- 1. Meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. with Pastor opening with devotions and a prayer.
- 2. The agenda for the meeting was adopted. Move by Jeff, seconded by Andy.
- **3.** Motion for approval of the minutes of the 2019 meeting as distributed. David moved, seconded by Barb. CARRIED.
- 4. Quorum was verified.
- 5. Financial Report:

We have much to be thankful for in our financial results of 2020. Despite the pandemic, where we could not have services in person for a large part of the year, we ended with a surplus of \$3,027 in a year where we had expected a deficit. That surplus is due to:

- The wonderful generosity of our members and friends in their givings.
- Government grants wage subsidies of about \$5,000. These more than offset the lost fund-raising income of \$2,500 compared to 2019.
- Interest of over \$2,000 on investments of our operating reserve with the Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada.
- Expenses were ~\$4,200 below budget with a reduction in church music, church property and savings in conference fees and other expenses for the Pastor.
- St. John's was able to exceed our 2020 commitment to Benevolence by \$201.
- Lastly, the item of TR Designated speaks to tax-receipted designated givings for special purposes. The \$2,930 includes special donations for Technology of \$1,810, \$860 for chickens for the Food Bank (see the Outreach report) and \$200 for a new snow blower.

Andy moved to accept the 2020 financials; Judy Johnstone seconded. CARRIED

6. Appointment of Financial Reviewer. No one has offered as yet. Alison will bring back to the congregation when one is found.

7. 2021 Budget

Alison reviewed the budget:

- Pastoral ministry increased by 4% due to COLA increase and new benefits package.
- New initiatives: 1: Technology: License fee. AV director. 2: Youth Unplugged program
 – grant plus \$1045 cost to us. 3: initiative to distribute SJL literature to new homes in
 the community.
- Budget for a \$2,500 deficit. Plan for appeal to friends who connect via YouTube.

Lorne R Moved and Lorne B seconded, that Budget for 2021 be accepted as presented. CARRIED.

8. Council:

Randy spoke to council recruiting. Lorne R moved and JoAnne B. seconded, to acclaim Andy and Debbie to congregational council.

 - Jeff noted how fantastic the contributions to outreach has been. Suggestion for Lenten offering for purchasing solar lights for third world countries.

Chairperson's Report

Sometimes I need only to stand wherever I am to be blessed.

This past year surprised us! In many ways, we continued *to stand* where we were in 2020. Yet, St. John's folks still have many reasons to say we *were blessed* in 2021.

Let's look over our year's blessings together.

Worship: As January 2021 began, we once again moved back to pre-recorded online and printed worship material after several months of welcome in-person services. Tough . . . but thanks to Pastor Norine, producer Dave Burkett, dedicated altar guild members, willing readers and lay leaders, resources from our church at large, and faithful delivery of printed services, every week we had the opportunity to worship where we safely stood. And then from the beginning of August through Christmas Eve, some of us were able to return to in person worship, even as our online presence continued.

Support: In 2021, your council transitioned, too, from the good leadership provided by faithful, long term members Randy Zimmerling and Jeff Kargus, to service from Alison Burkett as our effective and capable treasurer, acclamation at our annual meeting of new members Debbie Witt and Andy Kalnins, and interim election by council of Rachel Roesner. Cory Weckwerth continued to serve throughout the year, despite a shifting and busy work and family life. He actively moved and supported motions, and stepped in to usher when we re-opened, and, as he leaves council, we will miss his grounding voice and input.

Learning: Even though we could not come together in person for discussion, Sunday School or Vacation Bible School, we learned a lot through:

- receiving reports, planning and holding our first, (hopefully last!) online Annual Meeting. Kudos to the Rosien and Richardson couples for coming in over telephone lines not easy!
- Lenten time learning: a series with a Nova Scotian pastor and Zoom chats on refugee camps and solar lights.
- UNPLUG developments: the team 'plugged in' to much learning on policies, safety, first aid, launching, and social networking. Thank you, UNPLUG team.
- Every child matters: Reflecting on Indigenous truths and connections through prayerful words and image, including for the September 30 National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.



