



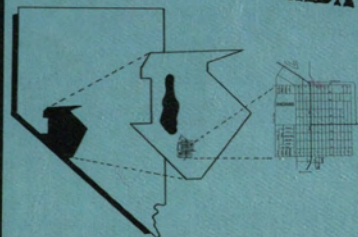

WELCOME TO MINERAL COUNTY

Mineral County, Nevada, which includes an area of 4,019 square miles, was created in 1911. Mineral County is located in West-Central Nevada with the rugged Wassuk Range serving as a boundary dividing Mineral County from Mono County, California and Lyon County, Nevada. The Wassuk Range averages 9,000 feet elevation with the high peak of Mt. Grant extending its vast and imposing bulk up to 11,245 feet.

Topographically, Mineral County is generally mountainous, canyons and large arid plateaus rise upward from the Walker Lake Basin.

The name, Mineral, was aptly chosen since the county has a considerable and unique variety of mineral wealth which remains undeveloped. Probably no comparable area on the American Continent has so many varied mineral deposits. Included are gold, silver, copper, tungsten, iron, coal, borax, lead and gemstone rocks in a bewildering variety.

Aurora was the largest producing area in Mineral County and in 1884 supported a population of 10,000 people. Today, it lies deserted with only a few buildings and some headstones in the cemetery to show the visitor a reflection of its famous past.

A mild climate provides excellence in semi-desert living in this part of Nevada. The hottest month of the year is July with an average temperature of 75.5 degrees. Only two or three days of the year does the thermometer reach above 100 degrees. Year around temperatures average to about 55 degrees with snow falling in the winter months only on an intermittent basis.

Mineral County's primary industry is the U. S. Ammunition Depot which is the worlds largest facility of its kind.

Tourism plays an important part in the county's economy as the outdoor enthusiast can find adventure in hiking, horseback riding, motorcycling, fishing, hunting, swimming, water skiing, rock, bottle and artifact hunting, and ghost town exploring.

Mineral County's unique combination of modern industry, deserted mining towns, abundant recreation and western hospitality make it an area in the State of Nevada for the visitor to enjoy.

Whatever the visitor's interests are they can bet on Mineral County, Nevada for a good share of everything including those treasured possessions, freedom, relaxation, open space and quiet.

We hope you enjoy your stay.

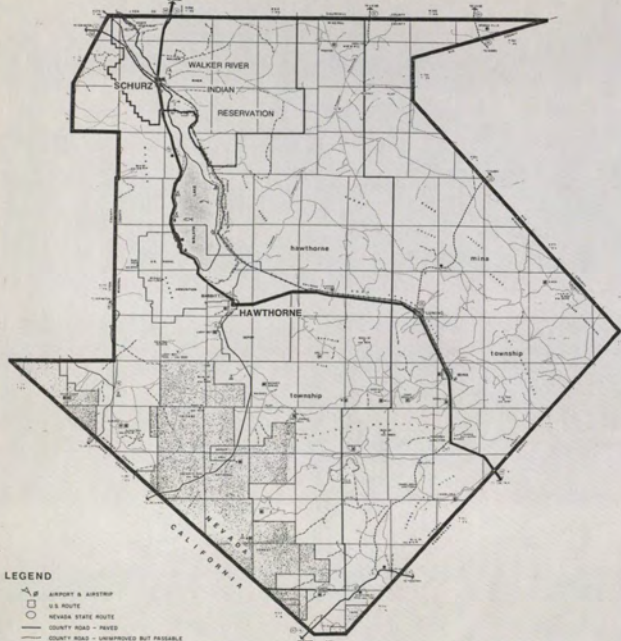

Migratory deer, wild burro and horses roam through the Wassuk and Excelsior Ranges. Dove, chukar, partridge and sage hen are abundant and provide excellent hunting in season.

Situated at the base of Mt. Grant in Mineral County, Walker Lake is approximately twenty-four miles long and up to five miles wide. The lake is stocked annually with native cutthroat trout. Present facilities offer overnight camping, fishing year round, water skiing, boat and motor rentals, and fishing gear for rent.



The lack of submerged obstacles and the clear water combined with moderate water temperatures and moderate climate, offer a paradise to water skiing enthusiasts. The high point of the summer season is the Walker Lake Marathon which attracts boats and spectators from across the nation for these exciting events.

Hawthorne boasts an excellent casino, the El Capitan, which attracts thousands of visitors to Hawthorne each year. Mineral County has three hundred excellent motel and hotel rooms available for the weary traveler or anxious gambler.

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The Board of Directors was unanimously approved.

BREAK: The Association was guests of the Mineral County Chamber of Commerce for a coffee/soft drink break.

ADDRESS BY BOB HADFIELD: Bob Hadfield, Executive Director of the Nevada Association of Counties, gave a legislative update, both on a local and national level. He reported that they still need four more co-sponsors for the federal legislation against unfunded mandates. He does feel we are winning this fight and will gain control once again of the budgeting process. He encouraged everyone to contact the Nevada Congressional delegation and request that they co-sponsor this legislation and pass SB993 and HB140.

Mr. Hadfield also reviewed NACO's Mission Statement and 1994 goals. He urged everyone to participate in the NACO Board of Directors meetings and to attend the National Association of Counties Conference in Las Vegas in July.

Mr. Hadfield reported on the elected officials salary bill, noting that he requires a clear consensus of all elected officials as well as their assistance and support in order to get this bill passed. He anticipates presenting something to the Salary Commission on August 18 that presents a fair, reasonable and sellable proposal. He has been before the Sheriff's and Assessor's Associations, and they are putting something together with regard to what they would like to see. He did comment that he does feel there is a strong possibility that they will be looking at the Commissioners setting these salaries in the future instead of the Legislature.

