Our social media and technical experts have allowed all to participate in worship, conversations, book discussions, Bible studies, meetings, and hearing "other "presiders & preachers – **all without being in the same location.** In conclusion, these comments were made:

- we need to maintain ongoing resourcefulness,
- there is no going back to what we used to do,
- new ideas and possibilities are varied.

Both of our churches have Annual General Meetings coming up. Please think about this same question. **"What's next for our church"?** What is *your vision* for your faith community? What are we going to do this year? We celebrate that God has remained present with us in a different way, and we look forward to seeing where God's grace and love lead us next.

Minutes of the January 16th, 2022

Meeting was called to order at 12:00 noon.

- 1. Previous Minutes: Dave moved that the Dec 15th, 2021 minutes be approved as distributed, Andy seconded, CARRIED.
- 2. Finance: Ulla has agreed to act as auditor for the 2021 books.
- **3. AGM**: Council meeting next on Feb 21st. Council needs to approve the financials before they go to the auditor. Suggest an early special meeting to approve the financials. Message regarding the 2022 budget to congregation needs to be clear.
- 4. **Pastor's report**: Pastor presented her activity report. It was a busy month. Pr. Stan had two funerals during Pastor's vacation.
- **5. COVID Protocols:** Lorne and Andy to present a report to council. Suggest we approach the re-opening decision on a rolling two week basis.
- **6. Communications:** Facebook 120 reaches on Christmas Eve service. Rachel suggested doing a profile on Pastor for facebook and Newsletter. Possibly a video.
- 7. Operations matters: Work continues on job descriptions focussing on providing details.
- **8. Tech and Property:** The switcher box is being replaced under warranty. This will let us record directly to a hard-drive from the switcher, increasing quality of both sound and audio.
- 9. Other Business:
 - Email vote policy Andy moved the policy be accepted, Debbie seconded, CARRIED.
 - Motion concerning Annual GM to be held no later than April 30th, 2022. This would allow better chance of being able to hold it in-person. Andy moved and Dave seconded. CARRIED.
 - Planning Cycle: was reviewed.
 - NEXT MEETING: Tuesday, Feb 22^{nd-}1:00 p.m.

Worship Services in February

We plan to **resume in-person worship at St. John's on Sunday, February 20, 10:30 a.m.** This has been decided given current recommendations from our Re-opening Task Force and from Synod, and from counsel with our local public health unit. When we resume, safety procedures that we've become accustomed to will once again be in place:

- Welcoming roles (screening, attendance record, masks, physical distancing and hand sanitizing).
- Facilitated movement throughout the service (e.g. entry, Holy Communion, exit) and attention to safe distancing, sequential exiting and limited personal interaction within the building.
- Worshippers are encouraged to bring and keep with them a minimum of personal belongings.
- Hymnals used will be the new cranberry Evangelical Lutheran Worship books in the pews.

Pre-recorded, online worship will continue for February 6 and 13. See your emails, our website or our Facebook for links. For those of us without ready access to internet, please watch for hand delivery of printed services for 1 or both of these 2 Sundays.

We thank you again, Pastor Norine, producer Dave, readers and altar guild for your ongoing ministries in this preparation and broadcasting service.

We look forward to your presence Sunday, February 20 and onwards, and thank you for continued faithful support and safe participation in the congregation and community in varied ways. Should situations change between now and February 20, we will reassess the opening date and more communication will go out by email and by phone/by hand if needed.

Message from Bishop Michael regarding COVID

January 24, 2022

Eastern Synod

Dear Colleagues,

When I communicated with you at the beginning of this month, it was my counsel that all churches across our synod should pause their in-person worship until the end of January. I was encouraged to see that the vast majority of congregations chose to do so. Thank you for your continued commitment to the health and well-being of your neighbours and communities. This is, indeed, an act of love.

As the regulations within our four provinces begin to lessen, with children returning to school and businesses reopening, I would encourage you to extend the pause of in-person gatherings for an additional two weeks. This will allow time for the projected peak of the Omicron Variant, and for the public health effects of the lessening of restrictions to become better known. As such, should current trends continue, I would recommend that congregations wishing to resume in-person worship consider doing so with a **February 20, 2022** target date. As always, please be sure to consult with your local public health for regulations specific to your region.

I, and my colleagues in the office, remain available to support you as we navigate the days ahead. We are in the early stages of planning a Synod Wide Pentecost service (more information will be available soon); and have scheduled a series of zoom meetings with rostered leaders in the days ahead. Additional opportunities for lay and rostered leaders to gather virtually for learning and conversation are also available.

I am cognizant of the fact that this recommendation will bring relief to some of you and consternation to others. You are, of course, free to either accept or disregard my counsel. I do, however, feel compelled to provide it to you and do so with love, prayers and all best wishes for your continued health and wellbeing and that of the communities with whom you serve. God's peace be with you! Bishop Michael

The Signature Behind the Wall

1947 - Some of us were around and some were not. The Second World War had ended just two years previously, and many were still trying to find their place in the world. Arnprior, McNab, and Braeside were growing. Young Eric Obst was helping build his sister Elsie's house. He was 15 years old and circumstance and the times had him out earning a wage, rather than continuing in formal schooling.

We all likely have an innate desire to leave our mark on this world, and Eric decided to do it literally: he wrote his name on the boards behind joists in the house. It was a sly gesture, he would know it was there, but no one else would. It would be hidden behind plaster, behind wallpaper and paint, and wall hangings, and



the cloak of time. No one but Eric Obst would know until 2022. Kaitlin Pierce and her husband Dan Hubert were renovating the home, and, despite the solid construction, were able to expose the walls to find the signature of a young man at the start of his eventful life.

Eric Obst was born in Arnprior. Like a lot of us, he is the child of immigrants. His parents, after arriving from Germany, worked as indentured farm workers in Stewartville, but were able to eventually move closer to Arnprior. The Obsts, like many, lived on a very low income given the ravages of a depression and two horrible wars, but Eric never thought he was poor. "We had the fortune to have some pigs and chickens and that gave us food that a lot of town people could not afford." Eric recently recalled.

Eric found employment at Arnprior's "Cabinet Factory". The company did lots of specialty wood work, and eventually found a market in making cabinets for the new invention of television. By his own admission, Eric did not totally love working there, but one of his mentors advised him to hang in: "I can make a refinisher out of you young fella, and you never know where that can come in handy." He persevered, and he learned, and he became a refinisher and cabinet maker.

Time went on and Eric married and raised a family but that will be a story for another day. Eric left the Cabinet Factory. Eric and his brother Gordie opened up a garage. Time marched onwards. The government moved the highway. A garage not on the highway does not work. The garage closed. Things were looking gloomy.

But years previously, someone had said "I can make a refinisher out of you young fella and you never know where that can come in handy". So Eric went into the refinishing business for over three decades. Eric's speciality was working on refinishing woodwork in churches in the Ottawa Valley and beyond. In fact, the ash pews at St John's Lutheran were lovingly restored by Eric Obst.

Eric did a lot more for our church and our community than just work with wood, but again, that is a story for another day. In a few weeks the signature tag of the young Eric Obst will again be hidden. But it will still be there, waiting to be discovered maybe one day in the future. And when people in the Ottawa Valley attend worship in their own churches there is a good chance that they will see the skill of Eric Obst.
