Statement on Vaccinations at CMC

Christ Moravian Church will not close its doors to those who have not been vaccinated for COVID-19; however, the Church Executive Board and Elders strongly encourage everyone to get vaccinated.

Medical professionals have assured us that research shows vaccinations are safe and the most effective way to protect yourself from serious illness. Unvaccinated people make up the greatest number of patients hospitalized with COVID-19. Having as many people immunized as possible is the best way to protect those who have been vaccinated as well as the children who are not eligible for vaccination. This is also the best way to help prevent the emergence of new variants that may be resistant to vaccines.

If you have not already done so, please consider vaccination as a way to protect yourself, others you care about and society as a whole.

Risk Mitigation Precautions Modified Opening: August 22, 29 and September 5 at 10:30am

- Attendance will be limited to 40 individuals, including the pastor and elder.
- Attendees will be asked to conduct a self-screening a maximum of two hours before attending. (See attached document: COVID 19 Alberta Health Daily Checklist)
- Ushers will seat attendees so that each cohort group is distanced from others.
- Preregistration will be required for each of these Sundays, by phone or email to the church office. Registration for each Sunday will be accepted no sooner than the preceding Sunday.
- Registrations will be accepted in the order they are received with a waitlist to be kept for the next service, if required.
- Attendees will be required to wear masks inside the building. Disposable masks will be placed at the entrance for those who forget to bring their own.
- Attendees will be required to enter through the front door. Only those using canes and walkers should enter through the east door.
- If there is a line up, attendees are asked to maintain a 2 metre distance from other cohort groups.
- Once in the building, attendees will use hand sanitizer and check in with the greeters.
- Ushers will direct attendees to seats and monitor the number of people in each section.
- Visiting and lingering inside the building before and after the service will not be allowed. Coffee will not be served.
- Attendees wishing to share a time of fellowship may gather outside, with a recommendation that masks and distancing continue.
- High level of cleaning and sanitization, particularly for high touch surfaces and common areas such as washrooms will remain in place.
- Attendees are strongly encouraged to be familiarize themselves with proper hand sanitation and respiratory etiquette as indicated on signs in the building.
- Soft congregational singing and choral reading of prayers and liturgies may take place with masks on. Clergy, readers and soloists may remove masks provided there is at least three metres distance between themselves and others.



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

Focus on James 1:17-27

WHAT is important to know?

— From "Exegetical Perspective," Aaron L. Uitti

For a covenant community, which is not immune to heated disputes, James urges his readers to be quick to listen, slow to speak. James undoubtedly sat through assemblies where contention fractured the community. He observed that human anger will not produce results that make things right. James is intense, using acid rhetoric: "rid yourselves of all sordidness and rank growth of wickedness," he admonishes (v. 21). On the other hand, he says, listening and being listened to open the door to the righteousness of God for the community.

WHERE is God in these words? -F

— From "Theological Perspective," Haruko Nawata Ward

In Greek philosophy, every being has its origin in the highest Being. This Being is also named the Source, Life, Light, Good, Truth, and Idea. Each being is placed in the hierarchy of beings, as on a ladder. Each receives energy from the Source above. If the being is closer to the top of the ladder, it receives and reflects brighter light; if the being ranks toward the bottom, it receives lesser light and stays shadowy. Calling the Christian God "Father of lights" (v. 17), the writer of James shows that every life-giving gift to Christians also comes from their Source. However, by stating "there is no variation or shadow due to change," the writer departs from Greek cosmology. In the Christian universe, every Christian receives this gift equally and not according to his or her rank in the hierarchy. The supreme gift that Christians receive is "birth by the word of truth" (v. 18).

SO WHAT does this mean for our lives?

— From "Pastoral Perspective," by Archie Smith Jr.

James calls us to be responsible, taking seriously our emotional lives, our religious faith, and our behavior. We can envision ourselves as early signs of God's new creation. We can begin by embracing the whole of ourselves and taking responsibility for our constructive and destructive potentials. Living this way can increase our critical discernment. It can foster the development of persons and communities. Such living, when joined by the faithfulness of many others, can become a strong current that helps to transform the world.

NOW WHAT is God's word calling us to do?



The reference to new birth signals a critical intention of a purposive God. One may draw this out in terms of a theology and ethic of divine giving (John 3:16), giving being at the heart of the universe. Generosity grounded in the character of God and embodied in the mission of Jesus can unfold as an influential model of the Divine. To be generous is consonant with the nature of God. God comes through as reliable as well (v. 17c), even from a cosmic perspective.

We will be continuing a Bible Study using **Feasting on the Word** curriculum this fall which is based on the critically acclaimed Feasting on the Word Commentary series edited by David L. Bartlett and Barbara Brown Taylor, a leading contemporary biblical commentator and scholar. Each week's lesson is coordinated with the lectionary readings for that particular Sunday. Moravian Disaster Response to Earthquake Victims in Haiti



On August 14, a devasting 7.2 magnitude earthquake hit southwestern Haiti. At present, the death toll is over 1,400 persons with over 5,000 injured. To make matters worse, tropical storm Grace passed over this same area on Tuesday, August 17, with winds and heavy rain causing flooding and mudslides, which has only slowed the emergency response. These events come on top of the crushing poverty, political unrest, and gang violence that have plagued the country for many years.

Haiti is a Mission Area of the Moravian Church with a dozen congregations and is jointly supervised by the Eastern West Indies and Jamaica Provinces.

We have heard from Haitian-Moravian Pastor Vilès Dorsainvil, and he gives us the following account:

"There are 2 Moravian churches that were affected by the earthquake. One is in Jacmel, and the other one is Anse de Nau in the Grand Anse Department. These churches are damaged, and the brothers and sisters from those churches are now in the street looking for shelter. The worst part of this scenario is that hurricane Grace is heading in the same direction. This is a dire situation for the folks in this part of the Island."

The BMW is currently seeking to wire funds to our brothers and sisters in Haiti to help them purchase emergency supplies.