- Constitutional renewal: months of processing, review, and consultation led to the adoption of our new constitution in November. Thank you, Debbie Witt, for your leadership here.
- 'Grounded': a few of us became grounded over Zoom as we began discussing this Diana Butler Bass book.
- Looking ahead: beginning to plan for a 'visioning' process. Watch for how you can have your say in 2022 in a caring and thoughtful vision of St. John's future.

Fellowship: How do you do that without coffee and cake? Masked, sharing together, as part of a service and/or live streamed, or over the roads, we managed to:

- Witness a caring goodbye to Stan Headrick, when we could not be with his family in person;
- Celebrate a special birthday of Marion Leeck;
- Recognize with heartfelt thanks and plaques the exceptional dedication, leadership, contributions, and community and outreach work of Randy Zimmerling, Jeff Kargus, and Alison and Dave Burkett;
- Make and deliver Easter baskets and Christmas bags to members mostly confined to their homes or communal residences. Special thanks to Phoenix Barnhart, age 4, for Easter cards.

Service: While we could not 'reach in' a lot, we still have managed to 'reach out' and care and bless others as we have been blessed. You have helped fund Canadian Lutheran World Relief work, and supported Camp Lutherlyn, and the Food Bank with time, skill and donations. You have sponsored many UNPLUG outdoor activities which have reached children and families of varied backgrounds in and around our community. Thank you!

And More Thanks! To Gerald Formuziewich for daily building and property checks, to our Reopening Task Force for safe counsel, and to all the Altar Guild, Readers, Ushers, Counters, and Property, Technical, Fundraising, Financial and Photography volunteers - thank you! Thanks to Alison Burkett and the UNPLUG activity leaders and support workers. Thanks to Randy and Cathy Zimmerling, Pastor Norine, Bob and Debbie Witt for many weekly drives and deliveries to over 15 members. Thank you to the young members and parents who brought us joy through their readings and Christmas video. Thank you, Pastor Norine, for communal and personal care through this year. And to all, thank you for your faithful and prayerful care of one another and the time, funds and dedication with which you support St John's community. Blessed, we are!

Pastoral Report

If someone asked me to describe the good people of St. John's, this would be my response. They are faith-filled, committed, hard working, patient and maintain a good sense of humour. Often when a congregation comes through a time of struggle, growing and learning together, that the most change for the better takes place. 2 Corinthians 4:1"Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart."

As these report pages are kept forever as historical documents, I sense it is good to record our 2021 year with some detail.

Worship: Dec. 24 of 2020 we were locked down till Feb. 2, 2021, due to pandemic Public Health protocols. We had pre-recorded worship services for utube. These were produced by Dave Burkett so that they could be viewed by those who could not attend in person. Up until August we ensured weekly worship scripts were available to those who did not have internet. Deliveries included Services

of Word & Prayer, Holy Communion, and monthly newsletters. Eternity for Today devotional booklets were also available.

Feb. 14 we gathered for a Zoom (internet chat room) 2020 AGM meeting. The Eastern Synod Staff live streamed an Ash Wednesday service. We opened up again for in person worship August 1 and people worshipped in person every Sunday. On Sept. 19, we were delighted to have Rev. Doug Reble, (Assistant to the Bishop) with us to deliver the sermon for the day. United Church Ministers, Rev. James Murray and Rev. Sheryl McCloud, with P+Norine designed and pre-recorded a Blue Christmas service for Dec. 21.

Our Altar Guild created a beautiful chancel for Advent and Christmas Eve Service, which 23 people were able to enjoy in person. Dec. 25, another provincial lockdown occurred which had us returning to YouTube services once again into 2022.

Pastoral Care: As face to face pastoral care was not allowed through much of the year, many phone calls, emails and texts over this year have been made to those confined to home, our younger families, and to all the congregation's members. Church council members have also taken on this contact ministry. I was able to make approximately **35 in-person visits**, at people's homes or the hospital, when I was able to provide Holy Communion.

