Within the past few days, some of our members may have noticed the bench, tape, and cones in the West Parking Lot of the church. They are protecting a small sink hole that opened up while they were plowing the snow after this past Sunday's snow storm.

Luckily, no one was injured, nor any equipment damaged.

The Village Water Department has checked it out and it is *not due* to any water pipes or other utilities. It is most likely due to an old septic or whatever from the house that used to be there back in the 1960s. There was a depression in that area a few years ago that was repaired, so this may be a continuation of that. The contractor who has done our previous parking lot work has been contacted and we will receive a quote this week.

Additionally, Dan Barber of the Rockton Water Department came by and looked over the situation. He did confirm that it is <u>not related</u> to any Village water lines or whatever.

He did offer the suggestion that we dig out and around it to be sure that whatever is causing this is eliminated, which I think is good advice. For those of you who don't remember, there was a house there many decades ago, could be a an old septic or whatever. A classmate of mine in the HHS Class of 1964, Greg Schmidt, used to live there.

Does anyone recall what year we bought that house and put in the parking lot...maybe the latter half of the 1960s?

## From The Rockton Herald, 1877, Editor Edson Carr—

### Rockton had a sense of humor in 1877!

Newspaper items in the local newspapers during the 1870s tended to not only be informational but many times displayed some humor, as is the case in the following item concerning temperance, which was a big anti-liquor movement in this country following the Civil War. Rockton Herald editor Edson Carr noted that this article had been "picked up on the street." The author of this piece certainly had a sense of humor and the following item was titled: "Stray leaf from the diary of a Temperance Man"

Carr noted, "There is no author's name given and no clue to the writer's identity but the hero cannot object to its publication.

- "Monday, April 16th, Got a headache. Was invited two weeks ago to make an impromptu speech at the temperance meeting tonight. Consented. Went to meeting and speech a success. Felt good. Walked up to depot to see a man. Dark. Fence post maliciously got in the middle of walk. Collision. Back end of nose driven through back of head. Very dark but surprising number of stars visible. Broke into lumber office and got claw hammer to pull nose back into position. Puttied up hole in back of head.
- "*Tuesday, 17<sup>th</sup>.* Asked by wife to 'rise and explain.' Forgot all about the hero of the little hatchet and said lumberman struck me. She said, 'too thin' and reached as usual for broomstick. Suddenly remembered that I wanted to see a man downtown. Found him. He asked, 'What's the matter with your nose?' Remembering the good little boy who never told a lie, informed him of the truth. Didn't believe me and asked where I got my whiskey. Whipped him.
- "Noon. Conductor asked, 'What's the matter with your nose?' Whipped him at once.
- Encouraged by this, I tackled baggage man who inquired, 'What's the matter with your nose?' Poor success. He had had too much experience in 'smashing' things. (Memorandum. Go to Widderson's and get another set of teeth cast.)
- "Wednesday, 18th. Lumberman made an original observation. 'What's the matter with your nose?' Whipped him.
- "Eighty-seven men asked same question. Whipped 43 was whipped by 44 of them. (Memorandum. Buy a wig.)
- "Whipped lumberman for bringing in a bill for use of hammer. Whipped him twice more for saying 'I nose' all about it.
- "Thursday, 19th. Killed a telegraph operator for asking me, 'What is wrong with your nose?
- "Same day. 24034 men, women and children asked, 'What's the matter with your nose?'
- "Friday, 20th. Hired lumberman to whittle out a wooden ear.
- "Owner of fence post handed in a bill for damages. So large, I couldn't whip more than half of him at once, so *bought* him off.
- "Saturday, 21st. Joined license party and am happy."
