Reaching the centennial mark for these services highlights the blessing of God's presence in the support of this worship ministry. God's love shines through every individual who's taken part or offered support over these many weeks and months. I find that meaning of this centennial anniversary gets noted in the Moravian Daily Text Watchword for Sunday, January 23. It shares,

"Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable to you, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer." Psalm 19:14

Wow, talk about the perfect reading for this 100th video worship service. We live with trust and faith that our prayers, our cries, our laments unto God find an understanding heart in God's presence. God sees us and finds the songs, the prayers, the words, the silence displayed in the many video services to be acceptable and pleasing in God's sight.

My devotions often include the reflections of Franciscan priest, Richard Rohr. A recent message certainly spoke to me as Rohr quoted a German Theologian, Dorothee Solle, who invited Christians to see with the eyes of God and hear with the ears of God. Solee wrote: "To use "God's senses" does not mean simply turning inward, but becoming free for a different way of living life: To see What God sees! To hear what God hears! To laugh where God laughs! To cry Where God cries!" These unique days of our life invite us to intentionally seek to see with the eyes of God wherever we go.

Even as it is expressed in a video worship service, we join in saying "May our prayers, words, and meditations of the heart speak with the love and kindness of Christ."



Each number represents a letter of the alphabet. Substitute correct letter for the numbers to reveal the coded words.




Mystery Math

Fill in the missing numbers. The missing values are the whole numbers between 1 and 9. Each number is only used once.


Each row is a math equation.

Adult Resource Sheet 1

Focus on Luke 4:14-21

WHAT is important to know?

— From "Exegetical Perspective," Linda McKinnish Bridges

To read these words aloud before your own relatives in your hometown synagogue required much courage. In reading this portion of Hebrew Scripture, Jesus is saying that his life work will be to (1) heal the brokenhearted; (2) announce the release of prisoners of war; (3) recover sight to the blind; (4) announce the acceptable year of the Lord (vv. 14–19). Jesus' announcement says that they can no longer see him simply as a village carpenter or as Mary and Joseph's boy. He is the one that they have been waiting to come all of their lives, and their grandparents' lives, and the generations before them. The carpenter's son is the Messiah.

WHERE is God in these words?

From the beginning of his Gospel (1:52, 53) Luke emphasizes that Jesus' work was to bring good news to the poor. Luke's portrayal of Jesus' reading and exposition signals that concern for the liberation of the impoverished and oppressed was of paramount importance to Jesus' ministry. Whatever we take to be the heart of the gospel will be the central shaping force in our life of faith; the author of Luke instructs readers to place this text as the central concern and even plumb line of Jesus' teaching. In today's passage we learn what Jesus came to do; insofar as we measure our lives against this, we are following Jesus' ministry.

SO WHAT does this mean for our lives?

The Holy Spirit comes when we have something to do for God and a time to do it. Following this Jesus means accepting his mission and his time. What would change in our lives and in our churches if we stood in the pews on Sunday morning and declared to God and to one another, "God gives us no other day than today to bring good news to the poor, release to the captives, sight to the blind, freedom to the oppressed, and new beginnings to all who have failed"? Jesus went forth in the power of the Spirit as an agent of God's mercy to the downtrodden, and so do we.

NOW WHAT is God's word calling us to do?

We need the moral courage to listen to the intention of God for humanity as Jesus proclaims it in Luke 4, and we can be opened up by hearing accounts of how persons who are in those very situations hear with joy and renewed hope this good news of social transformation. Perhaps too we can be encouraged by noting that when Jesus proclaimed this prophetic text that is so challenging for those in positions of privilege, he left out Isaiah 61:2b, "and the day of vengeance of our God." Jesus' focus was on bringing healing and justice, not vengeance.

A Prayer of Commitment



Throughout his Gospel, Luke tells us of the Holy Spirit's involvement in the life of Jesus as he steps forth in public ministry. In the stories of Jesus' birth, the Spirit's movement is evident. At Jesus' baptism and in the time of testing in the wilderness, the Holy Spirit is present. Now as Jesus returns to Galilee, the Holy Spirit will fill him with power for his ministry as he reads a text that will be his mission statement as the Messiah.

How can we know that we have the power of the Spirit? We know because the Holy Spirit gives us something to do for God and a time to do it. The time of God's Holy Spirit is today, right now. It is the Holy Spirit speaking when you hear God whisper to you: "Child of God. Live this day as if it were your first day, as if it were your last day, as if it were your only day."

Together, stand and pray the following aloud:

"God gives me no other day than today to bring good news to the poor . . . (pause in silence) release to the captives . . . (pause in silence); sight to the blind . . . (pause in silence); freedom to the oppressed . . . (pause in silence); new beginnings to all who have failed (pause in silence)."

In the coming week

- Plan to pray these words aloud every day as a part of your time of devotion.
- Return to the prayer in your thoughts throughout the day, and try to attend to how it influences your actions.
- Use the following as a journaling prompt: "I feel God's Spirit inviting me to be an agent of mercy today by . . ." Make notes throughout the week, either on paper or on your tablet.
- At the end of the day, note in your journal any specific actions you took as an agent of mercy, as well as ways you might respond further to the invitation of the Spirit.
