


The Candle of Joy

Decoder Puzzle



At Advent and Christmas, we celebrate God' gift of love through his son, Jesus Christ. It is a time when we experience the light of God's great love and count our blessings. This Advent Season you are invited to let God's love shine through you and bless others by participating in any or all of the following giving opportunities:

Ahuas Advent Calendar: Celebrate the 75th Anniversary the Moravian Clinic in Ahuas, Honduras by counting down the days from the beginning of Advent to Christmas. Each day brings you an opportunity to count your blessings as you read a new message of life at the clinic that serves rural indigenous patients who otherwise would not receive proper medical care. On Christmas Day, you add up your blessings and then bless others by donating to the clinic. The Advent calendar is attached to this email, or you may pick up a hard copy at the church. Pastor Matt will also be posting the daily messages on the CMC Facebook page.

Mustard Seed: CMC will continue its support of the Mustard Seed as it provides hope and encouragement as well as warm meals and a safe place to sleep for those experiencing homelessness and poverty. Mustard Seed no longer has need for stockings as we have prepared in the past, preferring to receive backpacks or loose items. Please refer to the attached document for details and watch for upcoming news about handwritten notes and cards to accompany donations.

Christmas Offerings: Christmas is a time when many of us throw a few more dollars into the offering plate. In normal times, CMC has been fortunate to receive large sums of loose offerings on Christmas Eve. Traditionally, these offerings have been split equally between a local and global mission project. In 2021, the Moravian Clinic in Ahuas has been selected to receive the global portion of this offering in recognition of its 75th Anniversary. The Calgary Food Bank has been selected as the local project as it endeavours to feed an increasing number of people who are unable to provide enough food for themselves and their children. If you plan to make an extra donation to CMC this Christmas and wish to have your donation go to these projects, please be sure to mark the donation, "Christmas Missions".





Through the Mustard Seed, we have another opportunity to spread cheer and good will. They have let us know that notes of cheer and encouragement mean a lot to their clients. So, we would like to provide as many of these as possible for them for the Mustard See to distribute with to their clients.

These do not have to be complicated! A simple hand-made card can be done with just a half sheet of folded paper/patterned paper, construction paper or card stock. Cards can be decorated with drawings and stickers or by cutting up pictures from other cards or magazines. For those who do not feel creative, purchasing cards would be just fine. The dollar stores are a great resource!

People love getting children's art work, so we encourage the kids to be involved! Nothing touches the heart like children's art! Have them write their first name (only) age and grade. Children's notes can include a message to let the receiver know the card was made especially for them because they are cared about.

Please be sensitive with your messaging to Mustard Seed clients. As you know their circumstances are very different from those of us that are gathering with family and friends in our homes, going away for Christmas, etc. The message should be to let them know they are special, cared about and loved. Perhaps include a joke/riddle that will make them smile! There are lots on Pinterest!

Please drop off your cards by noon on Monday December 20 so that they can be delivered with other items being collected for the Mustard Seed.

Focus on Isaiah 12:2-6

WHAT is important to know? — From "Exegetical Perspective," Robin Gallaher Branch Verse 2 describes the coming of the Messiah, when full salvation occurs. It begins with an emphasis: "Hinneh! Behold! God is my salvation!" The result of this statement? "I will trust and not be afraid!" Isaiah's song exudes confidence. Salvation is God's gift; this knowledge is a solid foundation for confidence. It banishes distress and uneasiness. A believer evidences cheerfulness upon being reconciled to God and strength because God is his or her strength. God is a believer's song. God's kindness upon a believer encourages perseverance in

WHERE is God in these words?



Both units of the passage move joyfully beyond the textual present time of exile in anticipation
of a victorious homecoming day celebration. The lection opens with a verse stating the
expectation of salvation through God's work. Because of the surety of this salvation that will
come through divine power, the singer looks forward to "trust" and not "fear." Christians
observing Advent will readily identify with celebration of the coming salvation indicated in
12:2 and 3, in spite of textual references to political and physical salvation of the people of
Israel from being conquered and dispersed.

SO WHAT does this mean for our lives? — From "Pastoral Perspective," Roger J. Gench When God gave of Godself in Christ, we humans even exploited the gift of incarnation. Even though we use the language of suffering for the crucifixion of Christ, the resurrection is a witness to the fact that for God, to give is to gain, because the Christ event empowers us to see the win-win world of the gift-giving God who frees us from the win-lose world based in meritocracy that never satisfies, or in privilege that is always abused. Perhaps the language of Zion—the language of grace, gift, and salvation—is not so strange after all. For what is so strange about a world of winners? Where the environment is not exploited in order to make a profit? Where people don't work for their poverty? And where the phrase "homeless person" is an oxymoron? Let us draw deeply from such "wells of salvation" and look forward to the day when homecoming will be a reality for all of God's people.

NOW WHAT is God's word calling us to do? — From "Homiletical Perspective," Randle R. Mixon

So we too on this Third Sunday of Advent are called to sing for joy, to celebrate the ways in which God has delivered us, is delivering us, and will deliver us, until there is true peace, shalom, wholeness on earth and goodwill throughout the entire creation. "With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation. . . . Shout aloud and sing for joy." For, in the words of another old hymn, "Since love is Lord of heav'n and earth, how can I keep from singing?"

Voices from Exile



Background

True to the prophecies of Isaiah, son of Amoz, Babylonian armies had swept through Judah in the sixth century BCE, devastating the land and destroying its heart, Jerusalem. The elite of Judean society was carried away into captivity. Many lived as captives, exiled from the land God had promised their ancestors. They lived along the banks of the Euphrates, with worshipers of the Babylonian gods Marduk and Nebo living all around them.

In some ways, life was tolerable. The captives were allowed considerable freedom to engage in commerce and trade, so economic hardship was not an issue. But the real threat was to the heart of their existence—cultural and religious assimilation. And because their identity as a people was inextricably tied to their religious identity, and thus to the land from which they were exiled, extinction as a people was a real possibility. In the words of Psalm 137:

By the rivers of Babylon—
there we sat down and there we wept
when we remembered Zion.
On the willows there
we hung up our harps.
For there our captors
asked us for songs,
and our tormentors asked for mirth, saying,
"Sing us one of the songs of Zion!"
How could we sing the LORDs song
in a foreign land?
