Recently I selected a book from my home library belonging to my mother. (Some items one just does not part with.) It is Anne Morrow Lindbergh's slim book <u>Selections From Gift</u> <u>from the Sea</u>. Anne was the wife of the famous American aviator Charles Lindbergh. Anne had a busy life, travelling, flying, and caring for a home and family. She was also a spiritual seeker.

Written 65 years ago her words ring true today.

"It is difficult today to leave one's friends and family and deliberately practice the art of solitude for an hour or a day or a week. And yet, once it is done, I find there is a quality to being alone that is incredibly precious. Life rushes back into the void, richer, more vivid, fuller than before." p.15

"For it is not physical solitude that actually separates one from other men, not physical but spiritual isolation. When one is a stranger to oneself, one is estranged from others too. If one is out of touch with one's self, then one cannot touch others. Only when one is connected to one's own core is one connected to others, I am beginning to discover." p16

Of course you are welcome to explore other sites, as listed on the ELCIC website.


There will be a print copy of my weekly meditation posted on our respective Facebook pages and websites and sent out by email.

Council Meeting Minutes

April 20, 2020

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 and Pastor opened with devotions and a prayer.

1. Previous Minutes:

Randy moved the minutes be approved as published, Enid seconded. CARRIED

2. Pastor's report:

- Pastor was interviewed for the local (Renfrew and Arnprior) papers.
- Suggestion that we plan for a Zoom session Sunday, April 3rd. This week April 26th will be a trial with Pastor doing the taping

3. Finance:

- Congregational givings up over \$1000 over budget. PAR has enabled a steady stream of income. We've received 6 donations from Canada Helps. Also, several members are putting cash away which we won't see until we resume so, position is even better.
- Healthy bank account and investments.
- We've applied for the 10% wage subsidy for 3 months. Randy has spoken to Keith Myra re the 75% subsidy. However, with our givings being up, we don't qualify for March. Randy continues to monitor the conditions for eligibility.

4. Outreach:

Jeff continues to make contact with the Food Bank and makes deliveries. The food bank is no longer accepting donations of individual items – only from suppliers. Randy to follow up regarding the Food Bank cheque.

5. Property:

Randy continues to monitor the Town work project – no additional information at this time.

6. Marketing:

- Enid presented the Marketing and Communications report (see attached).
- We generated a "Friends of the Parish" email list (22). Our member email list is 43.
- Facebook 50 posts.
- Web site 16 posts.
- DVD's were created and distributed to a few people.

7. Other Business:

- VBS Ryan is recommending that we don't hold VBS this year. Randy questioned if there were something else we could do? Ryan thought we might post recorded sessions for sharing with young families. Randy wondered if we could recreate the Lorne & Maureen puppet show. Pastor suggested we consider applying for a YAYA grant for 2021 VBS to hire a coordinator / director. Deadline is September.
- · Cory thanked Randy for the Bell ringing on Easter
- Randy received two complaints regarding the changes to the envelopes. Randy outlined the rational for the decision should council members be asked about this.
- Randy moved that we do not hold the Big Give BBQ. Instead, we go back to the road clean-up small groups, perhaps spread over two days. CARRIED
- Jeff to follow up why Arnprior Food Bank is not part of Food Banks Canada.

MARKETING: Finalized SJL Yard Sale Planning letter for the May Mustard Seed Newsletter (E.B.)

Email: Devotions, services, local and national letters, April Mustard Seed newsletter etc. sent to email membership list (43). Many with links to sites. Separate Friends of the Parish email list (22) developed for all general mailouts, e.g. Mustard Seed, devotions, services, and related links.

How to grow Friends of Parish list; can others contribute?

Website: minimum of 16 posts, including April Mustard Seed newsletter, and 2 videos (Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday), from approximately March 18 to April 19. We have never had analytics installed on the site, so we've had no stats for site visits/page views. I am in the process of installing Google Analytics so that we'll have this information in the future.

YouTube: 2 videos prepared and produced

Palm Sunday: some 113 views to date, 1 like, 1 comment some 11 hr. of viewing

Easter Sunday: some 122 views to date, 3 likes, 1 comment, some 14-15 hr. of viewing

Currently it takes me about 6 - 8 hours to splice together the video (add music, with lyrics), fine tune the transitions, match the sound to the video, get the audio levels approximately even, compress and upload. This time is coming down, I'm getting better at it each time.