Nancy Carr questioned who would be introducing legislation on the salary bill. Mr. Hadfield stated that the Committee decided that whatever they come up with they will have to take to the people and develop a public understanding of their recommendations before the Legislature meets. They have also accepted the responsibility of meeting with every candidate running for office to discuss study and recommendations with them.

Mr. Hadfield did note that all meetings of the Salary Committee will be in Las Vegas and it is important to send people to Las Vegas to represent this group. Again, it is extremely important that each and every County is in agreement and supports whatever proposal is developed by the Committee.

Mr. Hadfield suggested that the Association think about qualifications for the various elected offices as the Committee may request such input. Caesar Salecchi pointed out that it needs to

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be clear that we are professionals and these are our jobs and are entirely different from a Legislator's position.

President Beaudreau suggested that the elected officials from each County meet and put something together to forward on to the C.F.O.A. Legislative Committee so that we can present a united front.

Mr. Hadfield advised that the legislative agenda for NACO has not been established, however, they hope to do so at the National Conference in Las Vegas in July.

Mr. Hadfield also stated that the Payment In Lieu of Taxes Bill is moving forward on a federal level.

At 12:00 noon the meeting was recessed, and the Association was guests of Kafoury, Armstrong and Co. and Swendsied for lunch in the Buffet Room. A special fashion show was put on by the Mineral County Museum.

SPEAKER: Dr. Martin Seidenfeld, Human Resources Corp., presented a program entitled "How To Never--No, Never!--Become Upset".

GENERAL BUSINESS: Appointing a member of C.F.O.A. to the NACO Board of Directors discussed, and Nancy Carr stated she would be willing to serve in this capacity and report back to the membership since President Beaudreau will be retiring and unable to serve in this capacity. Loretta Bowman moved to pay Nancy Carr's expenses for attending the NACO meetings (room, meals and transportation). Motion seconded by Evelyn Harmon and passed unanimously.

At 6:00 p.m., the Association was hosted to a cocktail party in the Trophy Room, sponsored by Bank of America. Dinner followed at 7:00 p.m. in the Trophy Room also sponsored by Bank of America. Officers were installed by District Court Judge John P. Davis. Special awards were also presented.

Eureka is situated in Eureka Canyon at an elevation of approximately 6,500 feet above sea level. It is located in the east-central portion of the State along Highway 50 which is known as the "Loneliest Road in America".

Highway 50 across Nevada, gained the reputation of being the "Loneliest Road in America" when *Life Magazine* labeled a 287 mile stretch, through and including Eureka, as "The Loneliest Road in America". With a tongue in cheek response to the magazine article, the Nevada Commission on Tourism and the communities along the route developed survival kits for those who "dared" to travel that portion of Hwy 50. In keeping with the jest, Eureka soon became the "Loneliest Town on the Loneliest Road in America". Although we don't consider ourselves "lonely", we are admittedly a little remote.

Eureka is presently experiencing an increase in mining activities and tourism. Due to these increases, our little town is sometimes limited on accommodations for the traveler so we suggest that you call in advance for reservations at any of the motels, hotels, or the RV Parks.

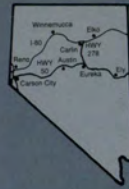

History of Eureka

Silver was discovered here in 1864. This was America's first important lead-silver discovery. Eureka did not boom until 1869 when smelters which could successfully separate silver from lead were developed.

Eureka County was formed in 1873. By 1878, more than 9,000 people lived in Eureka, making it the state's second largest city.



Like other early mining camps, Eureka started as a city of tents and crudely built structures. Prices for

Eureka Today

Eureka County encompasses 4,192 square miles, roughly twice the size of Delaware, and has a population of 2,000. The towns of Eureka, Beowawe, and Crescent Valley are unincorporated. Eureka today is experiencing a mining boom; mining is once again the largest industry in the county. The county and the public school district are the next largest employers.

The average annual precipitation is almost 10 inches and the average annual snow fall is 50 inches. Eureka is high desert at 6500 feet above sea level. The average high in January is 38 degrees and the average high in July is 85, but the temperature goes down with the sun, so bring some warm clothes.

Things to Do & See

Pick up a free walking tour and visit the town's historic buildings and cemeteries. The historic sites include the courthouse, the museum, and the opera house. The five cemeteries are located on the west side of town in Graveyard flat, also known as Death Valley.

Hunting is excellent in the area. Chukkar, dove, deer, sage grouse, ducks, and geese are all found just a few miles out of town. Inquire in Eureka for the best camping and fishing spots.

There are several choices of accommodations ranging from a bed-and-breakfast to hotels and motels, or an RV park.



You can read about history but it is not the same thing as experiencing it firsthand. Come to Eureka, Nevada, and step back a hundred years into a 19th century mining camp.

Stroll down the main street and pass the brick and stone commercial buildings. Enter the grand 1879 courthouse and see the authentic courtroom complete with original wainscotting, pressed tin ceiling, and chandeliers.

Discover the 1880 Eureka Opera House across the street.

The building is restored with an 1880 decoratively painted proscenium arch and the actual 1924 curtain advertising

local businesses. You will find the Eureka County Historical Society Museum located in the Eureka Sentinel newspaper building where you will find a wonderful collection of printing presses now silent in their original locations.



Explore the five cemeteries and enjoy the peace and quiet and fresh sage-filled air. Sit on the hill above Eureka and watch the glorious sunset. Come visit Eureka, step back into the past, and experience the real West.




Dear Nancy:

Corrections on Recording Procedures

Dear Editor:

The latest NACRC newsletter included some information about recording procedures in the State of Washington. I am writing to correct some mis-information contained in the article.

