Inspirational Bee Story



My dad has bees.  Today I went to his house and he showed me all of the honey he had gotten from the hives. He took the lid off of a 5 gallon bucket full of honey and on top of the honey there were 3 little bees, struggling. They were covered in sticky honey and drowning. I asked him if we could help them and he said he was sure they wouldn't survive. Casualties of honey collection I suppose.

I asked him again if we could at least get them out and kill them quickly, after all he was the one who taught me to put a suffering animal (or bug) out of its misery. He finally conceded and scooped the bees out of the bucket. He put them in an empty Chobani yogurt container and put the plastic container outside.

Because he had disrupted the hive with the earlier honey collection, there were bees flying all over outside.

We put the 3 little bees in the container on a bench and left them to their fate. My dad called me out a little while later to show me what was happening. These three little bees were surrounded by all of their sisters (all of the bees are females) and they were cleaning the sticky nearly dead bees, helping them to get all of the honey off of their bodies.

We came back a short time later and there was only one little bee left in the container. She was still being tended to by her sisters.

When it was time for me to leave we checked one last time and all three of the bees had been cleaned off enough to fly away and the container was empty.

Those three little bees lived because they were surrounded by family and friends who would not give up on them, family and friends who refused to let them drown in their own stickiness and resolved to help until the last little bee could be set free.


Bee Sisters. Bee family. Bee Peers. Bee Teammates.

Minutes of the September 26th, 2022 Council Meeting

Meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm.

Pastor opened with a prayer.

- 1. Previous Minutes:** Debbie moved that the June 27, 2022 minutes be approved as distributed. Fred seconded, **CARRIED**. Also Debbie moved that the August 22, 2022 minutes for approval as distributed. Andy seconded, **CARRIED**.
- 2. Finance:** The deficit to the end of August is \$9,323. Commitments are \$2,240 under budget. Investment return is \$3,700 below budget. Utilities are \$350 over budget. Recommendations: Follow-up concerns about changes in donations, early Christmas appeal letter, year-end letter to Friends of the Parish suggesting a donation towards the Online Services. Christmas Eve 5:30 service with a pageant and envelopes in the bulletin and pass the plate. Alison moved that the Finance report be approved, seconded by Debbie, **CARRIED**.
- 3. Children and Youth:** Full Youth Planning Team to review some ideas for engaging youth put forth by Ryan and Alison. The youth led services under Ryan Zimmerling's leadership was "kid" friendly which also brought parents and grandparents to church which increased attendance. The UNPLUG events continue to engage children in different interesting activities. It was suggested that there be a youth led service once a month, the next one being in November. Sunday school will resume starting Oct.16 and volunteers are needed so as not to overtax Ryan. There will be a float in the Christmas parade.
- 4. Visioning Retreat** held September 24, 2022 with facilitator Pastor Lori Pilatzke. Attendees were:

A brief summary (assets, ideas, focus) was presented. Brainstorming ideas discussed included:

Rentals, family worship, educational programs, partnerships, more volunteers, grants, mentoring, parenting classes, bike rodeo, blue Christmas and other recognition of hard times, cherub choir, movie nights, signage, alternatives to Christian rites (birth, marriage, death), caring conversations & partial rental of the church building, youth group and review of worship.

Council discussed some follow-up, including presentation, dialogue with and approval in principle process from congregation on any plans involving changes and major financial matters.

It was decided that presentations of the 3 focus areas will take place on Oct. 30, Nov. 6 & 13 after the service to the congregation. Dave will conduct small group walk throughs explaining the possible physical changes to the building.

5. **Pastor's report:** This is for 2 months consisting of Kargus wedding preparation, visioning retreat, Rosiens 65th Wedding Anniversary celebration, Funerals at St. James, RAY meeting, men's breakfast, retreat planning/attendance, as well as her regular worship work, pastoral care and visits. The Pastoral Care Committee has helped her to be able to make 11 new contacts, including 8 in person visits, which was hard to do before.
 6. **Outreach:** Andy reported that there will be no Outreach activities for the remainder of 2022 as timing is not on our side. As well, support for the Fountain and the Food Bank are already in place. Application for Synod Compassionate Justice grant for Food Bank children's SnackPacks is being submitted by September 30. Outreach seeks approval, in principle, for fundraising for Hospice in February 2023. Outreach also suggests we resume a funding drive for Christmas Chickens in 2023; a heads up for budget process and planning. Enid advised of opportunity to meet with Rwandan peacebuilder Jean and family, finally being reunited here, on Oct. 16, Grace St. Andrews United Church, 12:00-3:00.
 7. **Communications:** Newsletter input deadline is October 4. Short term mission grant reports going in this week. Consideration of honouring volunteers.
 8. **Operations matters:** No Report
 9. **Property:** Regular chair lift maintenance was done. The vinyl for the kitchen arrived last week. Work on basement floor continues and with luck they will keep ahead of schedule.

