New Year's Before Christmas?

Once again, the church reminds us that we, as followers of Christ, don't always "fit in" with the local culture including timing. Yes, we observe the New Year before Christmas. The new year ushers in our season of preparation - Advent - a time where we open ourselves up to see what new things Jesus is offering.

As November begins, I am asking myself where July and September went - I can look back and recall the fun of Confirmation Camp in August, and the joy of Thanksgiving and Reformation in October. Time races by. After giving thanks for the saints that rest in Christ, and claiming our own belovedness, we have just a couple of weeks before we find ourselves preparing for the new year - November 30th is the first Advent and the first Sunday of Year A - the year we focus on understanding Christ through the teachings in the book of Mark.



Life wasn't easy in the time of Christ, and he offers so many lessons and actions to remind us - God is with us. We have choices and power to share in decision making. May we do so in faith.

Draft Minutes of Oct 27th, 2025 Council Meeting

Attendance:

Pr. Sylvia Poetschke (regrets) Karen Greening

Meeting called to order 1:00 pm. Andy opened with a reflection and prayer.

- 1. **Previous Minutes:** Debbie moved that the September 22, 2025 minutes be accepted as distributed. Seconded by Karen. CARRIED.
- 2. Financial Report: Commitments were around \$6,300 in September. Operating expenses exceed expenses by some \$6000, but with recognition of early Oct. deposit of St. James Sept. cheque, projection down to \$3,600. 3rd quarter Charitus income increase of \$851. Bank account \$11,611, Charitus is \$79,822 and cashable GIC is \$5,022. Enid moved that the financial report to end of September be accepted as presented. Fred seconded. CARRIED
- 3. Pastoral Report: Council reviewed Pr. Sylvia's written report for September.
- 4. **Finance AGM**: Confirmed Special Congregational Meeting on Sunday, November 23 after service to present best estimate for 2025 year end, and the 2026 budget for approval. Date of AGM in early 2026 yet to be determined.
- 5. **Property:** Programmable thermostats are to be installed this year. The roof is to be checked and possibly finish the flashing. The need for organ tuning this year to be determined.
- 6. **Dickens and Carols:** This Outreach free event will be held on Saturday, December 13. Propose Debbie Kargus will purchase some snack treats from Costco for social following the event.
- 7. **Christmas Pageant and Float:** Council approves pageant and float; Andy to contact Ryan Zimmerling.
- 8. **Pews:** Pews will be put back for the Dickens event to have extra seating and for the Christmas Eve service. It will be decided in the new year as what to do with them.
- 9. **Alternative Services**: Saturday, November 22 possible healing service, separate from Sunday service. TBD
- 10. **Shared Ministry:** We have to look ahead at shared work with St. James for events/services/timing / connections/pastoral ministry. Two names proposed for committee; TBC.
- 11. Longer Table/Kitchen: Longer Table received helpful funding through a recent Witch Walk. Public Health advised they do not currently inspect kitchens, such as ours. We expect we may still be able to store dried/canned food in our basement. Arrangements with The Longer Table may be made for this.
- 12. **Meeting closure:** Meeting closed with thanks from Andy. Next regular meeting: November 17, 2025 at 1:00 p.m.





Radon Awareness Month

November is Radon Awareness month. Please consider testing your home. The Ottawa Valley (both sides of the river) often have unknown high radon readings. Remediation requires professionals but it is manageable and not overly disruptive. Financial support is available through the Lung Association. Ask me for more information / Pr. Sylvia.

Reducing the risk of Lung Cancer starts at the ground level.

Radon comes from the soil and enters buildings through contact with the ground. The longer people are exposed to radon, the greater their risk of lung cancer. Testing for radon is the only way to determine radon levels in a building.

If your radon levels are high - they can be lowered by installing a radon mitigation system.