1. The majority of documents received with payment are recorded. However, there are a few document types specifically prohibited from recording by state law. State law also requires documents to contain a title; those without a title will be rejected.
2. FAX copies are accepted by many Washington State counties, and recorded with a notation that they are copies. State law does not prohibit recording copies. However, some counties do request an original for recording.
3. At this time, no county has the capability to accept electronic transmission of documents directly into the system, nor will counties record a document Faxed directly to the recorder since the fee has to be received prior to recording. Accepting direct FAX transmissions would require a method for fee collection such as a legislative change allowing the use of credit cards.

While recording copies rather than original documents is not specifically prohibited by Washington State law, philosophically most Auditors prefer recording the original. However, fax copies are seen as preferable in terms of public service when compared to no local recording.

New Cost Saving Bar Coding System

George J. Buglewicz, Douglas County Nebraska Register of Deeds, has developed a Bar Coding and Imaging system with assistance from Information Systems who are Kodak and IBM Representatives. The system has totally eliminated any paper copies of instruments received during the past year. That is anywhere from 95,000 to 125,000 instruments, which is then multiplied by six for recording. This is a savings in paper storage. The information is stored on a disc in the juke box, and on a roll of film which is developed through the scanning system which scans 60 pages per minute and at the same time develops two rolls of 16 mm film.

The Bar Coding System does automatic indexing of documents and gives Users access to the actual instrument within 24 to 30 hours after it's receipt—a process that used to take two weeks.

Savings of \$100,000, and a return to general fund of \$35,000 comes from cutting labor costs. There are now 18 employees doing more work faster and more efficiently than the 30 employees who were there when George Buglewicz took over.

Beverly Willard, Jessie Vettel and Donna Allgeier were the co-chairmen of this year's annual show.

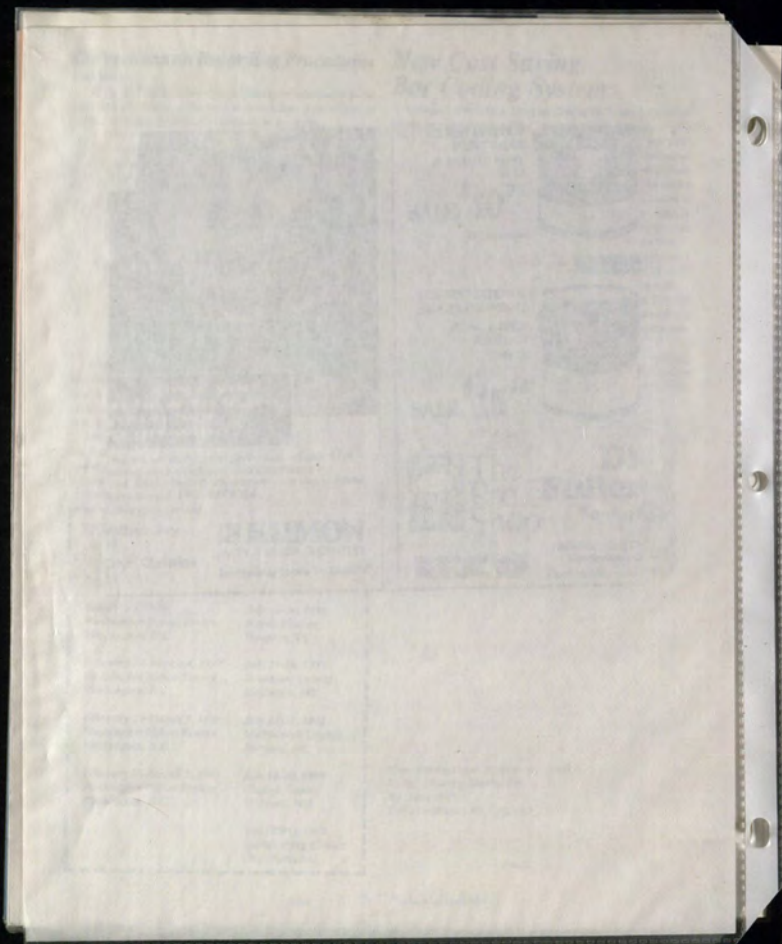
The event was a great success, with over 350 people being treated to the latest in fashions for men, women, teens and children, they said.

The models and ushers were members of the club and officials of the county.

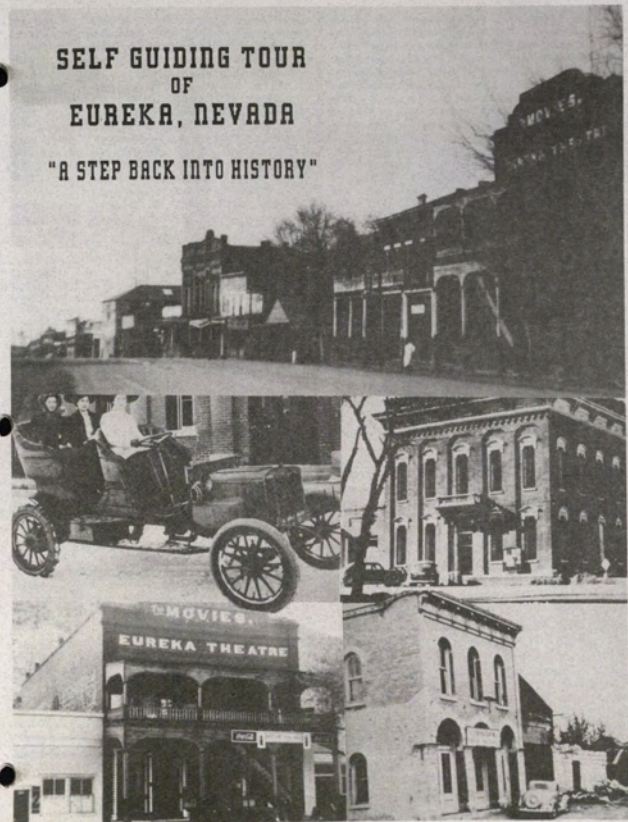

"A STEP BACK INTO HISTORY"



