

May 18, 2020

1. Meeting was called to order at 7:30 and Pastor opened with devotions and a prayer.

2. Previous Minutes:

Ryan moved the minutes be approved as published, Dave seconded. CARRIED

3. Pastor's report:

- a. Pastor presented her activity report. Pastor is attending a week-long seminar on preaching.
- b. Pastor is taking a week of holidays June 4-11.
- c. Worship schedule readers to record themselves 2 Sundays June 21st June 28th perhaps youth for fathers' day.
- d. Prayer List was updated to be sent out again.
- e. Discussion around adding 3rd service in June 14th
- f. DVD's are not being produced at this point.

4. Finance:

- a. Even though we had unusual revenue last year, we are roughly at the same position.
- b. Opportunity to apply for grant due to reduction in income. For the first period, it appears that we may qualify for the 75% subsidy due to more that a 15% drop during this period. We need to properly account for the revenue to ensure correct eligibility.
- c. Synod request for communication regarding request to lobby the government regarding loss of fundraising opportunities. Recommending that Enid, Pastor and Randy rework the communication, and are nearly ready to send out. Randy moved that the Letter that Enid reworked be reviewed by Pastor then sent out. Ryan Seconded, CARRIED (To be shared with council prior).
- d. Now have E-Transfer capability (thanks to Jeff for his help).
- Banking: Cannot transfer GIC prior to maturity date (restriction due to COVID).

5. Outreach:

- a. Jeff has the compassionate justice grant application form.
- b. Still volunteering with Food Bank when requested. Randy and Cathy back him up.

6. Property:

- a. Randy reported that the Town has deferred the Alicia project until next year. They reported that they have no record or photos of our hookup. Randy talked to the individual who did the work around our foundation. Other members of the congregation are seeking out further information.
- b. An enormous thank you to those who continue to go into the Church every day to check on things.
- c. Question regarding the grass cutting Pastor will reach out to some members of the congregation.
- d. Discussion regarding foundation -on hold pending the town, COVID etc.

7. Marketing:

- a. Enid asked if we are planning for the BIG Give cleanup? Randy suggested we go ahead with the cleanup on June 13nd cleanup activity. Limit to 10 participants.
- b. Enid will post the Mental Health info on Facebook.
- c. Pastor forwarded her interview (on Inside Ottawa Valley) to the Bishop.
- d. The May 9th service video was watched by 47 people, for a total of 7.6 hours of viewing time.

8. Other Business:

- a. Pastor talked about the plan of this newsletter to include pictures and stories of youth activities number of outreach message to encourage this.
- b. Discussion around when our services might restart. Waiting for direction from Synod and results from Alberta resuming services.

Astronomy Corner—Andy Kalnins

"So the **sun** stood still, and the moon stopped, till the nation avenged itself on its enemies, as it is written in the Book of Jashar. The **sun** stopped in the middle of the sky and delayed going down about a full day."

The above passage from the Book of Joshua talks of how the army of Israel needed extra time to make waste of some highly inconvenient people in their way, so the Lord actually granted an extra full day of sun. I will leave it to those with liturgical training to explain this, but certainly we are all being granted more hours of daylight in each passing day this month. On Saturday June 20th we observe the Summer Solstice. On that day we get 15 hours 40 minutes 24 seconds of sunlight. Contrast that with the 8 hours 42 minutes 52 seconds that we will get on December 21st. So let's use this gift of light for many things, but perhaps not for smiting our enemies.

Last month Venus was a very bright evening star and now by mid June it is suddenly a bright morning star. How did that happen? Well Venus is zipping around the sun, just like the earth. Most of this year is was, from our view, trailing the sun, but now it has suddenly moved in front to the sun. We see Venus rise and only then it is followed by the sun.



It is worth getting up early on the mornings of June 17, 18, and 19. The waning crescent moon will be doing an intricate dance with Venus, becoming very, very close on the 19th. Our friends in Atlantic Canada would actually see the moon cover up Venus, but we are too far west to see that. It will be tough to see but I am going to give it a whirl. And just a note of interest; you may see a little fuzzy patch of stars above the moon. That is the Pleiades - part of the winter constellation Taurus the Bull. Yep, winter is coming

The moon on the 19th will be a tough to see sliver as it disappears into the morning sky and it is an old and aging moon as it sinks below the horizon. But fear not! It comes back as the New Moon on Sunday the 21st. See if you can be the first to spot it!!

- Don't let worry kill you off let the Church help.


Tidbits from our younger families


