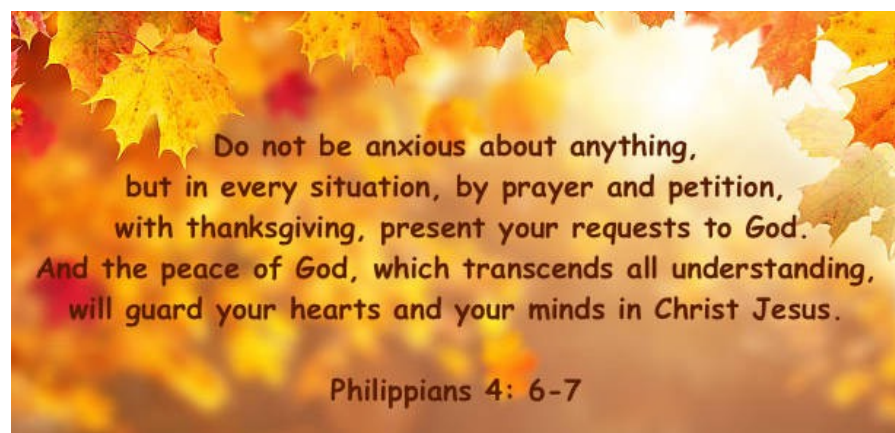

### Moravian Day of Service: *Making a Difference in Our Community and Beyond*

*Imagine Moravians from across the U.S. and Canada all focused on mission in their community...all on the same day!*



That's the idea behind The Moravian Day of Service, scheduled for September 15, 2019. The Moravian Day of Service sprang from the 2018 Synods of the Northern and Southern Provinces. These Synods recognized that coordinated efforts of Moravians can help engage others in service and ministry and raise awareness of the Gospel message. The Moravian Day of Service will be an annual event to help raise awareness of the importance of mission work to the Moravian faith, encourage congregations to think of new ways to make a difference in their communities, and demonstrate our ability to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world.

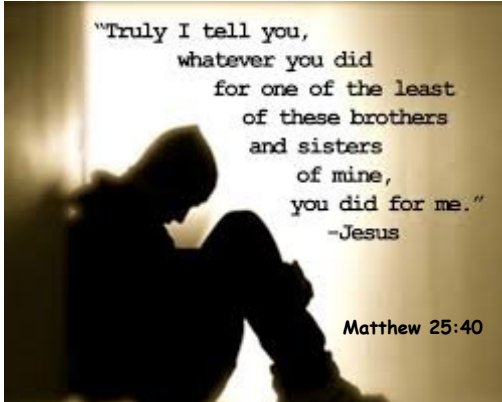
Christ Church embraces the Moravian tradition of compassionate engagement in local and worldwide mission and service. We have an active Mission and Outreach Committee that plans fundraising events, advises the Board on allocating mission funds, and works to build a lifestyle of service as the core of our congregation's identity. CMC will recognize Moravian Mission Sunday by celebrating the many projects that we have undertaken this year, some new and some long standing. Through the hard work of this committee and the generosity of our congregation, CMC has engaged in the following mission projects in this past year.

**Acadia Place:** Located in our neighbourhood, Acadia Place is a 58 unit apartment complex that houses a mixture of single adults, couples and families, including a high indigenous population. The majority of residents are families with children. As part of the Calgary Homeless Foundation's plan to end homelessness, Acadia Place provides low income housing for vulnerable Calgarians. CMC is partnered with KAIROS Calgary, an ecumenical organization that provides supports for Acadia Place as well as three other like buildings. Through CUPS (Calgary Urban Projects Society), CMC is working to develop relationships with residents of Acadia Place so that we may respond to their needs. In the past year, we have participated in three main initiatives in support of Acadia Place:

- **Christmas Hampers:** CMC provided Christmas Hampers for three families at Acadia Place.
- **Acadia Food Pantry:** This community initiative began in April of this year. The number of food insecure individuals and families accessing the food pantry continue to grow as news of this good work spreads. Involvement of Christ Church and its members is critical to the success of the food pantry. Without our volunteers and food donations, this program would not likely exist. As such, a financial donation of \$1200 (\$100/month) from the Mission Fund was made to help purchase additional food items for when donations are low. Please speak with Donna Gordon or Jody Gorai about volunteering.
- **Acadia Back to School Shoe Party:** Thanks to the generous donations of Christ Moravian Church and McDougall United Church, 60 children were registered to receive \$35 in Walmart cards for the purchase of new school shoes. A grant from the City of Calgary Strong Neighbourhoods initiative provided food and gift bags for the party held at McDougall Church on September 27.

**Mustard Seed:** The Mustard Seed is a Christian organization that meets the immediate needs of those experiencing homelessness and poverty by providing emergency shelter, food, clothing and hygiene supplies. They also connect clients with safe, affordable housing and community supports. Every other month, a small group from CMC gather to make sandwiches and build lunches for the Mustard Seed using food donated by the congregation. In addition, CMC supports the Christmas Mustard Seed *Warm Feet for the Street* project by filling socks with hygiene products and other sundry items. [www.theseed.ca](http://www.theseed.ca)

**CMC Garage Sale:** The CMC Garage Sale is the biggest event of the year for our congregation. Its purpose is twofold, first, to provide service and outreach to the broader community, and second, to financially support the ongoing operation of the church. The involvement of every one of our members is the key to making this community event a success.

