on all the letters and numbers one character at a time. Then I sprayed them with Testors #1260'Dullcot. Turning the cars over to my dad, Bill added North West Shortline nickel silver wheels, Kadee #5 couplers, painted the brake wheels red and assembled the floors.