Compliments of Eureka County

EUREKA, today, remains a fine old town, unruined by commercialism. Her many aging buildings, appealing scenery of the nearby hills, and the people, make it a pleasant place to visit. Eureka is one of the friendliest towns located on Highway 50, which is also known as "The Loneliest Road in America." This self-guided tour will show you many old buildings, some privately owned and some historically restored. Please do not trespass in buildings that are privately owned (private residence) or any area that is not open for business. This tour involves some of the old buildings that are unsafe to walk in or near, so please be very careful. We hope that you will enjoy your experience of stepping back into a 19th century mining camp where one can walk in a century old atmosphere and listen to the whispers of history.

1. SENTINEL MUSEUM: This building was built in 1879, to replace the Eureka Sentinel Newspaper Office after one of the town fires destroyed all but the fireproof portion of the newspaper office. After the fire, the building remained so intensely hot that wet blankets were thrown over the backs of the printers so that they could get the paper out on schedule. The Eureka Sentinel Newspaper published their first newspaper in 1870 and continued to publish it here until 1960. The museum houses the original equipment and presses of the Eureka Sentinel Newspaper which are located in the back room. Many of the posters date back to the 1880's. The front portion of the museum shows a variety of interesting, historic, displays and memorabilia from Eureka's yesteryears. The upstairs houses county offices.

2. COLONNADE HOTEL: This building was erected in 1880, by the Italian Benevolent Society, who held their meetings here. By 1890, and into the 1930's, the building was vacant. In the 1940's the Colonnade was again open for business as a boarding house. Today it's a rooming house.

3. SADLER HOUSE (private residence): This house was built in 1879, by Reinhold Sadler, a well known businessman, who was also a Nevada Governor from 1886 - 1902. Sadler ran a general merchandise store on main street next to the present day Louie's Lounge. Mr. Sadler had a tunnel built from the basement of his home to his place of business so that he didn't have to go out into the weather.

4. EUREKA COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL: Eureka's first school was built on Nobb Hill in 1871. By 1924, the need for a new school was apparent. The voters favored a school tax to raise \$3,000, and this school was completed in March, 1924. This building housed the 1-12 grade students until a new high school was built on Vandal Way in 1969. Students from pre-school through sixth grade now attend this school.

5. BRICK BUILDING: This building with the "Castorlube Motor Oil" sign painted on its north side was originally a two story structure that was built in 1879, by the Italian company under the management of Celso Tatti.

It served as a saloon. It was in Tatti's saloon that approximately 500 Italian *carbonari* (charcoal burners) formed the Eureka Coalburners Protection Association in July, 1879. Because many of the Italian charcoal burners did not speak English, they were often cheated in the sale of charcoal to the refineries. After forming their association, the desperate burners stopped the supply of charcoal, asking for a 2 cent increase for a total of 30 cents a bushel. Several teamsters were threatened, the refineries threatened to shut down, and burners were arrested, but little charcoal was loaded. An ugly confrontation occurred on August 19, 1879, at Fish Creek, when striking charcoal burners and a local posse exchanged words, then shots. Six burners were killed and ten more were wounded. The coroner's inquest excused the posse as acting "in the line of duty." The charcoal burners realized that the companies had won and they had no choice but to go back to work. The companies then lowered the price of charcoal to 26 cents per bushel.

6. TOGNINI AND COMPANY BUILDING: This building which is now used for storage was built in 1877, by Tognini and Company. The Swiss-Italian company consisted of Joseph Tognini, Ferdinando Bonetti, and Gabriel Zanoli, and on this site, the Eureka Billiard Hall Saloon was operated. Like many other companies in Eureka at the time, Tognini and Company was involved in charcoal production; it was one of the largest. The building attached to the north was built in 1924, by John Biak. The front bricks are the same as those used in the construction of the school. Other portions contain bricks salvaged from the Pinto Mill that was located several miles southeast of town. The building is also the site of the first business establishment in Eureka known as The Pioneer Restaurant, which consisted only of a canvas tent. Note the star plates and rods on the side of the building for holding the walls together. Also on the north side of the building painted on the wall in the 1930's is the sign "Trupak Palora Peaches, a distinct new variety."

7. LOUIE'S LOUNGE: Two Jewish dry goods merchants erected this stone building in 1874. Cesare Rossetti acquired the building in 1874 and still owned it in 1886, when books were sold in the front, and lodgings could be had in the back. If you look at the back of the building, you can still see the original blocks made from local volcanic rock. It is now a bar with a reception hall in the back.

8. ALPINE LODGE & BAR: Where the Alpine Lodge is now located, a two-story frame building stood in the 1880's. The original building housed a dry goods or clothing store downstairs and the San Francisco Lodging House was upstairs. Around 1880, William Zadow moved his butcher shop from a building next to the Eureka Opera House to this location, a business which he operated for well beyond twenty years. In 1941, the place was known as the Lincoln Hotel. In 1969, this hotel was the site of a local murder. The murder still remains a mystery today. It is now a bar, cafe and hotel.

9. EUREKA CAFE: This establishment was really two buildings. In 1873, the northern half of the building was erected. It was built from local quarried volcanic tuff. The constructor, William H. Clark, ran a general merchandise and hardware store downstairs, and upstairs provided offices for doctors, dentists, and lawyers. A Nevada legislator and attorney, Thomas Wren, had offices here. In 1907, the building was converted into the Zadow Hotel and at this time the southern portion of the building was built. When the Lincoln Highway opened in 1915-16, the price of a hotel room was \$2.50 a day, under the American Plan. In 1920, Ed Herrera acquired the property and changed the name to the Eureka Hotel. Pete Laborde, former owner of the Nevada Club, owned this hotel in the 1930's. From around 1942, until 1990, the Eureka Cafe was owned and operated by a Chinese family serving excellent Chinese food.