Pastoral acts: Funerals: Stan Headrick, Will Greening, August burial of Leonard Boese, Ken Evenson, Sept. burials of Garnet & Kathleen Kargus, Chris Tonkin. In Dec. Rev. Stan Johnstone had funerals for Marion Mann and Albert Miller. Edith Weiler also died in Dec. **Baptism:** Paislee Buchanan

When lock downs occurred ZOOM calls (an internet video/chat platform) was implemented for monthly meetings with the Bishop and colleagues, and for Church Council meetings. Weekly calls were exchanged with our Dean, Rev. Bruce Thompson.

I am sincerely grateful for the support from our members for our ministries over this past year. Each of you have contributed time, talents, and financial resources. We have been supported by a very dedicated Church Council, and our Reopening Task Force Team. I am thankful for their partnership, support, and encouragement. Their faith and their resilience have kept us moving forward, during these unprecedented times.

When, with the Holy Spirit we come through difficult times, we only grow deeper in relationship with one another and come to reply more deeply on the grace and mercy of God. This indeed is worth celebrating! *2Corinthians 2:14* "But thanks be to God, who in Christ always leads us in triumphal procession, and through us spreads in every place the fragrance that comes from knowing him."

I pray that God blesses us, walking into 2022 together, as we maintain hope in our faith, our common life together, and in our ministries.

Children and Family Activity Report

Given the on-going pandemic, there was no Sunday School this year. Nevertheless, to the extent possible, children still participated in worship activities. For example, some of the older children from St. Johns delivered the readings and prayers or participated in services such as Camp Sunday, Blessing of the Backpacks, Advent (prayers and lighting the wreaths) among others. The children of St. Johns also made appearances in our newsletter such as *Meet our Members* story and birthday celebrations. A Youth from St. Johns also made Easter cards for Easter baskets that went to those without internet. For the Christmas Eve Service, there was a pre-recorded video of children from three families speaking about the Symbols of Christmas followed by the singing of Silent Night.

This past year, the Unplug Program had a soft launch, which gave children of different age groups the opportunity to get outdoors and learn about all that nature has to offer us. Examples of activities included kite building, harvesting the St. John's garden, farm and forest adventures, outdoor survival, bird-watching, and several others. The number of children participants was limited to 15 to provide a more personal learning and interactive experience. We found that the age of children interested in Unplug is 3 to 13; 51 children came out to at least 1 event. We also have 2 Youth (Zach Zimmerling and Phoenix Mosiondz-Sagmeister) who provide support for the Unplug events.

Constitution Report

Our Constitution and Bylaws had not been updated since 1987. Given the amount of time, it was decided to go ahead and update this document. Synod has a guide and constitution on their website to follow for updates. This Model Constitution and Bylaws for Congregations 2017 from the national church was used as a basis for the new document.

The process was undertaken by Debbie Witt in early 2021 where the first draft was proofed by Maureen Rueckwald with further amendments done with Enid Blackwell. The document was emailed to Wendell C. Grahlman, who is the Secretary of Synod. He recommended further changes which were then done. Review and slight revision by congregational council and distribution to members followed.

It was then brought before the congregation on November 14, 2021 for approval. However, there were two amendments recommended by Wendell, in order for it to be passed by Synod. These were passed by council and handed out at the time of the congregational meeting. The constitution passed unanimously at this meeting and was them forwarded to Synod for final approval which was given on November 20, 2021.

Outreach Report

A new and positive approach to Outreach commitments for 2022 and beyond

The 2022 budget proposes a new "commitment" approach in support of the Operating budget. As a result, we will commit funding to selected outreach organizations with a predetermined amount based on our yearly operating budget.

You will not be asked to donate to causes but we will communicate donations made on your behalf. Lenten donations will not be directed to an outreach cause – they will be directed to the "one pot" of donations.

As this is a new approach to outreach, there will be opportunities during our AGM to address any questions or concerns you may have.

Once again, we excelled by raising \$1145.00 for the purchase of 81 organically grown, free range chickens from the Ryan and Julie Zimmerling family farm. One chicken was given to each family as part of the Food Bank Christmas packages.

Your ongoing generosity of additional financial support was put to good use by the Arnprior and District Food Bank to purchase daily food items such as milk, eggs, cheese, and meat to name a few. We will be committing \$1125.00 toward the purchase of chickens in 2022.

