## Fall Clean Up Day Saturday, November 8th, 2025



#### The Mission of the Methodist Church: Transforming the World Together

On a Monday in October, I went to Glenview, Illinois, for a new clergy orientation with the Northern Illinois Conference. It was a meaningful day of worship and learning, surrounded by other new pastors from across the state. I met district superintendents, the assistant to the bishop, and Bishop Dan Schwerin, and listened to their wisdom about ministry in today's world.

What stayed with me most from that day was a renewed sense of our shared mission as Methodist people—to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. I was reminded that this transformation doesn't begin in faraway places or through large institutions; it begins right where we are. It begins with each local church that is rooted in its own community, connected to its neighbors, and involved in the everyday life that happens around it.

That's what it means for us at Rockton UMC to live out the mission of the Church. We are called not only to welcome people into our building but also to step outside of it—to notice what God is already doing in our neighborhood and to join in. When we form real, mutual relationships with those around us, the line between "church" and "community" begins to fade. Together, we become partners in serving and caring for one another.

A simple but beautiful example of this happened recently with our community garden. A group of Boy Scouts and their families spent months planning and creating a new sign for the garden. They designed it, cut

the wood, painted it, and carefully prepared every detail. Then they came to the church one afternoon to clean the garden area, dig holes, hammer posts into the ground, and finally install the sign. It was more than a project—it was a shared act of care.

That process, from start to finish, mattered. We didn't simply receive help; we shared in something meaningful together. The Scouts gave their time and skill, and in return, they became part of something that serves others—a garden that grows food for our neighbors and strengthens our community. This is what healthy relationships look like. Sometimes we serve the community; other times, the community serves us. It's not about one side giving and the other receiving—it's about walking alongside one another in partnership and grace.

That's what it means to transform the world in small but faithful ways. Transformation doesn't always happen through grand gestures. Sometimes it begins with a few people working side by side in the garden—digging, talking, laughing, and creating something good together.

As I reflect on that day in Glenview and on our life here in Rockton, I am reminded that the Methodist mission is not abstract—it's personal, local, and relational. When we open our hearts to our neighbors, God uses those relationships to bring hope, healing, and new life. And in that simple, shared work, the world begins to change.