10. JIM AND LORRAINE'S CAFE AND BAR: This building was also built of local volcanic tuff. It was built prior to 1873, by Solomon Ashim and his brother. In the 1930's and early 1940's, it served as a county restaurant. The present owners acquired the building in the early 1960's, and until 1991, operated it as a bar and cafe.

11. EUREKA COUNTY COURTHOUSE: Construction on this two-story brick structure began in 1879, and was completed in 1880; it was added to an already existing jail. The expense to build the main building was approximately \$55,000 and roughly \$15,000 for the jail, vault, and fixtures. When it was completed, it was the finest courthouse in the state, outside of Virginia City. The judge's bench, in the large upstairs courtroom, is made of imported Spanish Cedar. The large iron shutters adjacent to the windows and doors of the courthouse, and other building throughout the town, protected the windows from fires and other damages. The two large bells in front of the courthouse were rung as fire alarms by two of Eureka's several volunteer fire companies. Each bell was identified by its tone. The courthouse is still in use today, but still exhibits some turn-of-the-century style.

12. This red brick building, with iron columns was built in 1880, and was used as a wholesale liquor store. During the 1890's, it was a stationery store and post office. The Farmers and Merchants Bank was located here in the 1930's. The Farmers and Merchants Bank was one of the few banks in the country that did not close down during the Bank Holiday of the 1930's. Later, in the 1930's, the bank moved down the street to the present location of First Interstate Bank.

13. EUREKA SENIOR CENTER: The older portion of this building was erected in the summer of 1880. It has housed many businesses over the years; a grocery store, a variety store, a mortuary and now the Senior Center. The new portion of the building was completed only a few years ago.

14. TURNER HOUSE-BUREAU HOTEL (vacant): B.J. Turner had a two-story hotel here in the 1870's and early

1880's. The name changed to the Bureau Hotel in 1884, when it was purchased by F. McElroy. There was a lodging house upstairs and a restaurant and saloon downstairs in the 1890's. It was used as a bakery and grocery store during later years. Prior to World War II, it was still being used as a lodging house. Sometime after 1949, the second story was removed.

15. SAN FRANCISCO BREWERY (offices): This building was the San Francisco Brewery in the mid-1870's. Beer was bottled in the back. There was a saloon in the front portion. The original wood structure burned down in the fire of August, 1880. Later that year a brick structure was built on the site by Mau and Company. After the turn-of-the-century, Frank Brossemer purchased the building, ran a saloon in front and bottled soda pop in the back. The Eureka Post Office was here from 1941 until it moved to the present site in 1982.

16. EUREKA POST OFFICE: This building was built after the August 17, 1880, fire, which started in the store next door. The Eureka Market, which was a butcher shop, was here in the 1880's. If you step inside, you can see the old pressed tin ceiling with floral and bird designs.

17. EUREKA OPERA HOUSE AND THEATRE: This impressive building was built on the foundation of the Odd Fellows Hall in late 1880, after the original structure had been destroyed in the August, 1880 fire. The building was started in 1879 as a Labor Union Hall. The union, going on strike, ran out of funds and sold the incomplete building. An early account of the new facility stated that "The new opera house was thoroughly fire-proof, with two-foot thick masonry walls, a brick and iron front, and a slate roof." The floor was built to be shock absorbing so that you could dance all night and never have tired feet. Eureka was on the main tour circuit for opera and theatre performances. Many famous personalities performed here during Eureka's hey-day. Opera House served as a community auditorium, showing anything of interest: boxing, speeches, plays, graduations, dances and masquerade balls sponsored by the Nob Hill Fire Company. Much of the early scenery had been hand-painted in Italy. It was destroyed in a fire caused by a misplaced lantern. Silent movies were brought to Eureka in 1913, and the name of the Opera House changed to the Eureka Theatre. "Talkies" were shown here in later years with the last movie being shown in 1958. This building stood idle for many, many years until Eureka County acquired it and began restoration and renovation of the building in 1991. It is now used as a convention center.

18. JACKSON HOUSE: This brick building was built in 1877. The building was gutted in the 1880 fire and then was rebuilt and operated until the 1890's. In 1907 it became the Brown Hotel and operated under that name for many years. After many years of vacancy, it was restored as an historical building in 1981. At this time it is once again called the Jackson House.

19. RYLAND BUILDING (private residence): This is the second building to occupy this spot, as the first was destroyed by the August, 1880 fire. The building has been used as offices, apartments, and a restaurant, and is now a private home.

20. CREW CAR NO. 29: This restored crew car is the only piece of rolling stock in Eureka County left from the Eureka & Palisade Railroad. The once thriving Eureka & Palisade Railroad began in 1873, when Eureka businessmen formed a railroad company and sold stock to wealthy San Francisco bankers who had made their fortune from the Comstock mines in Virginia City. A narrow gauge railroad was built to haul refined ore from the Eureka smelters, as well as ore from several other mining camps, some eighty miles to Palisade, where it connected with the mainline of the transcontinental Central Pacific Railroad. This crew car was used as sleeping quarters for the men working on the rail line.