A big THANK YOU to our Synod for their continued support of the "Children's Snack Pack" program. We applied for and received a \$1000.00 grant in 2021. This is the 6th year in a row we have received the maximum grant!!

We had an increase in donations from \$220.00 in 2020 to \$1481.00 this past year. The increase was mainly the result of two Lenten appeals. Flooding in BC (\$375.00) and the need for humanitarian aid in Myanmar. Many refugee camps have no source of light at night. Young girls are especially vulnerable. We focused our attention on providing a renewable source of light. Once again you stepped up. We raised \$1106.00, which purchased 11 Solar Lights.

Canadian Lutheran World relief continues to be a valued presence globally and relies on our generosity to enable them to continue. In 2022 our budget will include a **commitment of up to \$250** for CLWR appeals.

Over the past years we have experienced a steady decline in the number of Shoe Boxes we fill. Re-opening Task Force Committee Report

In house church worship service came and ended with Christmas Eve service.

Our goal was and still is to once again create a staged approach for the resumption of in-person worship while ensuring the safety of the congregation and community.

Last year this committee worked with Synod, Public Health and other Eastern Synod congregations to brainstorm and use lessons learned. The Team will again, once the province and Renfrew County allow it, re-open to in person worship. This time we have documentation and guidelines, (Public Health & Synod), which will aid in the re-opening of St. John's once approved. We've struggled through the Delta variant, flu season and now we're amidst the Omicron variant. We are constantly monitoring the ongoing changes released by the government and new health notices.

Numerous changes that we've now become accustomed to are: posted essential signage to meet Covid-19 requirements, detailing distancing protocols, hand washing procedures, mental health resources, screening requirements, etc. and physical distancing posters.

This congregation has already met the required training in the following areas:

- Welcoming roles (screening, attendance record, masks, physical distancing and hand sanitizing).
- Communicated changes to entrances/exits and worship space.

- Facilitated movement throughout the service (eg. entry, Holy Communion, exit).
- Attention: to maintain safe distancing, sequential exiting and limited personal interaction while in the church is expected.
- Ensure that worship leaders are able to have appropriate physical distance from each other
- Worshippers were encouraged to bring a minimum of personal belongings into the church and stipulated that all belongings must remain with the person at all times.
- Hymnals that were assigned to members last year are no longer being used at church. Members are encouraged to keep those books and use the new cranberry Evangelical Lutheran Worship books in the pews.

Special thanks to all of the time and efforts that volunteers have spent in the ongoing housekeeping and disinfecting of high-touch /shared surfaces before, between and after worship services.

Thank you all for your input and patience as together we safely move forward once again.

Communications Report

Throughout 2021, as in 2020, we continued to be held by that thread – in many directions! We were held together as:

- January through July **regular deliveries** were made to over 20 members, most without internet, of: service texts, newsletters, devotional booklets, and Easter and Christmas packages. Thank you, delivery team! (named in Chairperson's Report)
- Chats and sharing worship over the phone continued to take place.

- Thank you, P+Norine for worship leadership, messages, and communion, and all who led with sanctuary preparation and reading in person and from your homes. Thanks to seasoned and new ushers, who once again had our bells ringing in our neighbourhood. See our website for many of our services: **stjohnsarnprior.com**.
- Facebook continued with daily postings. See: St. John's Lutheran Church Arnprior Posted: All our service texts and videos, solidarity/action items, prayers, photos, music, humour, affirming quotes, kid-friendly posts, UNPLUG photos and news from the broader church,

Lutheran World Federation, CLWR, and multifaith bodies. Thanks to Andy Kalnins, added as an editor, for contributing posts. And thanks to some younger members for quick contact via our Facebook inbox. Technology & Property Report

Several improvements to the audio-visual equipment were made in 2021. A professional switching device was added to handle merging the sound and the multiple views. Thanks to Pastor Steve Johnston of Trinity Lutheran Church in London for his assistance with this. At this point we have what we need to reliably continue live stream or pre-recorded services. Thanks to Jeff for volunteering to fill in as producer.

