The worship series we begin in October was designed to help congregations lean into their faith as we approach national elections in November. The series is based on the Golden Rule (Do unto others) and acknowledges that although we are blessed to have freedom of speech, the polarization in our nation is difficult to navigate. The focus of this series is about finding ways we can honor one another even in the midst of our differences.

The anchor image or symbol featured in this series is a heart with red and blue areas representing our differences. "The purple space is where we cultivate compassion, respect, humility, kindness, and love for one another, no matter what our other differences may be on the outside."

The combination of red and blue make purple. In this example, it does not represent watering down or mixing our opinions and ideals or changing those who are different. Rather, it is about creating space for discovering and celebrating our shared values, discovering the beauty which is possible only when we work together to make the world a better place.

Instead of staying in our own silos and interacting only with people like us, we are challenged to engage in conversation and seek a common good, even if we cannot find common ground with family, friends, and neighbors who we think of as being on the "other side" politically.

I invite you to be in prayer for our church, our neighbors, and our nation as we approach the election. Let us be asking God to show us how we can gather around the light of Christ and model coming together to care for one another in the midst of a fractured society. "What if we could have a 'revolution of kindness' with Christ at the center? If we can't do it here and now, where and when 'for God's sake' will we?"

What's Up with the Building?

Have you driven by the Parsonage recently? If not, take a detour next time you're near there and see the new landscaping around the building. What's especially nice about the work is that, not only does it look great, it's rock and not mulch, so the maintenance from year to year will be much less. A big shout out to Pastor and Mark for their donation to the Parsonage.

You may be aware of the investigation undertaken by the Trustees into the possibility of obtaining a grant from the State of Illinois to upgrade the security of our building. Applying for such a grant is a huge undertaking and we had someone from the Department of Homeland Security come out and evaluate the building. We were considering the use of a grant writer who has worked with several other institutions in Northern Illinois. After much consideration and consulting with other church teams, however, we decided we really couldn't afford the fee to pursue this especially since there's no guarantee we would get the grant. That being said, there are still several things we can do to update our building's security that will not break our budget. Just to name a couple, we would like to install new and additional cameras now that the building is vacant much of the time. Our exterior lighting is pretty good now but can be improved and we should have a discussion about identifying a "safe room". Do you have some feedback on this issue? We'd love to hear it. Please contact me or another Trustee or Ad Council member.


While not necessarily related to security, in our discussions it came up that we do not have an AED available for cardiac emergencies. These are pretty much standard in most schools and churches and we need to consider getting one



and training folks in its use. While it has been pointed out that we are across the street from RFD, we can't always be sure the paramedics will be available, and we need to be able to act if necessary. This is something that could be donated. New ones run around \$1500 but some good refurbished units are more affordable at around \$750.

I hope you've noticed the ceiling of the North Room of the Sanctuary has been patched and painted. Pray that our roof holds out as we have been told by professional roofers that the Sanctuary roof and the roof on the Education

Wing have only two, or at best, three seasons left before they will need to be replaced. A couple of years ago we had an estimate of over \$51,000 to replace the roofs so we need to begin fund raising now so we can try to meet the goal of replacing the roofs in the next two to three years. Finally, all the light poles around parking lots have freshlv painted poles and new batteries in their solar lights. With winter coming on, folks may have more of a chance to see it they're working. Note: A lantern has to detect motion and it has to be dark to turn on. In the process it was noticed that six of the poles have memorial plaques on them but they are so tarnished vou'd hardly notice it. Four of the poles have no plagues/memorial. The tarnish is pretty thick and stubborn so it may be a while before we'll be able to read them.