All are welcome to meet Jean de Dieu Basabose and his family, on Sunday, October 16, 12-3 p.m. at the Christian Education Centre.

This is a time to rejoice as a long journey is coming to an end. Jean first visited with us in 2015, when he met and spoke with St. John's folks. Later, in May 2018, Jean left his beloved Rwanda, given threats to this life over his peace-building and anti-corruption work. Canada and our community provided a safe haven for him and he has become a Canadian resident. Sadly, his family could not come; they reached safety in another part of Africa. The family maintained daily contact over 4 1/2 yr.

Now they will be reunited. Grace and their 3 boys arrive in Canada October

6. Since the family considers Arnprior as their Canadian home community, they will spend 2+ weeks here to meet many who have provided love and support. They will then move to the Waterloo Region where Jean works for organizations that support refugee resettlement and community-based research, and will live in Ayr, Ontario and begin their Canadian family life there.

Arnpriorcares has supported Jean and family since 2018. It is an initiative organized by Arnprior community members in 4 church communities, Emmanuel Anglican Church, Gateway Church, Grace St. Andrew's United Church and St. John's Lutheran Church, and includes some Waterloo region supporters now, too. Basement Floor Project

Many hardworking volunteers have nearly finished the basement. At this point all the Vinyl has been laid in the main room, the kitchen and the rear hallway and washrooms. Solid core, water-proof vinyl plank was laid over an underlay which is also waterproof and allows air circulation underneath. The concrete floor had many spots which needed to be chiselled or ground off. Randy, Rex and Jeff did the bulk of this dirty work.

A new storage closet was built to house the extra chairs and tables not in use.

The kitchen floor is a complementary colour to the main area to better blend with the cabinets.

There will be an official re-opening of the basement on Reformation Sunday, October 30th. Coffee hour will be held in the basement.

Information Sessions: Visioning and Planning

As noted in the minutes of the Council meeting of September 26, (item 5) 9 members of St. John's participated in a retreat time with facilitator Rev. Lori Pilatzke, on September 24. We considered results of our congregational visioning survey, where we are now, our hopes, our assets and some possibilities for moving forward together.

This ongoing visioning and planning work was anticipated some years ago. It now continues in light of the effects of COVID since 2019, and general diminishment of in person worship attendance and in representation across varied life stages among membership. We also recognize that this retreat is but one step in our work, and that further gatherings and discussions with all are needed as to how we continue as a community.

As part of these further gatherings, **information sessions will be held with members on several areas of possible change and focus named at the retreat**, building renovation and rental, youth group concept, and worship review.

These are currently projected to begin the end of this month.


Sep 25: "Build, Decorate and Fly a Kite": Five children took part in the Kites event led by Dave Burkett with help from Phoenix Mosiondz-Sagmeister and Alison as host. We started off in the Sanctuary (after a great BBQ social – thanks



Randy & Debbie) to watch a short video on impressive professional kites to give the kids some ideas.



We then moved to the Lounge to decorate the kites - each child used their own creativity for the design – and build them. You'll see a picture of the final kites. We moved then to Walter Zadow School to try to fly them – there wasn't a breeze in the sky, but kids with the help of their adult, could get the kites flying by running. They spent quite a bit of time doing that and then moved over to play on the fantastic new playground equipment at the school. (P.S. This was the first UNPLUG event to be partially indoors – rain was



threatened – not good for kite decorating.)

Oct 2: "Eight kids learned, enjoyed and socialized in a 'Choose Your Own' Survival Adventure afternoon with activity leader Ryan and support Zach on Sunday afternoon, October 2nd. Glorious weather in the fall field and woods enhanced the outdoor time, as they chose:



What survival equipment to take into the forest? Which way to go? When you are lost, to stay put or move on? What to use to build a basic tarp shelter? What fire wood, stones and fire starting material to collect? Which is easier- flint lighting or match lighting? How to keep your fire going? What to find and do to help an injured group member? Where to hunt for water? What to do to attract aerial



search and rescue helicopters? How to stay together and support one another? A good afternoon with very engaged kids.





Upcoming UNPLUG Plans

Oct 16: “UNPLUG Challenge II” at Walter Zadow School. We decided to move this from Robert Simpson Park to the school because of the great playground equipment and the gaga ball pit. That will facilitate the children having a good chunk of unstructured play time as well as any organized challenges. Craig will lead this again with help from Zach and host Dave.

Nov 6: “Come Meet Indigo and Learn about Wild Bird Rehabilitation”. Patty McLaughlin, Education Program Coordinator from the Ottawa Valley Wild Bird Care Centre will lead this event at Fitzroy Provincial Park. Indigo is a live American Kestrel who can’t be released into the wild. Patty also uses taxidermy to keep the presentation as hands-on as possible. Participants will get to touch and explore many different wings, feet, and beaks during the presentation to help them with their understanding and identification of birds. Kids then can dissect real owl pellets to see what the owls have recently eaten – a very popular activity. Binoculars will be available for anyone arriving early.
