

September 2024



Meeting was called to order at 1:00 pm. Andy welcomed everyone. Enid read a devotion.

- 1. **Previous Minutes:** Debbie moved that the June 17, 2024 minutes be accepted as distributed. Seconded by Mellissa, CARRIED.
- 2. **Ministry Plans for September:** Andy said that this Sunday, Sept. 1 we will have a lay service. Doug Reble will do communion service Sept. 8 and Pastor Michael Hackbusch on Sept. 22. The 29th is Truth and Reconciliation day so we are seeking an indigenous person to speak then, or when possible. To request Alison to present Assembly report one Sunday in September.
- 3. Property (also Property Chair Position): Fred reported that Randy caulked and painted windows, and he did furnace window. Organ needs tuning soon. So far nobody has stepped up to become Property Chair. An application was submitted to Charitus for a grant that would cover half the cost for accessible washroom; we should hear back in September. No report on further research on lift available. Pastor office to be painted; timing to be determined.
- 4. **Pastor Norine Reception:** The dinner celebration for Pastor Norine will be held on Sunday, September 29 at 4:00 at Galilee Centre at an expected cost of \$20.00 a person. Information will be in the newsletter. Suggestions were given for a gift and still to be decided on.
- 5. **Pastoral Care:** Enid reported that Pastor Leena Jensen continues to help with home visits and communion; August 12: 6 visits made, with Beryl and Barbara. September 16 likely next day, with possible meeting with council included, as well as home/other visits.
- 6. Finances: Enid reported end of July surplus to budget is high largely due to no regular pastor for some months. Andrea is moving Wednesday dance classes (fundraising/community program) from church to Kenwood Centre; council and others encouraged to find other times/uses of our hall (e.g.for dance/fitness/family events). 2 window air conditioners purchased due high heat. Charitus investment grew close to \$300 in 2nd quarter. Chequing: \$15,253; cashable GIC: 30,000. Enid moved that the financial report be accepted including recommendations to transfer 24 memoriam receipts to 24 commitments income and 22-23 memoriam receipts to Charitus investment account. Mellissa seconded. CARRIED
- 7. **Call Process and Church Profile:** Andy reported that Doug Reble will be here on September 7 to go over our Profile form and next steps with Lorne Rueckwald, who has accepted to chair call process committee, and some council members, including from St. James, Renfrew.
- 8. **Outreach:** Andy reported that a Spaghetti Dinner is proposed for October 25 or November 1 TBD with all proceeds to the Fountain. Other congregations and Muslim prayer group will be contacted to see if they wish to participate in this fundraising effort.
- 9. Youth: Mellissa reported that VBS went well with 20 children attending. Recommend that we need a more simplified version than what was presented. Sunday School is once again being proposed once a month starting hopefully in September. Discussion on First Communion learning with three boys eligible, possibly with Pastor Leena, if families agree to this.

YOUTH REPORT—Alison Burkett

SCUBA Vacation Bible Camp (or VBS)

We had 20 children attend our SCUBA Vacation Bible Camp - held the mornings of July 15 to 19. (That was the pretty well the maximum number we could have with our space and the number of leaders we had.) Kids were



split into 3 crews: the younger group had 7 children, and there were 2 older crews: 5 girls and 8 boys.

Activities included beginning and ending sessions with all the crew together, then "Stations" for crews: Bible Adventures, Sticky Scriptures, Imagination Station, Games, and Exploration/Crafts & Play. (Some of these were for both older and younger crews, some just for older or younger.)

Leaders/ Assistants - it takes quite a few to run a VBS - we had 10 great people running the activities for the kids - some full-time (or almost) and some part-time.

- Keandra O'Brien, an experienced VBS leader from Gateway Church, was our main leader.
- Jessica Elliot, Mellissa Watt, Ryan Zimmerling our Sunday School parents, and Debbie Witt from St. John's were activity leaders for older and younger crews
- Teen assistants Zach Zimmerling from St. Johns and Alexis, Mercy, and Ava from Gateway were terrific and essential in helping the leaders.

