## Council Meeting Minutes

October 19<sup>th</sup> 2020

### Attendance

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 and Pastor opened with devotions and a prayer.

### Pastor's report:

- Pastor presented her report. Two recommendations for future reports:
  - ◇ Total hours on report should equal total hrs worked for previous month (i.e. 4wk month = 4 x 37.5 hrs. = 150 hrs.)
  - ◇ Time frame for report should be the same as other council reports (i.e. previous calendar month)

### Finance:

Randy presented the P&L, Balance Sheet and comparison to budget. At this point we are \$2500 positive, compared to last year of a \$8,000 deficit. Givings are up, Technology Fund received \$1,500.

### Previous Minutes

Dave moved acceptance as amended (corrected for Enid's attendance), and Cory seconded. Carried.

### Communications

- Enid reported on activity: Facebook 35 posts, continues to get good viewership, continued contact support for 6 households, household deliveries of service scripts has been reduced from 20 to 12 now that in person worship has resumed.
- YAYA grant application submitted for youth leader.
- Dave presented picture of the YouTube activity – averaging 44 views per service.
- Dave presented various options showing workload and pre-requisite for next steps in our technology upgrade. Dave to investigate borrowing a large computer to facilitate the recording / streaming.–
- Dave will continue to work toward live-stream as a future project. Near term priority is combining recorded music and live reader and pastoral service leadership for in person worship and following the service, upload to YouTube.
- Dave to email a reminder regarding details for next Sunday's service to congregation members on email.

## Astronomy Corner—Andy Kalnins

### Revelation 9:1

*“And the fifth angel sounded, and I saw a star fall from heaven unto the earth: and to him was given the key of the bottomless pit”*

All of that sounds pretty intense, and stars do not fall, but it sure looks like it when we see a meteor streaking through the air. A meteor is just a piece of loose space debris that our earth plows into. As we all sit or stand on our frail planet we are oblivious to the fact that we are travelling through space orbiting the sun at 30 kilometres per second ( per second! - just in case you thought that was a typo). Every day we plow into hundreds of tons of stuff; most of it is like the sand stuck on your feet after a walk on the beach. One day we will collide with something about 20 km in size and then we will have something in common with dinosaurs but let's leave that cheery story for another day.

But we know that with some certainty that on the morning (as in pre dawn ) of November 17th we are plowing into more stuff than usual and the event is called the Leonid Meteor Shower. The predictions this year are for a pretty dull shower but you never know; if you are up early it is worth bundling up and looking at sky towards the east.

Mars, Saturn, and Jupiter still dominate the night sky but the morning of November 13th, just before the sun rises, is a good time to spot Mercury. Mercury is the closest planet to the sun. It is the smallest planet (Pluto is NOT a planet) and is about the size of the moon and has a rocky surface. It would be hard to dress for a trip to Mercury as the daytime highs are in excess of 800 degrees Fahrenheit and at night the surface temperature drops to almost minus 180 degrees Fahrenheit.

The ancients were well aware of Mercury but a lot of modern people have never seen this first planet nearest to the sun. It is always close to the horizon and bathed in sunlight. But try looking on the morning of the 13th. Mercury will be very faint, about 4 degrees from the very old moon. Binoculars help.
