Reflections from our Pastor

Dear friends,

As 2026 begins, changes unfold, personal and in the life of the church. Change is a sign of life, and opportunity!

Personally, many of us start the year by looking back, and then looking forward with ideas for things we hope to do, change, or accomplish. Resolutions, or intentions can help us focus, but it isn't a success/failure concept - we try things out, and some things work out, others ask us to try again. Such is life.

As a church, we are looking at a year of intentional strengthening of lay leadership while reducing pastoral service hours. A new way of serving Christ together.

25+ years ago when in seminary we read "An Unnecessary Pastor" as part of our studies - not exactly the concept I was hoping for as I had committed 5 years to graduate studies after completing my undergrad degree. And yet, it made sense then, and now. Luther believed and encouraged "the priesthood of all believers" - in part, a concept that affirms that every person is gifted to serve God's purpose and invited to trust in where Jesus is leading. It doesn't negate the importance of clergy for specific roles and purposes, but it celebrates that all can serve.

As my ministry schedule is reduced, please rest assured that I am available and will make time. Please do not assume that I am "too busy," or that your concern isn't "big enough." But, what I can't do responsibly within a shorter time is keep up and chase down information about daily life. I need you to contact me as needed.

So, here is a list of "when to call the pastor," adapted from the work of a wise mentor many years ago.

1. If you are going to the hospital, or are there unexpectedly;
2. When life has tough moments: your marriage is struggling; substance abuse (yours or someone else's) is impacting your life; employment or housing challenges;
3. When a difficult decision arises;
4. When there is a death in the family;
5. When grief feels overwhelming and endless;
6. When you feel spiritually spent or unwell;
7. When marriage plans are being made that include the church;
8. When you want to simply talk to your pastor.

Pastors cannot "fix" things, but serve as resources and reminders of the support of the community of believers.

Your council is also available for logistical and/or business questions.

So, as I look towards 2026:

Confirmation: Please contact me if you have a youth who is interested in learning more about their baptism, faith, the Bible and Luther's Catechism and their life within their church family.

Our year together holds much promise. May all we do be pleasing in God's sight.

Draft Minutes of Nov 17th, 2025 Council Meeting

Meeting was called to order at 1:00 pm. Pastor Sylvia opened with a reflection and prayer.

Previous Minutes: Debbie moved that the October 27, 2025 minutes be accepted as distributed. Seconded by Mellissa CARRIED.

Financial Report –Oct.: Commitments up some \$6,500, over 600 more than Sept. Operating expenses up \$6,125, deficit down \$400 to \$5,700. 3rd quarter Charitus income increase of \$851. Bank account \$17,214.84, Charitus is \$79,822 and cashable GIC is \$5,022. Enid moved that the financial report to end of October be accepted as presented. Fred seconded. CARRIED

Finance AGM: 2025 year end estimates: maximum \$9000 deficit, excluding any Nov/Dec year end gifts above average per month. Estimated Bank account \$16,000, Charitus \$80,400 and cashable GIC \$5,047. 2026 draft budget with data by ministry distributed: Proposed commitments ask, \$78K (3% over monthly average in 2025, excluding year end gifts.) Expenses maximum projected \$98K. A proposed reduction to 75% of full time for Pastoral Ministry, shared with St. James, which Pastor Sylvia has sanctioned; \$59K compared to \$77K if remained fulltime. Worship \$4,200, music up to 42 occasions, with honorarium increase to \$65. Youth \$1,845, plans developing. Property \$21,995, includes 7K reserve. Administration \$3,330. Benevolence 2.5% up to \$5022. Outreach seed remains \$400. Mellissa proposed that this draft 2026 Budget be presented for membership approval at the AGM Finance meeting on November 23. Seconded Karen. CARRIED

Pastoral Report: Pr. Sylvia's report was received for October.

Pastoral Care: Christmas platters are to be assembled on December 12 for delivery.

The Longer Table: Prepared food is in a freezer in the board room and will be picked up for delivery. Andy will pick up a lock for the freezer.

Christmas Eve: Will be at 7:00. The children's pageant is within the service, close to the beginning. The Christmas float is going ahead for the parade on November 29.

Meeting closure: Meeting closed with prayer of thanks by Pastor Sylvia. Next regular meeting: December 22, 2025 at 1:00 p.m.

Message From the Chair

Our building, 47 MacLachlan Street has a heart and soul. I truly believe in that. Buildings are not like humans who have a heart and a soul at birth. Buildings start as brick and mortar and lumber and metal and glass and wires and cables and are as formless as the earth was on the morning of the creation described in Genesis. But over time, the building absorbs the hopes and fears and aspirations of the people that pass through it.

Think of Westminster Abbey. Think of the Alhambra in Spain. Think of our own Pier 21 in Halifax. My parents and my sister, along with a million other people, entered Canada by walking into that ugly hall first. I wonder if the excitement outshone the terror, or if it was the other way around.

So it is with 47 MacLachlan: sometimes the best time for me, is sitting alone in a pew in an empty church. It is then I hear the voices of all who were baptized here, those who were married here, those who mourned here. I feel the excitement and toil here of the builders and the renovators. Sometimes I hear the discussions and enthusiasms of all those who maintain and care for the church and the altar guild and the hospitality team. That time in the church to me, acts like a balm for the soul. The daily assault of news clips, the incessant commercialization and commodification of food, water, space, and the air we breathe, the constant noise, all make me crave for quiet and serenity.

I soon come to the realization that the building is just reflecting the love and energy of all the people who have passed through it. So many people with tears, laughter, and wisdom have sat in our pews and I am convinced it is all there for the taking.