Astronomy Corner—Andy Kalnins



We are still far away from the Christmas Readings, but has anyone wondered why, when the heavenly hosts announced the birth of the Infant Jesus, that it was to the shepherds? Was it because they were the lowest of the low and they should be the first to hear of the highest of the high? Was a good way to deal with the continued metaphor of the shepherd in the Hebrew Scriptures. Or was it something simpler? Was it because the shep-

herds were the only ones looking at the night sky, and they saw what they saw because there were out and about, and everybody else was locked in their homes, oblivious to the miracle outside?

Don't be the ones to miss the miracle. Get out there a look; during this time of lockdown and restraint, it is a free and safe activity and you always see more than you thought you would see. Here are highlights for May.

Venus - Venus is the brightest star in the sky for May! It shines like a beacon in the west as soon as the sun sets, and those with keen eyes can likely see when it is barely dusk. Venus is of course not a star but a sister planet to the earth, just about the same size but not a great place to visit as the surface temperature at 800 degrees plus (°F) makes it as hot as a wood fired pizza oven, the air pressure is equivalent to what it is beneath the ocean at 3000 feet of depth, and the clouds of pure sulphuric acid would wreck havoc on the paint of your new car (not mention the entire car). But If you look at Venus night after night you will notice something; each night Venus is going to be a touch less bright and a bit lower in the sky especially after the 13th of May. Venus is about to disappear as the Evening Star and by mid June will emerge as the Morning Star. If you have binoculars (wide field ones are perfect) look at Venus on the evenings of the 23rd and 24th as not only will there be Venus, a crescent New Moon, but also, the very elusive and speedy Mercury, all maybe in the same view!

Jupiter and Saturn - These two giant plants patrol the morning sky in May. They rise from the east shortly after midnight. But early risers will readily spot them in the morning sky before it gets too light. If you look to the south east the brightest object in the sky will be the brilliant Jupiter, and just a little to the left and above will be the dimmer and white/yellow glow of Saturn. As we on earth continue our journey around the sun, and Jupiter and Saturn do the same, after mid May the two will drift apart.

The Moon - Full Moon on the 7th and New Moon on the 22nd. It is worth getting up early on the morning of the 12th of May as Jupiter, Saturn, and the moon will be bunched up in the sky, just like bunnies heading off to the hop

So that is it for now. And remember those shepherds, because you will never see a miracle unless you look for one!

News from St. James Evangelical Lutheran Church in Renfrew

What is this I hear? St James is for sale??? — Yes you heard correctly, but are we closing??? **NO!**

St James has been struggling financially for years. We have not been able to afford a full time pastor since 2005. We had a part-time pastor for 5 years. We shared an Anglican priest for 4 years.

How fortunate were we when the Synod approached St John's about sharing Pastor Norine & both she & St John's were willing to

give this a try. After 5 years of enjoying our 30% of Pastor Norine (but it feels like 100%), it has been determined that financially we only have enough remaining funds to last another 3 years.

Our attendance has remained constant, but our aging building is starting to fall apart & costs us more & more to maintain.

NOW WHAT?

At our AGM this year the motion was made that "St James church building be put up for sale" This motion was approved, with an 80% vote in favour.

But our congregation plans on surviving, even without the building. It was discerned that we wish to keep worshipping in Renfrew, so we are looking at options of rental space – somewhere available for Sunday morning worship – maybe a chapel at a retirement or nursing home - & some office space – maybe in a member's house.

Our decision will not change the financial shared ministry arrangement we currently have with St John's.

Who knows what the future holds for us, but with God's guidance, we venture into unknown territory & plan on coming out stronger.

CAMP LUTHERLYN UPDATE April 2020

We want to share the following Camp Lutherlyn news with you.

JULY CHILDREN'S CAMP

- Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, Camp Lutherlyn has made some decisions for the 2020 Summer Camp season. We know that this is difficult for our campers, parents, staff and camp alumni, but we feel it is the right thing to do.
 - ♦ The four weeks of children's camp in July have been cancelled
 - We are hopeful that we may be able to run a children's camp in August, but will make decisions on this in the upcoming months
- There are many factors affecting our decision, particularly how long the precautionary measures currently in place to limit the spread of COVID-19 will last.

AUGUST FAMILY CAMP

- Family Camp from August 2 to 7 has **not** been cancelled; we will be monitoring the public health restrictions as the date approaches.
- Arrangements to keep people safe are being made. For example, each family would have their own living space (cabin or bedroom at Four Seasons); meals could be done as take-away; additional sanitization procedures will be in place; and appropriate physical distancing maintained during all group activities.

We are modifying our Canada Summer Student Grant application for 2 student positions to support this property work.
