## Christ Moravian Church Planning Survey

All are welcome to join in this exciting journey. Books are available through Amazon. Barb Ward also has a couple of extra copies.





**Moravian Daily Text & Watchword**


First published in 1731 in Herrnhut, Germany, The Daily Texts grew out of a spiritual renewal of the Moravian Church (Unitas Fratrum) that dates back to Aug. 13, 1727. Today, more than 280 years after its first publication, the Daily Texts continues its promise of “a daily message from God that is new every morning.”

The Moravian Daily Texts offers an inspirational connection to the Holy Scriptures every day. Each entry in this beloved daily devotional includes “watchwords”—Old and New Testament verses to accompany readers throughout the day—combined with beautiful hymn texts and heartfelt prayers selected and written by Moravians across North America.

## BOARD BRIEFS

**From: David Bennett, Vice Chairperson, Christ Moravian Church Executive Board**

**Re: Christ Moravian Church Audio Visual System Upgrade**

The Executive Board has been approached by church members about the state of our current Audio Visual (AV) system. Some members have trouble hearing the speakers during the service. Other members have trouble seeing the screen. I have noticed that visiting speakers have trouble using our current AV system for their presentation. The pastor is finding the current AV system more challenging to use as time goes on.

The Executive Board charged me with looking into 'upgrading the current AV system.' I was not sure what 'upgrading the AV system' meant so I had a look around at other churches. I looked at TV recording studio setups that had a huge WOW factor but also would require a space the size of our Fireside Room and a budget larger than our total annual budget. Sadly, I have been to more funerals than I would like this year, so I had the chance to check out the AV system of other churches. Bigger churches have more AV gear to broadcast clearly within their building, but all seem to have a sound control area at the back of the sanctuary. I am not sure that we can afford to dedicate a couple of our back pews to a sound board setup.

The AV upgrade committee invited three companies to assess our AV setup and make recommendations. AVVox focused on the audio part of our AV system and offered solutions that would improve the sound quality but did not make any suggestion to remedy the visual components of our AV system. The team from Best Buy seemed ill equipped to offer any meaningful solutions for our upgrade project. The team from TODD AV offered a solution that would bring the CMC AV system into the digital age. This technology has a more powerful projector with no bulb, so I got excited. It also allows visiting speakers to connect directly to the projector to do their presentation. In addition, this type of system would allow us to have a wall mounted panel to make minor sound adjustment without having to rush to the front.

I will be presenting more detail on my findings during the February 10, 2019 church council meeting. The Executive board would like the congregation to approve proceeding with the AV system upgrade. I don't mean approval to go out and buy a new system. I mean approval to proceed with our due diligence and get three quotes for a new AV system.

If you have any thoughts on the state of our current AV system or the kind of upgrades you would like to see in a new AV system, please come and chat with me. My phone and email are in the church directory, but I would love to chat with you after church in person.

## MISSION AND MINISTRY

***As supporters of Acadia Place and organizations like Inn From the Cold and Mustard Seed, Christ Church has been part of Calgary's 10 Year Plan to End Homelessness. This article published December 20, 2018 by the Calgary Homeless Foundations, summarizes research findings from this 10 year initiative and sets directives for the future.***

### **Sunsetting Calgary's 10 Year Plan to End Homelessness: Learnings from a Decade of Progress**

On January 29, 2008, the City of Calgary launched a bold initiative to end homelessness in our community. As a first of its kind in Canada, Calgary's 10 Year Plan To End Homelessness was founded on the aspirational goal of ending homelessness in our city so that all people facing homelessness in Calgary will have access to safe, decent and affordable housing as well as the resources and supports necessary to sustain that housing by the year 2018. While Calgary did not achieve its ambitious goal of ending homelessness, over the past decade our community has had many successes.

#### **Together we have...**

- Added more than 2,100 programming spaces throughout Calgary, ensuring that individuals are not only housed, but are housed with the right supports;
- Housed and supported more than 9,700 people experiencing chronic and episodic homelessness in our city;
- Created more than 550 units of permanent housing with supports;
- Stopped the growth of and reduced homelessness in our city. There are 32% fewer people, per capita, experiencing homelessness in our city today than in 2008;
- Have made better use of public dollars - every \$1 spent on Housing First is associated with \$1.5 - \$4 of savings to the public system;
- Established a Coordinated System-of-Care;
- Launched Canada's first comprehensive Homeless Management Information System.

#### **We have learned that...**

- *Housing First* does not equal housing only, many people require wrap around supports to help them be successful.
- Prevention must occur in the primary public systems and community-based supports.
- While the goal of a true *Absolute Zero* end to homelessness remains our collective aspirational goal, it makes more sense for us to focus on achieving what is now known as *Functional Zero* - whereby efforts are concentrated on reaching a point where there are enough services, housing, and emergency shelter beds for everyone who needs them so that anyone who experiences homelessness does so only briefly, is rehoused quickly and successfully, and is unlikely to return to homelessness again.

#### **What's Next? Together to Zero: 6 Strategic Directives:**

Based on the lessons and wisdom gleaned from over a decade of collaboration, priority areas beyond 2018 are to enable coordination at the strategic and service delivery levels to achieve Functional Zero within our city.

1. People First - Lived/living experience, frontline staff and commitment to Truth and Reconciliation.
2. A Home for Everyone - Housing First, and a healthy affordable and supportive housing continuum.
3. Data & Knowledge. Sharing of research and knowledge to drive meaningful outcomes.
4. Agile System Planning - Enhancements to the homeless-serving system of care, improving outcomes for clients and increased service coordination.
5. Eco-System Integration - Homelessness prevention, strategic integration with community systems of care.
6. Strategic Investment & Empowering Calgarians - Coordination, community engagement and public education.

**Compassionate Caring  
Through Nonviolent  
Communication**

*An Introductory Workshop*



**Coming at the end  
of February to  
Christ Moravian Church**

Compassionate or Nonviolent communication was developed by clinical psychologist Dr. Marshall Rosenberg. He believes that compassion is our natural state of being. His life work was devoted to exploring two questions:

1. What happens to disconnect us from our compassionate nature leading us to behave violently or exploitatively.
2. What empowers some to stay connected to our compassionate nature even under the worst circumstances.

While studying these questions Dr. Rosenberg was struck by the crucial role language can play. Even though we may not consider ourselves violent, if we communicate with moralistic judgements, evaluations, criticisms, demands, coercion or labels of right vs. wrong, these are ways of communication that result in disconnection.

Dr. Rosenberg developed a specific approach to communication called Nonviolent Communication (NVC) that helps us to connect in a way that allows our natural compassion to flourish. The concepts and tools of NVC are designed to help us think, listen and speak in ways that awaken compassion and generosity within ourselves and between each other.

Spirituality is at the base of Nonviolent communication and it could be considered a spiritual practice. It supports a moment by moment awareness of the purpose of life of compassionate connection, giving and service which is a manifestation of the divine within in us. It also helps us check that our motivations for helping ourselves, and each other are not from fear, obligation or guilt. You can learn more about it at [www.cnvc.org](http://www.cnvc.org).



*The workshop will be led by Al Tinholt. Al has completed NVC international intensive training with Marshall Rosenberg, is a member of the CNVC Trainer/Candidate Community Program (TCCP) and among other qualifications is certified as Grief Recovery Specialist. He brings to the table a passion for compassionate communication, conflict transformation, grief recovery, compassionate spirituality, restorative circles and conscious leadership. Al is also a professionally registered award winning biological and environmental engineering consultant with extensive experience facilitating multi-stakeholder groups, chairing leadership and advocacy committees, technical forums and corporate board tables.