So why take it? Because we need it. We need the collective wisdom in those walls, in those pews to guide us. Just as the pages flip on our earthly calendar, just as our tiny puny sand grain of a solar system drifts through space, so do we. We have no choice but to move ahead.

We will be talking about that at our Annual General Meeting. We will be attempting to discern where the spirit is leading us. For most, that would be a tough task, as they would be doing it alone. But we have the strength and spirit of all who have ever passed through our doors. We are blessed indeed.

Congregational Meeting on Finances, November 23, 2025

Please see the data table and notes below which provide more detail on the following summary:

- A \$9000 deficit is projected for Dec. 31, somewhat reduced by year end offerings, gratefully received.
- The budget for 2026 was approved, with a projected deficit of about \$11000.
- We have money in our reserves, close to \$100,000, to cover deficits and shortfalls.
- Because we have strong lay leadership and committees, we determined the professional ministry needs can be reduced somewhat while continuing to offer vibrant ministry.
- The congregation approved having Pastor Sylvia serve 3 weeks out of 4 in a month, 4 out of 5 in 5 Sunday months. This helps keep the projected deficit at a manageable level and introduces intentional "Creative Ministry Sundays", once per month, led primarily by laity with pastoral support.

While the full 2025 Annual Report will include financially reviewed statements and 2026 budget, our AGM we will focus on mission and ministry. Some flexibility within the approved budget possible.

(1) - 2025 Yr End Projection: conservative, likely lower deficit

Commitments: \$10,000 estate gift, + \$6,300 monthly average, of the \$7,400 monthly ask. **No year end gifts here yet.**

Fundraising: - all dance/motion community programming;

Rental: 94% is from the Muslim community, the rest from rentals to the Union and Choir.

Youth: Some of the held youth monies were used; no Vacation Bible Camp.

Grants: No washroom build in 2025; grant is being held for the future.

Expenses: Pastoral ministry—expect some adjustment; music budget doubled, confirmation camp, roof and windows.

Other: + inv. return, gd. accounts, > \$2,000 to others, (+ benevolence. \$5,100)

(2) - 2026 Budget as Approved: conservative, likely lower deficit

Commitments: 3% ask over the 2025 actual = \$6,500 monthly average. **No year end gifts here yet**

Fundraising: Motion community prog/oth.

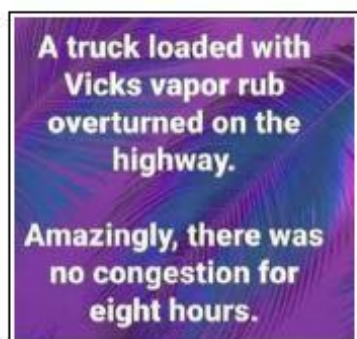
Rental: 93% from the Muslim community; \$200 rest

Youth: Vacation Bible Camp +, plans developing

Grants: Charitus \$3,000; other \$2,000; perhaps for food security, environmental, accessibility

Expenses: Pastoral ministry down an estimated \$11,000; music 42 Sundays; cleaning increase; \$7.000 property reserve

Other: conservative investment return estimate; Outreach: TBD; Benevolence: +2.

Once again St. John's entered a float in the Arnprior Christmas Parade. Thanks to all who helped with this great event.

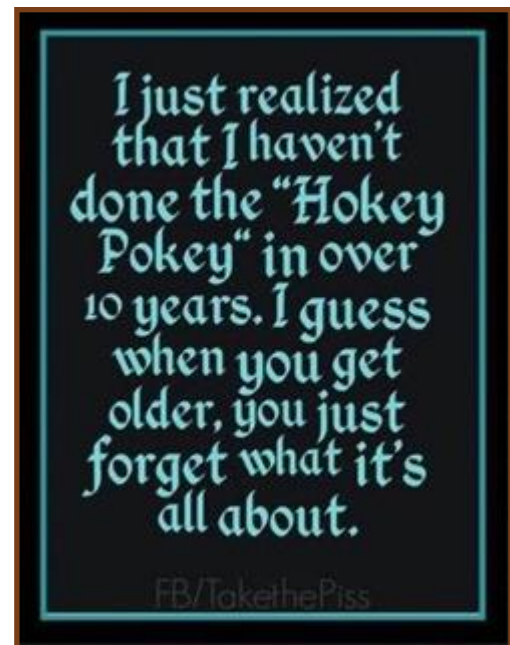
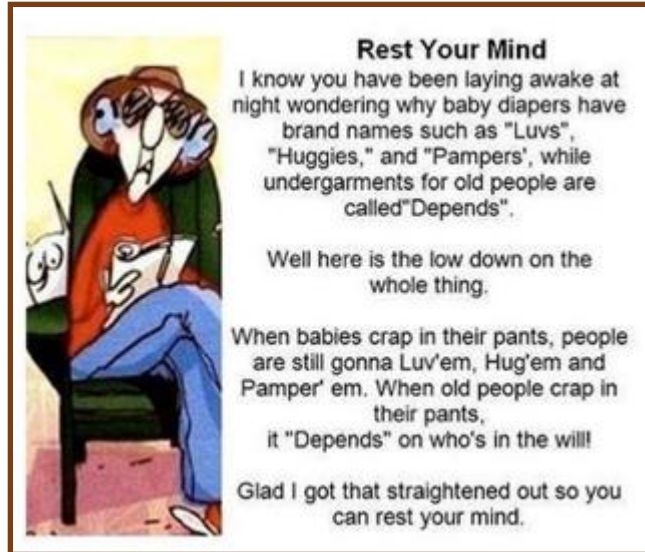
