June 29th, 2020

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 and Pastor opened with devotions and a prayer.

1. Re-opening Task Force – Lorne Rueckwald

Lorne Rueckwald presented a very comprehensive report from the re-opening task force. The report defined the procedures we will need to follow and some work that needs to take place before we can re-open.

2. Pastor's report:

- a. Pastor outlined the proposal for the Sept 11th, WABA cottage worship service. (subsequently changed to be on the **Church Lawn**). We will need audio & video equipment. Dave to handle.
- b. Pastor presented the Worship Schedule for September
- c. Council agreed to provide Pastor with all necessary tools in order to do her job.

3. Finance:

- a. Randy presented the P&L, Balance Sheet and comparison to budget.
- b. Finances in good shape reflects all the good work of Pastor Norine and council maintaining contacts with the congregation and the tremendous support we are receiving from the congregation.

4. Communications:

Astronomy Corner—Andy Kalnins

And God said, "Let there be lights in the vault of the **sky** to separate the day from the night, and let them serve as signs to mark sacred times, and days and years,

He wasn't kidding. ... The Nile has flooded every year since there was a Nile River (there is no sense being in denial about that get it - Dee Nile....). Early risers will have no problem seeing the great constellation of Orion rising in the east before the sun and the Hunter is followed by the faithful dog Canis Major. This constellation has the very bright star Sirius in it (more on that in a few months). The ancient Egyptians meticulously scanned the sky, and as soon as they saw Sirius rise in the morning sky they knew it was time to skedaddle, because the flood was coming. So indeed, the words of the scripture above rang true. As the sun rises and bleaches the ink of the night sky get outside and look for Sirius. Would you have been able to dodge the floodwaters?

The Planets

As the sky darkens in the evening look to the south and you will see a pair of asymmetric eyes staring back at you. The brighter is Jupiter and the dimmer is Saturn. What would have the ancient shepherds have pondered as they looked at this pair of planets? They would have noticed that for the first bit of this month the pair is travelling apart but they they will move closer to each other with each passing night. In December, just a few days before Christmas they will closer together than in the last 20 years. A spectacular conjunction of two bright objects that together almost make a bright star; what could that mean on December 21st? But we are getting ahead of ourselves - check out these two giant planets on September 24 and September 25th - see how they dance with the moon.

Early risers cannot miss Venus; rising a full two hours before the sun, it shines like a beacon in the east north east. See how long you can see it after the sun rises. Our shepherds would have noticed that each successive morning the rise of Venus is lower and lower in the sky. It is headed to being an evening star, but not until March, so lots of mornings to go.

Mars rises in the east about half an hour into darkness and it is really best viewed after midnight, but even before that the bright orange glow is unmistakable. Mars will be getting brighter every successive night for a while and be sure to look at it this Friday and Saturday as it flirts with the moon; it looks like they are going to touch and in some parts of the world it will look just like that. But here in Renfrew County it will just be a Close Encounter.

Speaking of the Moon; Our Full Moon this month was in the wee hours of September 2 and the colloquial name for it is the Corn Moon. The Harvest Moon this year is on October 1st. It has to do with the timing of full moons and the Autumnal Equinox. This year, the sun shines parks itself at noon right above the equator on September 21st. So, compared to daylight, we have aequus nox as the Romans would have said, or equal night as we would say logically, or equinox as some linguist decided. (The night and day are not precisely equal here in the O Valley for reasons of refraction and latitude but that is a trivial matter)

I hope everybody saw at least a glimpse of this summer's comet and saw at least a few meteors. The night sky never is boring.







Elfriede Meindl (Vögele) August 17, 2020

Elfriede Meindl, dear wife of our beloved brother and colleague, the late Rev. Rolf Meindl, passed away peacefully and surrounded by her family at Christie Gardens, Toronto, on Monday, August 17th, 2020 at the age of 94 years. She was pre-deceased by her husband, Rev. Rolf Meindl, in 2012.

She is survived by her daughters, Susan Meindl (Andrew Waxman), Patricia Meindl, Carol Meindl (John Gyakum); her son, Rolf Meindl (Maria); and her grandchildren, Izzy and Laurie Waxman, Tim and James Gyakum and Douby Meindl.


A huge thank you goes out to the staff at Christie Gardens for the excellent care she received.

