The way in which they have been assimilated and processed at different times has, at times, passed through the religious and theological filter. In the three selected writers, this dimension is not absent and reflects much of the interaction of faith (even absent) and the ideological, political and social situations that come into play in the framework of the migratory problem.

Workshop 5

The Voice of the Migrant

During the fall of 2018, the northern hemisphere witnessed one of the most notorious migratory movements in recent decades: the Honduran caravan that, fleeing the adverse conditions in their country, headed from San Pedro Sula and crossed Central America and Mexico, together with six thousand other people of various nationalities who joined their journey, with the firm intention of reaching US soil.

Douglas Oviedo, a migrant and activist, presents us with the perspective of these walkers, from their departure from Honduras to their arrival in the city of Tijuana, privileging the lived experience of the protagonists over journalistic and academic views. His recently published book, Caravaneros, is a first-hand document of this key moment in the history of contemporary migrations. This testimonial work by Douglas is a dramatization that could only have been written by a caravanner.

Rather than allowing its bordering violence to dictate life on the borderlands, can a borderland hermeneutic of care and healing be offered instead? Such an approach would not only need to ascribe sacred value to migrant border crossers but more importantly to assemble into actual care practices of healing for them. By turning to care of migrant border crossers, the proposed borderland hermeneutic is concerned first and foremost with the region's most vulnerable Other.