Behind the scenes, I was Program Director. That involved recruiting leaders for which I'm most grateful for the help of Liane Gallant from Gateway in recruiting Keandra and 3 teen assistants. The rest of my work was getting the supplies and setting up the various parts of the church - Sanctuary (decorated as a coral reef), the basement (our submarine) and the Office and Board Room (for Bible Adventures). Many thanks to Dave Burkett who did the lion's share of the work on the submarine which was a huge hit with the kids and who borrowed and hung backdrops for various rooms. Thanks also to Cathy Zimmerling, Joanne Bretzlaff, Gwen Steinke and my grandchildren who helped with the coral reef, to Dave, Zach, and Keandra who helped put the reef in place Sunday afternoon. Thanks also to Randy Zimmerling for his leadership in keeping our church as cool as possible - the new air conditioners for the Office and Boardroom on Wednesday and fans to move the air from them, and the loan of their curtains for the Lounge helped a lot with the heat of the week.

We learned a lot and adjusted things as the week went on. The biggest change was to add in more active time - Jessica was the driver for this (remember, she developed and ran the 2018 VBS pretty well single-handedly) but all the leaders were involved - and it certainly helped. Games were modified; different activities were added to Bible Adventures; snack time was moved outside so the kids could play. (I hear slime, water balloons, the colour game, Ryan's addition of more "tests" to the Imagination Station were all big hits and there were other great changes that I haven't noted.) We adjusted the older crews and put boys in one crew and girls in another; Group Publishing strongly advocates having mixed crews, but this was the best for our kids.

Youth Report, continued

For next year, I've gathered input from our parents so far and will debrief with Gateway over the next week. It looks like we're planning to do it again next year -most leaders and assistants have said they'll be back. We'll be even more deliberate in using our own expertise to improve the suggested things from the Group VBS program - our leaders rock!

Other Youth Activities

Watch for the Sunday School start date in September - we're running the same curriculum as last year and we've got our same great Sunday School parents as leaders. Watch as well for upcoming UNPLUG activities and dates -the first will be back to the Zimmerling Farm. And, we're planning another Movie Day this fall.

I plan to invite our Gateway SCUBA kids to both UNPLUG and Movie Days (some nice friendships were made) and to ask Gateway parents for their ideas for interesting nature activities and possible activity leaders.



'Dancing Round the World' Moves . . . and Opportunities!

Personal Actions re Climate Change—Alison Burkett



We hear items in the news daily about the need for action regarding climate change. I was privileged to hear Etienne Eason, a 19-year old climate activist, speak at SYNOD Assembly. He noted:

The future is bleak. This spring, the top climate chief at the UN said that humanity has two years left to take urgent action to "save the

world".

I asked a friend who has been involved for many years in environmental issues about what we as individuals and families can do. He advised 3 things. (1) Drive "green" cars (electric or hybrid) to reduce burning fossil fuels. (2) Reduce the energy use (particularly of fossil fuels) in your home – insulation, windows, etc. (3) Reduce/ stop eating beef – cattle produce enormous amounts of methane, which is a large contributor to global warming. Dave and I are trying to do those things.

To those three, I'd add (4) Eliminate food waste going to the landfill (it creates methane gas) – (4a) Reduce food waste. I saw an article with someone's New Year's Resolution to have no uneaten leftovers after a meal – so plan your meals to eat what you buy. (4b) Compost all food waste you do have. We have had backyard compost bins for years. Almonte doesn't have a green bin program but we do have a local not-for-profit organization called Just Good Compost. They provide a pail which is exchanged each week and it will take everything - meat, bones etc. as well as fruit and vegetables. That program has drastically reduced the size of our garbage bags. This organization recently expanded to serve Carleton Place and is interested in expanding to other small communities without a green bin program.

Last, not part of climate change itself but a key environmental issue, is the harmful effects of micro plastics to our health. So, let's add **(5) Reduce the use of single-use plastics**. A while ago we started using silicone lids and reusable containers; reusable water bottles. Recently, we've adopted Maureen Rueckwald's practice of reusing most plastic bags we do use – they can easily be washed and I've ordered a mitten dryer to conveniently dry them.

Outreach will be meeting over the coming weeks to discuss plans for a spaghetti dinner fundraiser.


Most likely dates being considered are Friday October 25 or Friday November 1.