**Calgary Food Bank:** The Calgary Food Bank is the city's main charitable food hub and the most accessible food bank serving families and individuals facing food crisis. They also refer their clients to partner agencies and programs and collaborate with other agencies to fight hunger and address the root causes of food insecurity. During the month of October, we give thanks for God's abundant gifts by setting up a grocery cart to fill with nonperishable food donations for the Calgary

Food Bank. In addition to our Thanksgiving donations, a portion of our Christmas Eve offering (\$1550) was donated to the the Calgary Food Bank. The Calgary Food Bank welcomes volunteers to help with this program, [www.calgaryfoodbank.com](http://www.calgaryfoodbank.com).

**Labrador/Camp Van Es:** The Moravian Church has had a strong presence in coastal Labrador since the first missionaries arrived there in the mid 1700s. Over the last few years, CMC has tried to build a connection with our fellow Canadian Moravians in Labrador. This year a \$1000 donation from the Mission Fund was sent to the Moravian Church in Newfoundland & Labrador to support two campers and two chaperones from Labrador to attend Camp VanEs in July. We are working with Board of World Mission personnel to examine different ways in which CMC can support our Canadian Moravian brothers and sisters in Labrador.

**Lions Recycle for Sight:** Calgary is the site of the Canadian Lion Recycling Centre that refurbishes used eyeglasses, prescription sunglasses and hearing aids. During Vision Month in May of each year, a box is set out at the church to collect these items which are then passed on to the Lion's Club to distribute to those in needed throughout the world. They are always looking for volunteers to help sort and refurbish the donated eyeglasses, [www.clerc.ca](http://www.clerc.ca).

**Bottle Collection for Sri Lanka:** This initiative was brought to CMM when Indranie Perera joined our congregation several years ago. She quietly collects donated beverage containers to support her philanthropic endeavours at a small village in Sri Lanka.

**Rajpur Foster Child Project:** The Moravian Institute in Rajpur, India provides a K-12 education for destitute children in Northern India. Preference is given to orphans and girls from disadvantaged castes or tribes so that they may break the bonds of poverty. Christ Church supports a child by providing room and board at a cost of \$1200 per year. These funds are raised by the children of our church through a monthly "Noisy Offering" collecting change.. **Disaster Response:** Although we did not fund any Disaster Response initiatives in this past year, in previous years, CMC has donated generously to those in our province, country and the Moravian world who are hurting because of natural disasters.

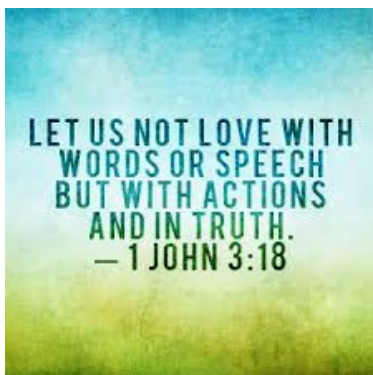
**Aging in Place Seminar:** The Outreach and Mission committee received a \$2000 USD grant from the Moravian Society for Promoting the Gospel (SPG) to develop a project that would support seniors in our community. **Board of World Mission (BWM):** The BWM serves as the mission arm of the North American Moravian Church. It is modelled on the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, who crossed political boundaries, reached out in compassion, challenged the status quo, shared the Good News and brought transformative life and grace to all he met. In 2019, CMC supported the following initiatives of the BWM and its partners:



- Moravian Church in Cuba/Armando Rusindo Mission Foundation (ARMF):** Christ Church began its relationship with the Moravian Church in Cuba in January 2013 when we first learned of its existence. Four travellers took clothing, school supplies and nonprescription medicines donated by CMC to Havana and met with the founder of the newly recognized Moravian Church in Cuba, Armando Rusindo. Since then, CMC has maintained its relationship with Cuba by helping to fund the purchase and renovation of two homes in Havana for use by the Moravian Church in Cuba. One building is now their church and headquarters and the other is the Comenius Centre used for outreach to underprivileged children in a poor part of Havana. In 2016, eight members from CMC travelled to Cuba to help with the restoration of the Comenius Centre. This year a \$1000 donation from the Mission Fund was made to the ARMF, a group from the Moravian Church in Winston-Salem, North Carolina that works directly with the Moravian Church in Cuba to further its goals of outreach and mission to the people of Cuba. This includes additional children's centres throughout the country, installation of clean water systems and the development of small business, such as farms, that help support the church financially while providing for those in need. - Adopt A Village Program in Tanzania:** This project began as a community based orphan assistance program for children who had lost their parents as a result of the HIV crisis in Africa. The objective was to keep these children in their extended families where they were living by providing the caregivers, usually grandparents, with the material support they needed, such as extra food, clothing, school supplies and medical care. Participating congregations were paired with a village to provide these supports for a modest \$1000 per year. With the help of a private donor, CMC has supported the village of Moria since 2014. As the HIV crisis has abated greater attention has been paid to allowing children to further their education beyond grade school and to develop economic opportunities within the village. - Moravian Medical Clinic in Ahuas, Honduras:** This clinic was established in 1946 to provide medical services to indigenous Miskitu refugees who had moved to rural Honduras to escape the dangers of political turmoil in Nicaragua. Over time, Moravians in North America developed a special bond with this clinic and its subsequent outreach initiatives with the Miskitu people, including a baby wellness program that provides nutritional support and parenting education for families with babies and infants. Half of our Christmas Eve donation, \$1550, went to support the baby wellness program. [www.moravianmission.org/medical-work](http://www.moravianmission.org/medical-work)