Given the building was only used for 20 Sundays in 2021, there were relatively few property issues. A new humidifier for the organ was purchased. We re-hired Judy Hartwick for weekly cleaning, greatly reducing the volunteer burden. Thanks to Gerald for daily checking and humidifier water filling and to Barb and Gerald for their cleaning work.

Proposal for the Basement Floor

I'm recommending that we replace the Basement Floor in 2022. The project team for this initiative is Dave, Randy, Jeff and Bob W. The team is recommending:

- 1. A volunteer work crew be convened to remove the existing floor and subfloor and lay down Dricore 1" Insul-Armor Premium Subfloor. It is waterproof and has an R-value of 4.1, and is engineered with a high-density inorganic EPS foam that is durable enough to hold up to 3,650 lbs. per square foot.
- 2. Lay waterproof Vinyl plank flooring directly on to the Dricore.

The project would be segmented into several phases to minimize volunteer burn-out.

- 1. The main area from the bottom of the rear stairs through to the door into the hallway at the front, not including the kitchen. This would give us most of the benefit initially.
- **2.** At a later date, the washrooms, front hallway and kitchen could be tackled.

Total cost for the project would be approximately \$10,000. Phase 1 would be about \$6,000. Proposal is to fund the project from reserves and launch a multi-year capital appeal.

FINANCIAL REPORTS

2021 Finance Report

Financial results for 2021 were again encouraging, despite being the second year of COVID where we again could not have in-person services for much of the year. Here are the highlights:

- Operating surplus was \$409
- Donations to Benevolence (Eastern Synod and the wider church) exceeded our commitment by \$730
- Outreach was very generous:
 - Support for Canadian Lutheran World Relief projects included: \$1106 for Solar Panels and \$345 for the BC Floods
 - Donations to Camp Lutherlyn campership program on Camp Sunday came to \$170.
 - Support for Chickens for the Arnprior Food Bank at Christmas raised \$1,145 more than enough to give a chicken to every small family who requested one.
 - Other donations to the Arnprior Food Bank totalled \$2,070, not including the \$1,000 grant from Eastern Synod for the Healthy Snack program.

Our Balance Sheet is healthy with over \$57,000 in current assets, split between the bank and the money invested with the Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada (ELFEC); those investments by the way, realized about a 10% return, which was re-invested with ELFEC.

2022 BUDGET

Our congregation is in a financially healthy place after 2 years of small surpluses; yes, we've had some government grants to achieve those, but we are within reach of breaking even without grants. Our balance sheet is healthy with over \$55,000 in reserves.

Per council direction, this is a balanced (break-even) 2022 budget. Implicit in all budget numbers is the assumption that we will *return to normal* in 2022. (If we continue to be constrained by COVID in 2022, then, in general, our expenses will reduce.)

Input was solicited from many people to determine what our expenses would likely be in 2022. The process of budgeting is, in itself, a planning tool.

Expenses

Expenses overall increase by **5.2%** over 2021 in this "return to normal" year.

- 1. PASTORAL MINISTRY (prepared by the Shared Ministry Committee (Enid, Alison, Ulla, and Marilyn). This area includes the items: Salary including benefits, government withholdings and materials and milage. The agreement with St. James remains the same: 30% to St. James and 70% to St. John's. The SJL budget for this area for 2022 is **\$61,523**, a 1.7% increase.
- 2. WORSHIP AND COMMUNICATIONS (prepared by Pastor and Enid). Total Worship and Communications budget is **\$2,780**, roughly the same as 2019. This budget includes:
 - everything needed for worship (other than Pastor Norine!) communion and other supplies, music (10 occasions), supply Pastor (1 service),
 - communications and support to members outside of worship services (newsletter, parish mileage, Eternity for Today subscription, and advertising)
- **3. YOUTH MINISTRY** (prepared by Alison with input from Ryan). 2022 Youth Ministry Budget: **\$1,050**.
 - UNPLUG: The plan is to hold an average of 2 events per month from March to December. The remainder of the Synod grant from last year carries forward and will fund Leader and Support costs for 17 events. Our costs for the remaining Leader/ Support and supplies costs net of fees comes to \$900.
 - Sunday School: a return to normal requires a budget of \$150 for supplies.
- 4. **PROPERTY** (prepared by Dave).

