Vincentius Lengert, groom, age 24, legitimate son of Josephi Lengert and Margaretha Mesmer of Soufflenheim, Alsatia, and Catharina Weid, bride, age 34, legitimate daughter of Laurentii Weid and Anna München of Deinschwanz, Bav. [Bavaria]. Witnesses: Michael Weid and Fabian Vonhatten.

**JOSEPH MATTHIEU & MARGARETHA LENGERT**

**09 July 1846 Most Holy Redeemer Parish, Manhattan, Marriage**

Joseph Matthieu, groom, age 27, legitimate son of Thoma Matthieu and Catharinae Riegler of Germersheim, Alsatia, and Margaretha Lengert, bride, age 17, legitimate daughter of Josephi Lengert and Margaretha Mesmer of Soufflenheim, Alsatia. Witnesses: Henricus Pfaff and Vincentius Lengert.

## **JOSEPH LENGERT & BERNARDINA HAASS**

### **19 June 1849 Most Holy Redeemer Parish, Manhattan, Marriage**

Joseph Lengert, groom, of Sofenheim [Soufflenheim], Alsace, and Bernardina Haass, bride, of Sofenheim [Soufflenheim], Witnesses: Vinzent Lengert and Xavier Lengert.

## **FABIAN VONHATTEN**

Born in Soufflenheim on 29 January 1818, son of Joseph Vonhatten and Therese Haberkorn. Emigrated on the ship Havre, Port of Departure: Le Havre, France, Port of Arrival: New York City, Date of Arrival: 8 July 1839, National Archives Series Number: M237, Microfilm Number: 39, List Number: 460. Manifest page 3, entry 23. Fabian Vanhatten married Odilia Lengert 13 February 1844 at St. Nicholas Parish in Manhattan: Fabianus Vanhatten, groom, age 26, of Sufflenheim, Alsatia, son of Josephi Vanhatten and Theresiae Habercorn, and Odilia Lengert, bride, age 19, of Sufflenheim, Alsatia, daughter of Josephi Lengert and Margarethae Mesmer. Witnesses: Joseph Gress, Balthasar Daun.

Fabian lived in several places but mostly on East 4th Street in Manhattan near Holy Redeemer Church, and was a sawyer. He married on the lower east side and remained there the rest of his life. Fabian and his wife were living at 275 4<sup>th</sup> Street when they died in the 1880's. Addresses from city directories (all near Holy Redeemer Church):

## **JOSEPH VON HATTEN**

Nick Schott emigrated from Soufflenheim to the United States. Born 17 January 1867 in Soufflenheim. Arrived in New York in April 1892 under the name Ignatius Schott

### **PHILLIP BURGARD**

Phillip Burgard emigrated from Soufflenheim to the United States .Born 09 September 1871 in Soufflenheim. Father was Xavier, mother listed at Tresa.

### **JOSEPHINE GAETZ**

### **NICOLAS SCHNEIDER & MADELEINE HELMER**

Nicolas Schneider and Madeleine Helmer were married, 30 March 1871, Most Holy Redeemer Paris, Manhattan. Madeleine Helmer, baptized 30 March 1847 in Soufflenheim, daughter of Isador Helmer and Madeleine Th.? Daul, to Nicolas Schneider baptized 12 November 1845 in Fegersheim, Alsace. They had eight children; whose birth certificates are from Manhattan.

### **CATHERINE BURGER**

Catherine Burger, born 01 January 1790, Soufflenheim, Alsace, daughter of Joseph Burger and Bridgit Kleitz. Married Anthony Kieffer (29 November 1777 to 06 May 1856) in Soufflenheim 04 Sep 1811. They emigrated to East Eden in Erie County, New York in 1830 with their seven children: Celestine, Josephine, Catherine, Peter, Barbara, Mary Ann and Philipp. Following the death of her husband, Catherine moved to Elba, Minnesota by 1860, where children Celestine, Josephine, Peter, and Phoebe had earlier arrived. She passed away in 1865 in Elba and is buried in the Kieffer-Klein Cemetery.

## ANDREW BURGER

Andrew Burger, born 19 July 1821 in Soufflenheim, Alsace, son of Joseph Burger and Catharine Wagner. Related to Catherine Burger, wife of Anthony Kieffer, whose family resided south of Buffalo in East Eden, Erie County, New York. In May of 1855, Andrew, arriving from California, and relatives arriving from Erie County, purchased adjacent government land in Elba, southeastern Minnesota, 10 miles west of the Mississippi, and began farming.

