LAST YEAR'S (1958) S.C. CHAMPION SHIP, COLUMBIA, NOV.1958 WINNER. PROF. R. GRADY BROWN

The 19th S.C. State Chess Championship was held Nov. 26, 27 and 28, 1958 (Friday, Saturday and Sinday after Thanksgiving) at the Foster School of the Dance, 1704 Green St., in Columbia. Five rounds were played in a Swiss type tourney. Grady Brown, band director at Hartville High School, Hartville, S.C. was tied for first place with Prof. Ernst Breitenberger, exchange Professor of Physics from Austria at the University of S.C. Using the Solkoff System for breaking the tie, Prof. Brown was declared winner of the State Title, with $16\frac{1}{2}$ to $12\frac{1}{2}$ for Breitenberger. Of the 12 persons who took part in the tournament, 5 were former S.C. Champions, as is indicated in the following table.

SOUTH CAROLINA CHESS CHAMPIONS, 1926-158

As far as is known, the first S.C. Chess Championship was contested in 1926, following the establishment of the First S.C. Chess Association. This organization was disbanded after the 1933 Championship was played for. The tournaments from 1926 to 1933 were mostly round-robin affairs, the competitors being entirely from South Carolina. In 1948 at a spring triangular meeting in Augusta, Georgia (Charleston, Clemson and Augusta competing), Paul L. Cromelin (then of Augusta) and Robert F. Brand of Charleston took measures to reestablish the old South Carolina Chess Association. Since Paul Cromelin was just then moving to Columbia, the tournament of the new organization was held in the summer of 1948 in Columbia. A round-robin type of tournament was played. Then in 1949, at Spartanburg, the Swiss System was used for the first time in S.C. chess history. The Spartanburg tournament drew 32 contestants and was the best attended of any of the S.C. Tournaments. In 1950 we went back to the round-robin style tournament, but beginning with the 1951 all tournaments have been operated on the Swiss System, and all have been closed tournaments. In 1951 and again in 1952 an open S.C. Tournament was held in addition to the closed S.C. Tournament.

THE CHARLESTON CHESS CLUB SINCE 1943

When Robert F. Brand first came to Charleston in Sept. 1942 there was no chess olub in existence at the time, although it was later discovered that Charleston had had a chess club which had folded up only a few years before 1942. City Champions in this older club are known to have been Dr. Leon Banov, Jr. (about 1935); Col. Oliver J. Bond, President of The Citadel; Plenge and W.L.W. Weston. In Jan. 1943 Prof. Brand had an article in the local paper calling for a meeting of chess players in the Timrod Inn (now the Timrod Hotel) on Lower King St. near Broad. The response was instantaneous. A goodly sized groupof players met at the Timrod until that summer. The club was transferred to the Charleston Y.M.C.A. in Sept. 1943. In Sapt, 1944 the club folded up due to the departure of R.F. Brand for Raleigh. When he returned to Charleston in Sept. 1946 the Charleston Chess Club was reorganized at the Y.M.C.A. under the name of Charleston Y.M.C.A. Chess Club. Meetings were held at the Y.M.C.A. until late in 1951, when the club again folded up. Then in 1953 a certain George Bingaman, naval chaplain now living in Shamokin, Pennsylvania, got us started again. This time the meetings were held at the homes of members, a practice which is still adhered to and which has resulted in far greater interest in the club. R.F. Brand is Secretary as of the last several years. Harold A. Mouzon, Jr. had been President for the last few years. Since he has left Charleston, his place as President has been taken by Joseph W. Matches between these clubs should be kept in progress at all times. Instruct your club Secretary to arrange matches with the other club secretaries. PROF, LANNEAU FOSTER and PROF. STEVEN SHAW were the only South Carolina players in the 1959 Southern Championship at Birmingham, Ala. Prof. Foster won second prize in the Class A Tourney.

THE CHARLESTON GO CLUB, CHARLESTON, S.C.

The game of GO, Japanese IGO and Chinese WEI CHI, is today very widely played in Japan, China and Korea. It is mentioned in old Chinese manuscripts as early as 1000 B.C. The most outstanding players of this game are today in Japan. Edward Lasker, outstanding chess master and America's foremost authority on the Game of GO, calls GO the world's "best strategic game including chess". Like CHESS, GO is a game of pure skill which has occupied the attention of some of the world's greatest minds for ages. GO is a board game like CHESS, but in all other respects it is entirely unlike chess. GO is a struggle to gain territory, play being alternate on intersections of lines, 19 running each way at right angles to each other.