Property has three parts – the first two parts are funded from the operating; they total \$13,010, ~ exactly the 2019 costs.

- Property Mandatory. This area includes Repairs and Maintenance (Furnace, Inspections, Organ, Worship Technology, and Miscellaneous), Caretaker, Utilities, and Insurance. The Mandatory Property budget for 2022 is \$12,710. (This represents a 29% increase over 2021, but a 2% decrease over the last "normal" year 2019.
- 2) **Property Discretionary**. The only discretionary equipment purchase that is being recommended is an air conditioner for Pastor's Office for \$300.
- **3) Property Major Capital Project**. A return to normal in 2022 will see coffee hours resume, fund raisers being held, as well as potential rental opportunities. Council believes it is time to replace the basement floor.

All materials will be waterproof (foam subfloor, waterproof vinyl plank floor). This would be done by volunteer labour under leadership from Dave and Jeff. Total cost would be approximately **\$9,000.** It is

proposed by council that we go ahead with this project with funding from reserves with a special capital campaign to replace the money over the next 5 to 10 years.

- **5. ADMINISTRATION:** (prepared by Alison). This area includes office supplies, postage, Zoom subscription, Banking costs and non-recoverable HST. The budget is **\$1,395**, \$240 less than 2021.
- 6. BENEVOLENCE: (prepared by Alison & Council). Benevolence is money sent to the Eastern Synod. It covers the Bishop's office including 3 assistants and 4 administration personnel, as well as some support for the National Church (ELCIC) and Martin Luther College (the seminary). The budget for Benevolence is a commitment of \$4,380 (a +2% over 2021 commitment). Note: If we are in surplus, then we will remit up to \$5,110 (+2% over 2021 actual).
- 7. OUTREACH: (prepared by Andy & Alison; discussed with Jeff and Cathy). This area includes the support of organizations outside of St. John's and Eastern Synod. Here are assumptions used in developing the budget
 - St. John's priority is to survive financially and in 2022 to have a break-even budget. Without a viable church, we cannot support others. (An interesting analogy is the advice from the Flight Attendant: "don your oxygen mask first, then help others!")
 - Support of Outreach must be in addition to support of St. John's needs;
 - We should support a limited number of causes and make a commitment to them each year. Today, we communicate appeals from a number of organizations and let members decide what to support; that results in varying levels of commitment from one year to the next.
 - The congregation should have input to "our" causes those that we want to support.

The table below shows the proposed 2022 Outreach budget; it totals **\$1,875**, about \$1,000 below 2021 – essentially the amount we donated to the Solar Panels.

2022 Budget – a New Approach

The 2022 budget proposes a new approach where the congregation commits to supporting the Operating budget, plus Benevolence and the selected outreach organizations listed above out of "one pot" of donations – we'll call that our **Commitments**.

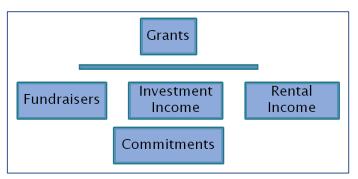
- You will not be asked to donate to Outreach causes in the budget (see the table above) but we'll communicate donations made on your behalf.
- We will not ask you to support any other appeals. Information will be made available on causes authorized by SYNOD (e.g., CLWR Gifts from the Heart) where St. John's members have supported in the past, but there will be no appeal made.
- St. John's will handle individual givings to organizations we support (CLWR and Food Bank) for causes that are not supported by the "one pot". Examples:
 - i. The congregation will support the Chickens for the Food Bank, but someone who wishes to give to the Food Bank in general, can still do so.
 - ii. The congregation supports CLWR emergency appeals up to our budget amount. Someone who wishes can still give to CLWR general (undesignated) or other.

It is important to understand that any additional givings listed above should be outside of your support for St. John's commitments. Clear communication will follow on how to make these extra givings.

