Grateful for 2025, Hopeful for 2026

A new year invites reflection, and January 2026 feels like the right moment to pause and give thanks. It has now been a little over six months since my family and I arrived in Rockton, and when I look back, I see a season shaped by welcome, learning, and shared life. What began last June with an interview conversation with the SPRC has grown into a ministry formed through real relationships and God's faithfulness among us.

Feeling welcomed began even before my first Sunday in worship. When we moved into the parsonage, it was immediately clear that this was more than a place prepared out of responsibility. It was a home prepared with care. Your generosity showed not only in the many items that filled the house, but in the thought behind them. You had clearly put yourselves in our place, thinking about our family, our children, and what a new beginning might feel like. That sense of being considered met us right away, and it shaped how we settled into this community.

Being entrusted with leadership became tangible on my first Sunday. At the end of that service, our SPRC chair handed me a baton. It was a simple gesture, yet it carried deep meaning. It spoke of trust, continuity, and shared responsibility. In that moment, I understood more clearly that I was not stepping into ministry alone, but joining a story already in motion. That baton has stayed with me as a reminder that ministry here is something we carry together.

Getting to know one another happened through listening and conversation. In those early months, we gathered for listening tours and small group meetings where stories were shared, questions were asked, and trust began to grow. Sitting together and hearing hopes, concerns, and memories of this church helped me learn not only about Rockton UMC, but about the people who make it what it is. Those conversations laid an important foundation for our life together.

Learning the heart of this congregation also happened through pastoral moments. My first memorial service reminded me how sacred it is to stand with families holding both grief and hope. My first home visits taught me again that ministry often unfolds through listening and presence. One visit that remains especially meaningful was my time with Bob Lawhorn, now 101 years old. Sitting together and hearing stories shaped by a long life was a gift that deepened my sense of what it means to serve this community.

Living out our faith together became especially visible through mission and outreach. From serving at the soup kitchen, to welcoming families during Trunk-or-Treat, to opening our doors during the Christmas Walk, I saw a church that shows up for its neighbors. These were not simply activities on a calendar. They were expressions of care, generosity, and a desire to be present in the life of this town.

Sharing life across generations came into focus as Advent approached. Christmas music practices gathered Sunday school children and congregants of all ages. Watching children learn hand chimes, hearing voices blend, and seeing adults encourage one another offered a beautiful picture of who we are as the Church. These gatherings were not only about preparing for Christmas Eve. They were about connection, patience, and joy.