Meeting Andrew in Elba were his cousins Peter and Phoebe Kieffer of East Eden, Phoebe's husband Casper Kriedermacher of Darmstadt in Hesse, south of Frankfurt, and Peter and Phoebe's niece Catherine Klein of Buffalo and husband William Hemmelberg of Prussia (Catherine's mother, Josephine Klein nee Kieffer would arrive the following year). They were among the earliest settlers in Elba. The Kriedermacher Valley and road is named after Phoebe's husband and the Kieffer Valley after Peter. Phoebe Kieffer was the first death in the township, dying of cholera in 1856, a year after arriving. The inscription on her tombstone reads "Not dead but gone before". On March 23, 1900, Andrew drowned while crossing the Whitewater River behind the home of the Hemmelbergs.

ANDREW BURGER, farmer, a native of Alsace [SOUFFLENHEIM], now part of Germany, was born June 23, 1821. At seventeen years old he came to America and worked at farm labor in Oneida, Erie, and Orleans Counties, New York for several years. When 23 years old he went to Canada, and thence to Hillsdale County, Michigan, where he worked on the Lake Shore & Michigan southern railroad. In 1851 he went to Indiana and then to Louisiana, working at farm and plantation labor. In 1852 he went to California, and after loosing his all two or three times in the mines, engaged in farming and threshing. Having secured a small capital, he left California in the spring of 1855, and arrive in Elba, where he had friends, on the 15<sup>th</sup> of May; he immediately entered a claim to 160 acres of government land on Section 11, and has ever since dwelt thereon. He now has 400 acres on sections 6,7,10 and 11, of which over 200 acres are under the plow. On July 5<sup>th</sup>, 1877, his large barn was burned by lightening, and has not been rebuilt. He lives in a fine large house, and has every comfort a farmer may crave, the product of his own industry.

He is a member of the Roman Catholic society of Elba, which held its meetings in his house for many years. He was town supervisor in 1865 ; formerly democrat, now independent.