21. FOWLEY-RICKARD-JOHNSON-REMINGTON BUILDING: This is the site of Eureka's first adobe house built by Abe Bateman. In 1879, M.D. Fowley and Richard Rickard built this brick structure which was originally a two-story building. The cost, when completed, was approximately \$28,000. The Remington, Johnson, and Company hardware store was located in the northern portion of the present building in the 1880's and 1890's. A book store and stationery store, saloon, assay office and Wells Fargo Express Office used other portions of the first floor during this period; upstairs was the Masonic and Odd Fellow's Hall and other offices as noted above. During the 1920's, groceries were sold in the old

Remington store. The original iron pilasters of columns remain today. The second story of the building was demolished in 1983, and now under new ownership, the building is being rebuilt.

22. TOMMYKNOCKER: This is the site of one of Eureka's first banks, the Paxton and Company Bank. The original building was destroyed in the fire of 1879, and the only thing left standing was the bank vault. A new bank was built around the vault. The bank issued its own currency with its name on the bills. Around 1890, a Western Union Telegraph Office was added to the bank. By the year 1941, a store occupied this building and in later years, it was operated as the Gold Bar. It is now a stained glass studio and gift shop.

23. EUREKA SERVICES: The original building on this site was built in the late 1870's and operated as a hardware business until the fires of 1879. The present building was completed in September, 1879. At that time it became a clothing store. In the early 1900's, the Mas Brothers purchased the building and sold clothing, shoes, books and stationery. The building was occupied until the 1940's. Eureka Services now operate a video, gift and gun store out of the building.

24. THE HANGING TREE: This building was the City Brewery and Soda Works, which supplied the first beer in Eureka. It has been a barber shop, the Bank Club Bar and from about 1945 to the 1960's it was Bays Fountain. The building in the 1970's, was a movie theater and is now a gift shop.

25. OWL BAR AND STEAK HOUSE: On the original site of the establishment was a two-story structure. The C.P. Brewery was downstairs and the Palace Saloon upstairs. A one-story structure was built after the 1880 fire. This building has been used as a bar and cafe for many years.

26. NEVADA CLUB BAR: The southern portion of this establishment was originally called the Tiger Saloon. It gained a very notorious reputation when on separate occasions, gunfights in the saloon resulted in the death of two men. After the August, 1880 fire, the saloon was rebuilt as a two-story frame structure in only 13 days. The saloon and dance hall continued to operate into the 1890's. The building was destroyed again around the turn of the century. In 1930, the present two-story concrete structure was built. The northern portion of this building, which is now closed, was constructed in 1880 or 1881 by Joseph Tognini & Company. The frame structure was destroyed by fire in March, 1880. No sooner had the new saloon been rebuilt, when it was consumed again by the August, 1880 fire. It was then rebuilt as the present brick structure. It is now a bar/gaming establishment with a dance floor in the back.

27. RAINE'S MARKET: There are actually two old buildings used as Raine's Market. The southern portion of the building is one that survived the 1879 fire. It was known as F.J. Schneider's Drugstore and remained so for many years. This portion of the building has been used as a restaurant, shoe store, saloon, assay office and in the 1940's became the Kitchen Brothers Market. The northern section was built in 1879, as a saloon. This building also survived the fire of 1879 and after the fire it was opened as a clothing store. Through the years this portion of Raine's Market had been a wholesale liquor warehouse, a saloon, a men's clothing store, a notions store and from the 1940's to the 1960's, it was the Eureka Drug and Fountain. The pressed tin ceiling can still be seen in this portion of the building.

28. FIRST INTERSTATE BANK: This was the original site of the very first livery stable in Eureka. A stone building was built here prior to 1873. Housed in it was what was known as "The Corner! The Largest and First Saloon in the State." A man by the name of Charles Lautenschlager bought the building in 1879 and promptly tore it down. He had just completed the new building when it was burned down in the fire of April, 1879. He erected the present stone building by October of that same year. A saloon operated in the front and the Old Corner Chop House was in the rear. Around 1912, the building housed the Lani and Repetto Saloon and Eureka Brewery. In the late 1930's, the Farmers and Merchants Bank, which was founded by Edna Howard Covert Plummer in July 1920, was moved to this location. (Edna C. Plummer held the distinction of being the first woman in the nation to found a national bank. She was also the first woman District Attorney in the nation and served in Eureka County in 1918). Later this bank became the First National Bank of Nevada, and in 1981 the First Interstate Bank of Nevada.

29. MASONIC BUILDING: The American Exchange Building stood on this corner before the first of August, 1880, when it was destroyed. Inside the building were offices and stores. After the fire the owner of the property, James Whitton, built the present brick building. Over the next few years, the building contained a dry goods store, jewelry store, barber shop, bath house, tailor shop and tinsmith shop. In 1907, a portion of the building was used as the Eureka post office, the rest of the building was vacant. James Whitton, the owner also had a fireproof cellar built under the building. The Masonic Lodge which had its first meetings in the office of Judge J.P. Adams and received their charter in 1872, met and shared the building as a meeting place with the Odd Fellows. Later the Odd Fellows membership fell so low that they sold the building to the Masons for \$1.00. Today, the Masons and Eastern Star organization still meet here and this is believed to be the only underground temple still in use in the United States.

30. This vacant building with the three fire doors was Brown and Godfrey's Oyster Saloon, Chop House, and Confectionery. It was open 24 hours a day and was the only candy maker in town.

31. AL'S HARDWARE: This store is the only business in Eureka that has been owned and operated by one family since the 1870's. It was originally a two-story building but after the two fires, it was reduced to the single story. It began as the Stone Saloon with a boarding house upstairs. In 1903, it became the Eureka Cash Store. In 1946, Al Biale took over from his father and started Al's Hardware. Al Biale operated the hardware business for many years and in later years, with the help of his son, Arthur. It is now being operated by Al's daughter and son-in-law.

32. STONE BUILDING: This native stone building has been several things, most notably a warehouse. Notice the excellent stone work, cut to fit together with a mortar from local clay.

