Message from our Pastor

Dear friends in faith,

Invitation to Lent:

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor.

I invite you, therefore, to the discipline of Lent – selfexamination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love – strengthened by the gifts of word and sacrament.

Let us continue our journey through these forty days to the great Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection.

With these words we enter into the 40 days of Lenten discipline.

These words take on a new meaning in 2025 as the world needs faithful people to step up together to "contend against evil and resist whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbour."

I cannot think of a time in my life where this commitment has taken on more importance, my parents (deceased) surely could. It is a time to look inward and then act. To stand up for love, decency, mercy and creation. To build and reinforce community.

What does this mean? In Ontario, research and vote. Choose the party that best reflects what Christ would do - not what might seem the most advantageous to some while leaving others behind. Hold your elected officials accountable to the most vulnerable.

On a personal level use your power. Graham and I are looking at everything we do and buy through Christ's eye on the impact. Goodbye Facebook, Netflix and Airbnb and Amazon. Shop local. Increased support of our democratic, inclusive and progressive neighbours. The list goes on.

As we prepare for our "epic adventure" in spring (Graham's niece is getting married in Perth Australia (April 23-May 14) we have altered and revised plans to avoid having our dollars support evil or cause harm. It has cost a bit more, and there are surely unknown things, but we are reflecting and acting. The days of simply doing anything without thought are behind us.

It is time for prayer, self-examination, repentance, sacrificial giving and acts. It is true that we may upset and anger some. It may feel hopeless or insignificant. But, such is the life of the faithful - Jesus and his disciples were not always welcomed - compassion and solidarity with the vulnerable takes courage now and always has. Speak out. Seek out real news and facts.

We, as Christians, support and encourage one another to do what is right in the eyes of God. This is more important, and more difficult now than ever. May we trust the Spirit to guide. Amen.


Get involved at St. John's!

- 4. **Property:** Fred reported that the organ is the current focus, and humidity is still being worked on.
- 5. **Finances:** Council approved the 2025 budget for recommendation to members via a unanimous online evote on February 9, 2025. Moved by Enid, and seconded by Debbie Witt. Information on January 2025 income and expenses was presented. Enid moved, Debbie seconded, that this information be accepted. CARRIED. Confirmed supply compensation guidelines.
- 6. **AGM:** Fred moved that the AGM will be on February 23 after service. Seconded by Enid. CARRIED. Two of the Financial Reviewers for 2024, Randy Zimmerling and Maxzene Zimmerling were thanked for their service. Quotes for 2025 review by accounting firms were noted. Marilyn Kropp, treasurer, St. James Renfrew, and Maureen Rueckwald have agreed to be presented as 2025 reviewers. Moved by Karen, seconded by Fred, that they be presented to our members for appointment as 2025 financial reviewers at the Annual Meeting. CARRIED. Three council members are up for re-election and have accepted to stand.
- 7. Working with Vulnerable Youth, Elders and others: Youth leadership, and those working with elders and other vulnerable people need to have police checks which have to be completed every 3 years; in addition, commitment annually to abuse protection policy is required. File in locked cabinet available for all these documents.
- 8. Loose Ends: Discussion on confirmation pictures, taken down from hall: consideration of photo album or digital library, with special showings on screen and/or photo tablet, also available to members for own use. Being looked into further. Thank you's for recent memoriam donations planned.
- 9. **Pastoral Care:** Ongoing visits to drop off newsletters, and tax receipts have been conducted. Pastor Sylvia has met with a few more of these folks and will be arranging other visits with communion during Lent in March. Also in June, September and December.
- 10. Youth: Mellissa sent notice that Sunday School is Feb. 16 (storm cancelled) now March 2.
- **11. Round Table:** Pastor Sylvia's understanding is that building more vibrancy in St. John's community is desired in time. Some thoughts expressed on exploring special needs in broader community that might be served by St. John's.

Close of Meeting: Next meeting: Monday, February 10, 2025, 1:00 p.m. Ended with the Lord's Prayer, led by Pr. Sylvia.






Devotionals are meant to help deepen faith practice and worship (worship being a form of devotion to God).





Ramadan: A Month of Spiritual Significance for Muslims

Ramadan is a pivotal month in the Islamic calendar that holds immense spiritual importance for Muslims worldwide. Celebrated as the ninth month of the lunar calendar, Ramadan commemorates the moment when the Quran, the holy book of Islam, was first revealed to the Prophet Muhammad by the angel Gabriel. This sacred month is a period of fasting, prayer, reflection, and community, allowing Muslims to draw closer to God and cultivate a deeper sense of spiritual awareness.

One of the most significant aspects of Ramadan is fasting, known as "sawm," which is considered one of the Five Pillars of Islam. From dawn until sunset, Muslims abstain from eating, drinking, smoking, and engaging in sinful behaviour. The fast is broken each evening with a meal known as "iftar," often starting with the consumption of dates and water, mirroring the Prophet Muhammad's tradition. This daily practice of self-discipline helps Muslims develop empathy for those less fortunate, encourages gratitude for the blessings they have, and fosters a sense of spiritual purification.



Beyond fasting, Ramadan is a time of increased devotion and worship. Muslims are encouraged to engage in additional prayers, particularly the "Tarawih" prayers, which are offered in congregation at night. Recitation and reflection upon the Quran are also emphasized during this month. The "Laylat al-Qadr," or the Night of Decree, falls within the last ten days of Ramadan and is considered the holiest night of the year. It is believed to be the night when the Quran was first revealed, and Muslims spend this time in intense prayer, seeking divine mercy and forgiveness.

Charity, or "zakat," is another key element of Ramadan. Muslims are encouraged to give to those in need, reinforcing the principles of generosity and social responsibility. This charitable giving serves as a reminder of the importance of supporting the less fortunate and working towards a just society.

The conclusion of Ramadan is marked by the celebration of Eid al-Fitr, a festive holiday that signifies the end of fasting and the beginning of a new month. Muslims gather for communal prayers, enjoy feasts with family and friends, and give zakat al-fitr to ensure that even the poorest among them can partake in the celebrations.

While distinct from other religious observances such as Lent in Christianity, Ramadan shares similarities in its focus on self-discipline and spiritual growth. The month-long observance offers Muslims a unique opportunity to renew their faith, strengthen their community bonds, and deepen their connection with God. Through fasting, prayer, and charity, Ramadan embodies the core values of Islam and represents a profound period of reflection and spiritual renewal for Muslims around the world.