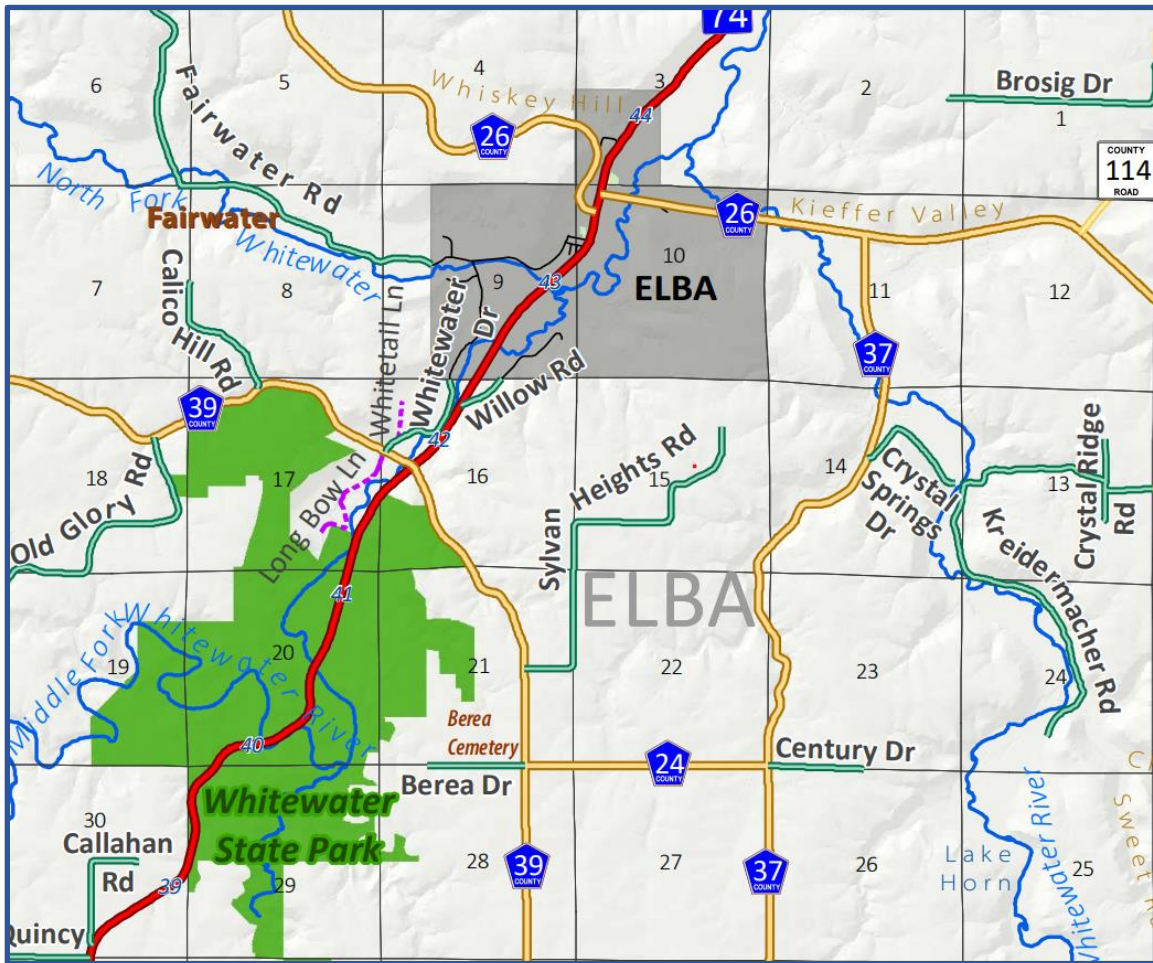
WILLIAM HEMMELBERG, farmer. The subject of this sketch is one of the pioneers who penetrated the unknown valleys of the lower Whitewater basin, and has established a home which is a monument to his hardihood and industry, and where he may sometime end his days amid the comforts which his own toil had earned. Mr. Hemmelberg was born in Wesel, Prussia, February 25, 1830. He was bred after the manner of German farmers' sons, assisting in his parents' labors and receiving the practical education enjoined by German laws. When 21 years old he emigrated to the land of promise west of the Atlantic, and settled in Erie county, New York, where he labored in the pinery, shingle mills and on farms. On the 19th of April, 1855, he was married to Catherine Klein. She was a daughter of Philip Klein and Josephine Kiefer [SOUFFLENHEIM], natives of Loraine and Alsace, Germany. She was born in Buffalo, New York, August 5, 1838. Immediately after their wedding Mr. and Mrs. Hemmelberg set out for the new west, and arrived in Elba on the 4<sup>th</sup> of May. They immediately selected their present location on Sec. 11, where he made claim to 160 acres of government land. Mrs. H. took her first ride after oxen in coming from the Mississippi River to Elba. She found the lonely life of a pioneer settler very irksome to reconcile with her city breeding, and as female companionship could not be had, she returned to Buffalo after a stay of about three months. The next spring she returned, accompanied by her mother [Josephine Kiefer of SOUFFLENHEIM] and several new families, and they were soon surrounded by other homes. Mr. Hemmelberg now resides with his family in a large stone residence, and has a handsomely improved farm. Agreeing with his neighbors in politics, he is a democrat. His family are all communicants in the Elba Roman Catholic church, in which Mrs. Hemmelberg is very active in teaching the children. Five children were born to them, as herewith enumerated : William, March 30, 1856, now in Texas; Louis, February 20, 1859, died April 23, 1882 ; Louisa, May 10, 1863 ; Albert, January 19, 1870 ; Mary, June 19, 1876, died October 19, 1878. Mr. Hemmelberg enlisted, August 23, 1864, in Company H, 11th Minnesota Volunteers, and served till June 26, 1865, being stationed on guard duty most of the time at Nashville, Tennessee.

ELBA TOWNSHIP. The surface is very much broken, and is covered by three deep valleys, which in turn are traversed by three prominent streams. There are three branches of the Whitewater river, the north branch, the east branch and the middle branch. These unite at the village of Elba, on Sec. 10, and form one principal stream, which flows north and leaves the town ship on Sec. 2. Good farms are found in the valleys, and excellent "wheat tables" on the high land. Floods, caused by heavy rains in summer, are frequent on the Whitewater and its branches, causing much annoyance by the washing away of dams and the injury of mills. The timber found in the township is principally oak and elm, which is plentiful in the valleys.

Immigration into the township began as early as 1854. Robert Crooks was probably the first among the early pioneers. He came to that locality in the spring of 1854, and took up a claim on what is now part of Sec. 28. He was followed the same year by F. McCarty and a man named Southwick. F. McCarty settled on what is now Sec. 22, while Southwick made a claim on Sec. 3. The following came in 1855 : A. E. Todd, D. J. Todd, D. R. Holbrook, L. U. Todd, W. Telugan, PETER KIEFER, ANDREW BURGER, WM. HEMMELBERG, A. D. Nichols, Alva Philbrick, H. D. Bailey and Jerry Philbrick.