33. SKILLMAN HOUSE: This two-story brick building was known as the Skillman House. It was the home of Archibald Skillman, founder and publisher of the Eureka Sentinel Newspaper, in 1870. The newspaper was sold in 1944, by Ben Skillman, however, a Skillman family member still owns this building.

34. THE PARSONAGE HOUSE: This house, known as the Parsonage House, was originally built in 1886. There have been two major renovations to this house in the past one hundred years of its existence. The last renovation was completed in 1986, and it is now a bed and breakfast.

35. METHODIST CHURCH (private residence): The first two Methodist Churches were destroyed by two of Eureka's famous fires. The present structure was dedicated in 1881. An article on the building states that it had a library, vestibule and a small sleeping area for visiting clergy. The insides were said to be richly arrayed, with red fern carpeting, stain glass windows and seating for 250 people. During the 1920's, revivals were held in the church. There was nothing but a shell left in 1982, when it was purchased and renovated by private individuals. It is now a woodworking shop in the front, with living quarters in the back.

36. SAINT JAMES EPISCOPAL CHURCH: This is Eureka's first permanent Church, built in 1872, one year after the cornerstone was laid. It was built to accommodate the miners that had come from England. Regular services were held from 1883, until the church was closed in 1907. It is made of hand-cut local volcanic stone and survived the disastrous fire of the 1880's. Today, services are again held on a regular basis.

37, 38, 39, 40. CEMETERIES: There are five cemeteries located all on the west side of Eureka in Graveyard Flat, or as it was known in the 1880's, as Death Valley. They can be reached by driving west past the Courthouse up Ruby Hill Avenue. The first one on the south side of the road is the Catholic, next is the Masonic. Across the road to the north are the County and City cemeteries and further north, nestled in the trees, is the L.O.O.F. cemetery. In the 1870's, and 1880's, the County Cemetery was had an office above the Sentinel Office. Eureka also had Chinese and Jewish cemeteries, but very little remains of the grave sites. Most of these cemeteries are being used today. Please show proper respect for those that have passed on and do not disturb any of the headstones or gravesites.

41. ZADOW AND MORRISON HOUSE (private residence): This Victorian style house was built around 1886, by James Wilson. Later it was owned by William Zadow, who owned a butcher shop on Main Street and later the Zadow Hotel (Eureka Cafe). Around 1910, it was purchased by Dan Morrison. The Morrison Family owned it for many years. In 1976, under new ownership, it was renovated as a private home. Many homes of this type were burned in the fires that swept through town, although three of the same design, remain along the crest of the hill.

42. SAINT BRENDAN'S CATHOLIC CHURCH: This Catholic Church was erected in 1874, to replace the first one, which was an old wood structure that was built in 1871, by Father D. Monteverde. The present stone structure was built for a cost of \$5,000.00, from the volcanic rock that came from the Chandler Quarry above the west side of town. It still serves as the Catholic Church today. Eureka's first two-story brick school was located on the south side of the church. It was built in 1879, but was torn down in the late 1930's. It had been vacated in the early 1920's due to structural damage.

43. NOB HILL FIREHOUSE (vacant): This building served as housing for one of five volunteer fire companies in Eureka during the 1870's and 1880's. The companies were the Eureka Hook and Ladder, Rescue, Richmond, Knickerbocker, and Nob Hill. The fire companies were more like social clubs where the men played cards and socialized. In later years there was a Chinese Volunteer Fire Department and a Eureka Volunteer Fire Department. This small wooden building was where the Nob Hill Fire Company housed their hose cart. The building partially burned on September 22, 1884. The present building, was probably constructed from the remains of the earlier firehouse.

44. PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH: This church was organized

and built in 1873. At the turn of the century the Presbyterian congregation had dwindled so that the Methodist Church occupied the building. Later, it served as the Presbyterian Church again. It is now owned by the Diamond Valley Baptist Church and is called the Eureka Bible Church. The bell from the church is now on the south side of the Sentinel Museum.

45. GENERAL STORE: This brick building was built in 1882, as the Ottawa Hotel to replace an earlier frame structure. It has served as a grocery store and gas station and now serves as both.

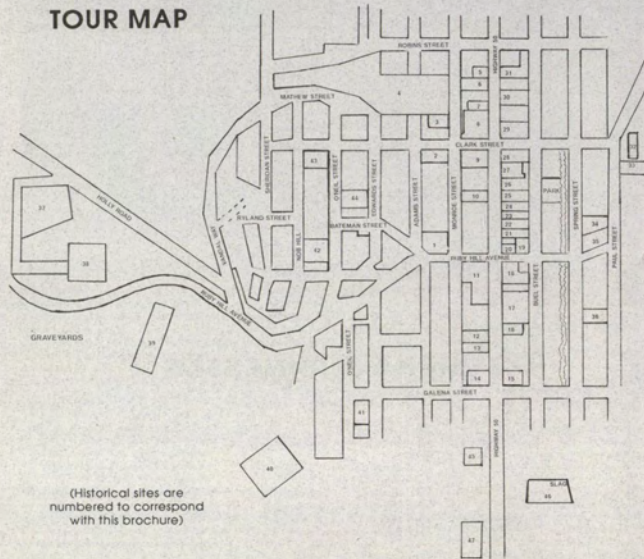
46. SLAG: Sixteen smelters refined the ores of the district. The smoke was so heavy at times that the black clouds floated over town, leaving soot and dirt everywhere and poisoning the air. The name "Pittsburgh of the West" grew out of this somber aspect of Eureka. This is the site of the Richmond Consolidated Smelter. The only thing that can still be seen of the smelter is the slag heaps, some ruins and the ditch for the smoke stack on the east side of the highway. The first furnace on this site was built in 1871, to process ores from the Richmond Mine. Later that year the furnace and mine were purchased by the Richmond Consolidated Mining Company. Later, two other furnaces were built along with three hydrocycle or water jacket furnaces. All of this was destroyed by fire in 1878. It was all rebuilt, and four hydrocycle furnaces replaced the old smelter operation. In 1890, the Richmond Smelter stopped operations, and around the turn of the century it was dismantled.

