

That was quite a cold and snowy spell we had in mid-January and it was good to know the building stayed nice and toasty warm. The heavy, slushy snow was tough for our sidewalk crew as the church snow blower wasn't quite up to the job. Many thanks for the hard work of the Hellinga family and to Lanes for doing the lots. We finally got a part for our tank-less water heater so there is hot water again. But, all in all, let's hope any building issues are minor ones.

As we move into the New Year, a look back at 2023 found us with some large building expenses that, thank the Lord, we were able to cover. While we may bemoan having to make major repairs to things like roofs, windows and parking lots, when all is said and done, we find ourselves with facilities that are in much better shape and will hopefully last us for many years.

By now, most of you are aware that we've set a budget for 2024 that is a reasonable one that will take us through the year. It attempts to take in rising costs in such things as our liability and building insurance. As the Trustees look ahead, however, there are other major building expenses that will require planning and preparation for the time when we can no longer put them off. Trustees will be coordinating with the Ad Council and Finance on these plans. Your leadership teams will be considering some fund-raising events, pledge drives etc. so that we can stay ahead of what we'll need to keep our facilities usable and safe in the coming years and support new and continuing programs. If we all work together, we can prepare for what's needed so it's not as big a burden as it might be if we put it off until we can wait no longer. We hope everyone will want to be involved in planning and preparing for the future of RUMC.



We are looking for fundraising ideas to help with our annual budget. It has been several years since the church has held a fundraiser. If you have ideas or experience with fundraisers which might be a good fit for our church, please speak with Pastor Carolyn or anyone on the Leadership Team.

## Finance Update

#### February 2024

I want to let our congregation know that our church's financial status is stable. We are a church with an impeccable track record for service and giving and I am glad and humbled to be a part of such a unique and dynamic congregation. I want to provide you with some background concerning our finances to help you see where we are and how we got here. All of us together will determine where we are going.

First, the church has an endowment fund, which is held in an investment fund through the United Methodist Conference. It is invested in stocks: you might think of it as a managed mutual fund. Currently, the value of this endowment is about \$85,000. Naturally, this amount fluctuates with the rise and fall of the stock market. Our hope and intention is to use a portion of this to support community outreach programs, missions, and other church programs. Since this endowment was made possible by a very generous donation, we feel this would be a most appropriate use to honor the donor.

Secondly, we currently have a savings reserve of just under \$25,000. We feel this is an appropriate amount for emergencies, unexpected needs, and/or as operational revenue reserve which could cover operational costs for about three months, if such a need were to ever arise.

Lastly, we have a fluid checking account of approximately \$22,000 (as of January 10, 2024), pending bill payments. There are both weekly and quarterly billings which impact the balance of the checking account, making the balance during the start of a new quarter lower until weekly deposits catch up.

In preparing the budget, we compare expenditures to our estimated income (revenues) generated from pledges and donations. The major expenditures we address are the necessary costs which are essential in allowing us to be an active church. The two main expenditures that account for a major portion of the budget are staffing and facilities. Estimated church income becomes budget the foundation for our planning process. The budget which was prepared and presented at our 2024 Conference is a very bare bones budget which does not have much flexibility for absorbing potential overspending caused by inflation and/or other unexpected price increases.

Staffing accounts for about 60-65% of the budget and facilities accounts for about 30%. Although we have a possible deficit in our budget, our end of year income exceeded the estimate on which our budget was

based. A shortfall is not something to panic about, but we must consider how a deficit could be covered from other income sources. This is an issue churches manv must address. Increased income could come from increases in annual giving, fundraising events, drawing from our reserves, and/or a combination of these sources. Ideally, we would like to avoid using the reserve funds and keep them for emergencies, facility and repairs, improvements and seeding future programs.

My 'star word' is renewal, which is fitting for what I am asking everyone to consider. We would ask that members consider a nominal increase in their annual giving or sharing in fund raising efforts. An example of the significance of someone increasing their giving can be seen in the depiction of a household increasing their giving by \$1.00 a week, which would total \$52 more a year. If all households did the same or similar, there could be an increase of \$2,500 in church revenues. What an impact an amount like a dollar more per week can make when multiplied out. This is just something to think about and is only meant to put into perspective the possibilities of increasing ones giving. Each member needs to assess their own personal financial situation first and foremost and we truly appreciate all that everyone puts into our church in time, service and love.

Dear Rockton Methodist Church Members,


Your charitable contributions are appreciated. Caritas has accomplished much this year.