A. E. Todd took up land on Secs. 6 and 7, D. J. Todd on Secs. 8 and 9, D. R. Holbrook on Sec. 9, L. U. Todd on Sec. 8, W. Telugan on Sec. 11, PETER KIEFER ON N.W. ¼ QUARTER SEC. 12, ANDREW BURGER ON SECS. 11 AND 12, WM. HEMMELBERG ON SEC. 11, A.D. Nichols on Sec. 10, Alva Philbrick, H. D. Bailey and Terry Philbrick, all on Sec. 10.

First death in the township was that of MRS. CASPER KREIDERMACHER [Phoebe Kieffer], who died of cholera in 1856, and was buried on Sec. 3.

### JOHN, FRANCIS AND JOSEPH VOEGELE

The 1860 census in Gibsonville, Sierra County, California (Gold Rush country) list John and Francis Voegele, possible brothers of Joseph Voegele of Soufflenheim. Two of Joseph's brothers went to California for the gold rush. Which brothers are not known. The Voegele brothers were still in the Erie County in 1855 according to the census. At least two of the Voegele brothers, Henry and John, apparently never returned from California. Joseph Voegele (1862-1934) made several trips to California to search for his missing Uncle John. It's not known why he wasn't worried about Henry. John was never found and Joseph returned to Lancaster, New York.

## LAURENT ERNEWEIN

Modeste/Matthias Ernewein and Joseph Ernewein have listed as their father Laurent Ernewein in Soufflenheim (records Rose transcribed). Familysearch.org shows "Lorenz Ernwein" age 73 from France on the RHONE, arrival date 10/18/1842. This age matches Laurent ERNEWEIN from Soufflenheim. AND, by this time pretty much all of his family is in North America except for his wife, who died a year or two earlier, so, I could see him emigrating. I don't see a death record for him in Soufflenheim nor anywhere else, but the 1840s records are very spotty in Canada, at least in Maryhill/New Germany.

[Mark Drexler comments: The Lorenz Ernwein on that Rhone manifest neatly matches the father of the brothers Joseph and Modeste Ernewein, who seem to have emigrated about 3 years earlier. Those brothers have not yet been found on manifests (they apparently came over separately). I did look for 'Fanny' Meyer (probably officially 'Francoise') [name on manifest near Lorenz Ernewein] in Soufflenheim without success. And the name above that I took as possibly 'Orth' rather than 'Arth', and investigated for that one -- again without success. So it looks like that one lonesome Ernwein is the only candidate Soufflenheimer on that boat, and that doesn't instill confidence.]

## JOSEPH HAASER & CAROLINE GRESS

1851 Census, Soufflenheim: Haaser, Adam, voiturier, 66; Kress, Caroline, la femme du fils, 21; Haaser, Joseph, son fils laboureur, 34; Haaser, Me Anne, leur soeur, 23

1854 Emigration (from newspaper shipping reports): Simon Greenman departed Le Havre on the 11 November 1854, and was sighted in the approaches to NY 18 December, making port the next day. Passenger roll is dated 21 December, presumably their date of disembarkation.

From city directories of Pittsburgh and neighboring boroughs: Joseph was instead living in Duquesne borough, but it's 1860 census is so faded it cannot be read. Directory coverage of Duquesne is hit-and-miss, but he appears as follows:

1859 Hauser, Joseph, lab[orer], h[ouse] Girty's Run, D[uquesne]

1863 Hauser, Joseph, lab[orer], 20 Girty's run, D[uquesne] B[orough]

1864 (duplicate entries)

- Hauser, Joseph, lab[orer], Road north Butler plank road, D[uquesne]
- Hauser, James (sic), lab[orer], Girty's run

From 1865 he was living in a house on farmland he rented from the estate of Christopher Farmerie estate in Shaler Twp., just east of the borough and hence outside the city directory's catchment area. He paid \$300 rent for the period from July 1865 to March 1867. The last date was when the final inventory of the estate was filed, but he continued to live there at least through 1870, as deduced from the census.

1880 Census, Millvale, Allegheny, Pennsylvania: Hohl, John, 50, France (French parents); Hohl, Caroline, 47, wife, keeping house, France (French parents); Hohl, Frank, 23, son, works in mill, NY (French parents); Haser, Joseph, 15, stepson, barber, Penna (French parents); Apply, Rachel, 5, foster daughter, Penna (Father: Switzerland, Mother: Penna); 3 boarders

1900 Pittsburgh Post-Gazette, 9 April 1900, p. 5: HOHL: On Thursday, April 6, 1900, at 7:45 p.m., Mrs. CAROLINE HOHL, mother of Mrs. W. H. Farmerie and Joseph C. Haser, aged 68 years. Funeral this morning at 8:30 o'clock from the residence of her son-in-law W. H. Farmerie, Butler plank road, Shaler township. Requiem high mass at 9 a.m. at St. Anthony's church, Millvale.