47. TANNEHILL LOG CABIN: This log cabin is believed to have been the first house built in Eureka around 1865. In later years, it served as Eureka's first store. It is built of massive pine logs from the pinyon pine trees that then grew at higher elevations around Eureka. The ceiling is composed of smaller pinyon and juniper logs. It has been modified slightly since its original construction.

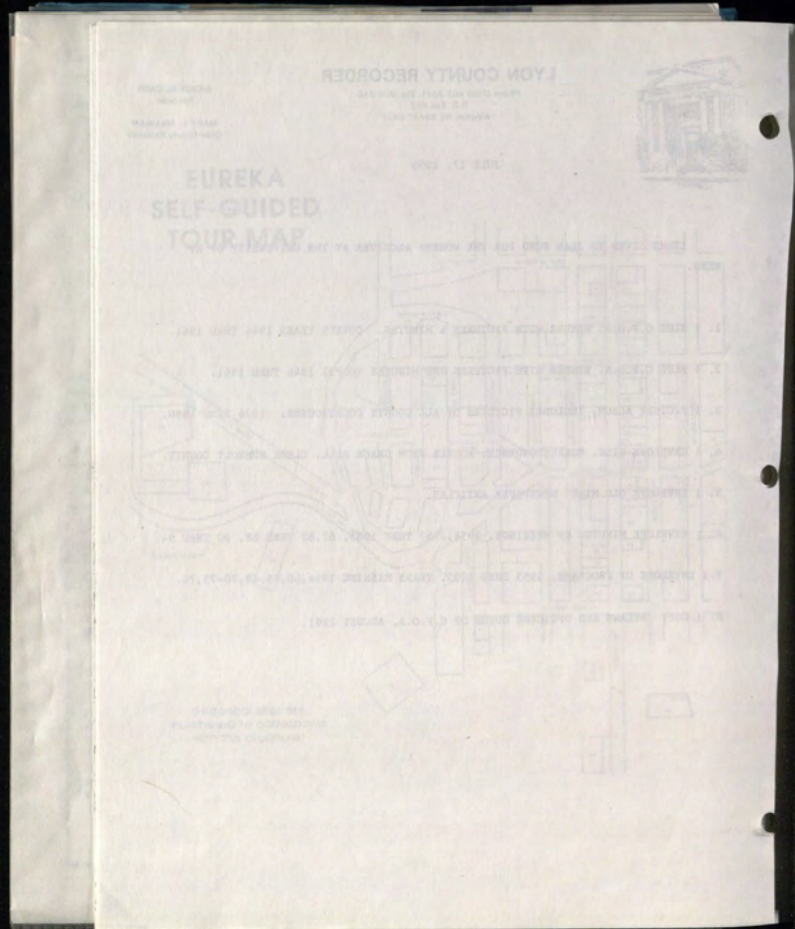

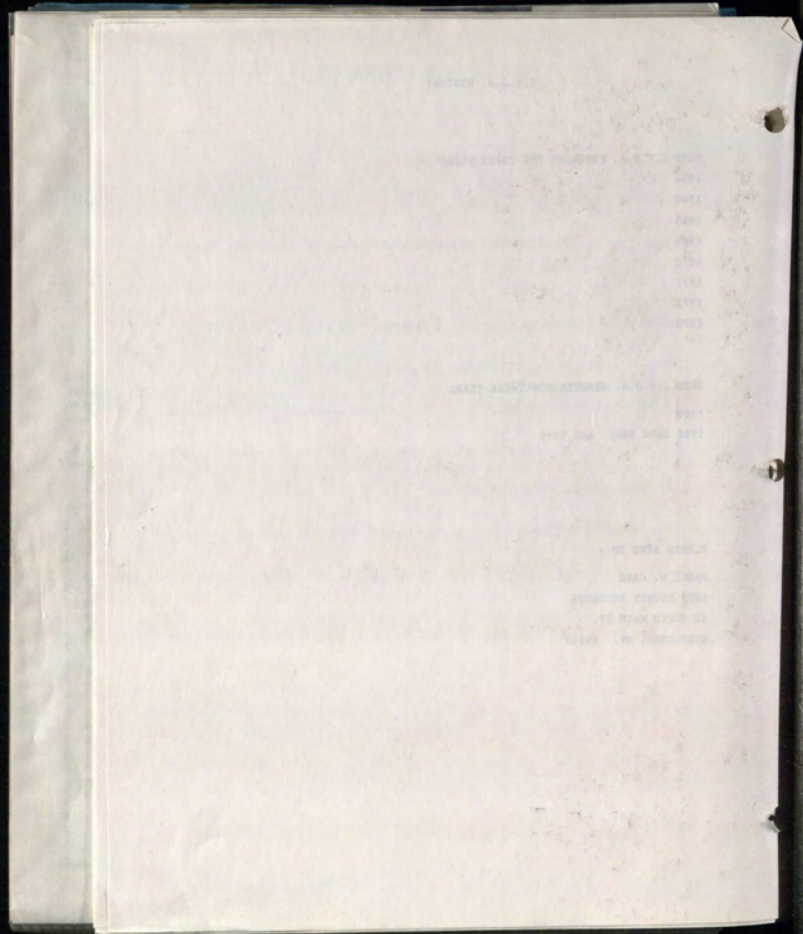