INCOME

Grants: (prepared by Alison). Operating Grants (e.g. COVID subsidies) are nice to get, but we can't count on them. Budget for 2022 is **\$0.**

Fun(d)raisers: (prepared by Alison and Maureen). Continue the Christmas Bazaar; replace the Yard Sale with other events (special themed Suppers). Budget: **\$3,800** which is about the same as 2019, and \$1,000 over 2021.



Investment Income: (prepared by Alison). Half of our reserves are invested with the Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada. We have earned between \$2,000 and \$2,800 the past two years. Budget **\$2,500**.

Rental Income: (prepared by Alison with input from Dave; to be overseen by a new Rental Committee). This involves making a concerted effort in 2022 to market the rental our space to select groups who share the church's values – fitness classes, meetings, etc. Budget for 2022 is **\$1,000** (admittedly a stretch goal).

Commitments: (prepared by Alison). A balanced budget means that our **Commitment donations** must equal our **Expenses** less **Other Sources** of income). The 2022 budgeted Commitments) are: **\$78,713**. This is an increase of **4.5%** over donations the congregation made last year to Current, Benevolence, Camp Lutherlyn, Chickens for the Food Bank and CLWR special appeals. Council is confident our congregation can meet this goal.

Camp Lutherlyn

It was another busy year of adaptation and mission at Camp Lutherlyn.

Here are some highlights:



- We hired one student thanks to a Canada Summer Jobs to assist with programming.
- We received \$3,700 from Zion Pembroke's Endowment Fund, which was directed to the washer/dryer for the comfort station. Zion held its summer parish picnic at camp.
- Our Annual General Meeting occurred on June 5, 2021. Emily Savage and Dionne Schuler joined our Board.
- Camp continues to pursue accreditation through the Ontario Camps Association. A mandated site visit was pushed back due to the pandemic.
- Camp accepted the bell and cross from the former St. James Church in Renfrew. They will be installed in 2022.
- A new five-year lease was completed with Synod. The Hoffman Beach property is included. As part of this, a \$10,000 investment to our capital improvement fund will be set up for required lifecycle items to a maximum of \$50,000. This replaces reliance on Synod's \$15,000 annual operational grants.
- Financially, the Camp has been able to weather the pandemic through generous donations, a temporary CEBA loan, and some grants.
- The new Comfort Station was completed after many years of planning and fundraising.
- Due to the pandemic, Children's overnight Camp was not held. However, online programming was provided as well as two Family Rental weeks.
- Virtual Camp on Facebook Live had 859 views in week 1 and 1073 views in week 2. Sunday campfires had 1606 views.
- Lutherlyn participated in Synod Assembly with a video.
- We undertook our most successful fundraising event ever! The 100 dollars by 100 people in 100 days campaign raised funds to support improvements at Hoffman Beach. The project has also been selected as our next Legacy Project.
- The Fire Pit was completed at Bancroft Cabin thanks to fundraising and improvements were made inside. A fridge was also donated.
- Thank you to Ingrid Trautim for assisting with grounds work.
- A metal roof was installed on Rephael Cabin.
- Some forestry work was completed to ensure safety and clean up of Hoffman Beach continued.
- New directional signage was designed and will be installed in 2022.
- Rental revenue helped sustain the camp totalling \$55,000 in 2022.
- We actively posted on Facebook and Instagram. Information can also be found on our website.

Perseverance is a good word to describe the year that was 2021. The Covid-19 pandemic is proving to be more of a marathon rather than a sprint. And yet, in so many ways across our Synod, congregations and individuals continue to act with amazing resilience, courage and faithfulness. We have just closed the books on the fiscal year of 2021, and we wanted to write to you to thank you for your continued financial support and amazing generosity. While this still represents an overall decrease in benevolence givings, given the uncertainty surrounding the ongoing pandemic, it is not nearly as catastrophic as it could have been. For your faithfulness, generosity, and partnership in ministry, we remain so, so grateful.

We would also like to remind you that you can revisit the different ministry areas that your benevolence offerings help to support by viewing again *Our Ministry Together* – a series of short videos intended to highlight and celebrate areas of our common mission across the Eastern Synod.