1932 Pennsylvania Death Certificate: Mr. Joseph C. Haser, occupation: Justice of the Peace, born February 4 1965, Millvale, Pennsylvania, Father: Joseph Haser, b. Alsace France, mo: Caroline Kress, b. Alsace France, died Jan. 30, 1932, Ross Township., Allegheny County.

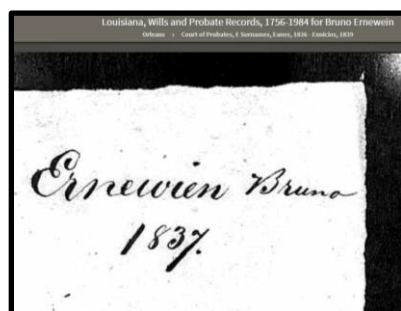

On the fifth written line of page one he is clearly noted as being from Soufflenheim by his executor/testator. I have seen other New Orleans to New Germany movement, including Wendel Sauer, so New Orleans was a destination for some.





## WENDEL SAUER

Buckle up, as this story is a bit of a roller coaster ride:

- 1) Wendel Sauer 2 was born in Onsbach, Baden 18 Oct 1798 to Wendel Sauer 1 and Christine Harter, I have them as from Fautenbach, Baden but not much to go on, the rest of this sentence is strictly speculative COULD be guess work or perhaps they are very early refugees (they had a son in Onsbach in 1787 so before the great flight.
- 2) He married Franziska KEHLHOFFNER in Soufflenheim 22 Jan 1838. This is now one of those instances where I record not just similar names on either side of the Rhine but actual connections.
- 3) Before marriage they had an illegitimate son Joseph KEHLHOFFNER (later Sauer was added when Wendel claimed the child as his own) This birth was 3 Aug 1836 Mark had dug up that info about the adoption, would have to dig for it.
- 4) Wendel 2 and Franziska had three more children Francisca (born 1840) Wendel (born 1842) and Hypolite (born and died 1849) all in Soufflenheim
- 5) Wendel died in Soufflenheim 10 Apr 1850
- 6) Francisca KEHLHOFFNER according to Mark Drexler immigrated with Sebastien DREXLER, Wendel 3 in 1850 and made way to New Germany where Sebastien Drexler and Francisca Sauer (daughter of Franziska) married. We know all this ships etc from the work we just did.
- 7) Wendel 3 married Catherine Reinhart in New Germany in 1863 This wife Catherine gives birth to a son Joseph in 1864 (probably in New Orleans) than dies in New Orleans in 1866
- 8) Wendel 3 than marries Margaretha Gettel in New Orleans in 1867 and than she dies in 1870
- 9) We find Wendel living near a Joseph Sauer in New Orleans who is assumedly his brother and the illegitimate son of Wendel 2 and Franziska in 2) This Joseph is shown as born in France, arrived in America in 1855 and the port is unknown. This record indicates he naturalized in 1867 but I haven't gotten farther on it. He dies in New Orleans in 1897.
- 10) THIS IS WHERE THE WATER GETS A LITTLE MURKY

Wendel 3 is married and living in New Orleans and has a child in 1868 and 1870 down there.

Meanwhile Rosina Hauser of my Baden Hauser line has a child in 1868 in New Germany that we have no proof of Wendel 3 being the father BUT his second wife dies in New Orleans in March of 1870 and he remarries to Rosina Hauser in August of 1870 in New Germany.

They later are in New Orleans for birth of their child Mary Barbara Sauer in August 1871.

This marriage has some confusion, there are some index cards that indicate the third marriage did occur in 1869 and we cannot see anything but an index on vital records but there is a long marriage record mentioning dispensation meetings with the Bishop in the New Germany records.

So what we know for sure is Wendel was married twice in New Germany and once in New Orleans, that he had children in both places and later "settled" in New Germany with Rosina. There was certainly time in New Orleans and this Joseph Sauer lived in close proximity so we believe them to be related.

I realize this is not 100% proven but there is a ton of circumstance that Joseph in New Orleans is kin. There is more research to be done, but I wanted to provide as much of a story as I could, and it is heck of

a story. I have no records of Wendel arriving by land or sea in New Orleans but I think sea would have been challenging at times given the US civil war. Take from this what you will but I think it is cause for some notice of New Orleans as a possible settlement of some from Soufflenheim. Phil Hauser