Elfriede and her husband Rolf came to Toronto from Germany in 1951 to start a new life and family. They moved to Nova Scotia in 1966 when Rolf became pastor of Trinity Lutheran church in New Germany, Lunenburg Co. It was in Nova Scotia that she discovered her natural talent for creating white china figurines of fishermen, farmers and nursery rhymes, using simple household tools such as a darning needle, tea strainer and rolling pin. Her figurines guickly became sought-after gifts and collectables which are still treasured in thousands of homes in Nova Scotia and all over the world. Lines would form to purchase her "Meindl Originals" when she exhibited at local craft markets such as Christmas at the Forum, The Dalplex and the Lunenburg Craft Market. Her work was recognised by the provincial government and in the 1970's and 80's "Meindl Figurines" were kept constantly on hand by the Nova Scotia Protocol office, as truly unique hand-crafted Nova Scotian gifts that could be offered when provincial leaders travelled or entertained. She also received several prestigious commissions from the province to create china sculptures based on local legends to be presented by the Nova Scotian government on ceremonial occasions such as the visit of the Governor General, Jules Leger in 1975, the Royal visits of the Queen Mother in 1979, and Prince Charles and Princess Diana in 1983. Mrs. Meindl continued to make figurines until she was well into her 70's, when she decide to write and illustrate a series of three children's novels; "Christopher", "The Adventures of Christopher and Angeline," and "The Magic Stone," published by Gaspereau Press. This trilogy of books can still be found in elementary school libraries around the province. After her husband died, life in her beloved home on the Fundy shore became too isolating and in 2015 she closed a personal circle, returning to Toronto where she lived close to children and grandchildren, continuing to be creative, drawing and painting, right into the last months of her life.

Elfriede Meindl was truly "an original" who will be missed by all who knew her. A memorial ceremony is planned for next summer. Donations in her memory can be made to Mazon Canada, a national food bank funding organization or Holy Trinity Anglican Church in Middleton. A great friend to all, especially to his children Andrew and Jenna, he was unselfish and ready to help where needed. Randy was raised on the family farm and cherished his time there until his death.





Alison Russell

Alison left this life peacefully on August 13, 2020, with a loved partner and sister nearby, in the Sunshine Coast area of BC. Also nearby in spirit were some of her Ontario family, her grandfather Eric Obst, uncle Jeff and partner Diane and cousin Derek. For over 20 of her 46 years here, Alison lived with Von Hippel-Lindau syndrome, a rare disease, that meant multiple surgeries for benign spine and brain tumours.

As Eric recounts, while Alison was often in his and our thoughts and prayer time because of severe health issues, she led a very fulfilling and connected life, and made many friends well beyond her early childhood with mom Caroline in the Arnprior area. She went on to live in Edmonton, and then Vancouver, where, as a young woman she spent 15 years working at the Bay in the 'senior' women's department – a job she loved as she had a great affinity for relating well with the 'elderly' crowd. There, she also made new, good friends as she lived and worked with many in the Chinese Canadian community. Later life took her to the Gibsons area of the Sunshine Coast, where her keen environmental interests involved working in a market garden and goat farm, and delivering produce and goat dairy products locally. Alison, along with others in the small town, got to know the friendly production and acting crew of the Beachcombers, a show some of us will remember fondly. In early August, many of Alison's Sunshine Coast friends celebrated her life, and she was very thankful for that gathering.

Church Opening for In Person Worship Services



When will we open?

No date has been set yet. Our hope and expectation is that we would be able to resume in person worship services in the fall of 2020. We have established a date for an outdoor service on September 13th on the Church Lawn with planned safety precautions in place.

What is taking so long?

We are attempting to meet all the guidelines for in person worship services established by our Eastern Canada Synod and the local health authorities. Church Council has established a task force to review the guidelines and implications for our congregation and provide us with recommendations on the best way to move forward. While the task force has accomplished a great deal under the leadership of its chair, Lorne Rueckwald, and members, Andy Kalnins and Aman Segu, there is still work to be completed prior to safe resumption of in person worship services. Issues such as taking the temperature of members and checking health status prior to their entrance to their seats, data collection and retention, proper signage and distance markers, are some of the items that still need to be resolved. Council and the task force are doing their best to ensure we balance the desire to open again for in person worship, with ensuring the safety of those who are most vulnerable and at risk for severe consequences from contracting Covid-19. When a final plan for reopening our church for in person worship has been established, we will be submitting it to both our synod and local health authorities for comment and approval prior to opening. We will then be in a position to advise congregation members of our planned opening date.

Why are other churches already open or opening earlier than we are?

We believe that each congregation (and denomination) is doing its best to follow the guidelines that have been put in place by health and church authorities. There are variations in the approach and timing depending on a number of items including:

- congregation location
- community Covid-19 outbreak rates
- resources available
- congregation size
- congregation demographics (age structure)
- risk assessment

We are committed to opening our in person worship services at the earliest opportunity given our ability to meet the requirements of both the health authorities and the guidelines established by our synod leadership. We thank you for your continued support and should you have any questions regarding the resumption of in person worship services, please contact a member of church council.
